An event (or a course of events) that will inevitably happen in the future.

*She was unable to control her own **destiny**.*

#### [fate](#)

The inescapable death of a person.

*Deserved a better **fate**.*

#### [fortune](#)

A large amount of wealth or prosperity.

*I spent a **fortune** on drink.*

**god's will**

The capability of conscious choice and decision and intention-George Meredith.

[karma](#)

The effects of a person's actions that determine his destiny in his next incarnation.

**kismet**

The will of Allah.

**one's doom**

An unpleasant or disastrous destiny.

**one's lot**

Anything (straws or pebbles etc.) taken or chosen at random.

**one's lot in life**

A parcel of land having fixed boundaries.

**one's portion**

An individual quantity of food or drink taken as part of a meal.

**predestination**

(in Christian theology) the doctrine that God has ordained all that will happen, especially with regard to the salvation of some and not others. It has been particularly associated with the teachings of St Augustine of Hippo and of Calvin.

**predetermination**

(theology) being determined in advance; especially the doctrine (usually associated with Calvin) that God has foreordained every event throughout eternity (including the final salvation of mankind).

*He entered the argument with a **predetermination** to prove me wrong.*

**preordination**

Being determined in advance; especially the doctrine (usually associated with Calvin) that God has foreordained every event throughout eternity (including the final salvation of mankind).

*There was an element of **preordination** about the verdict.*

[providence](#)

Timely preparation for future eventualities.

Divine **providence**.

**the stars**

A celestial body of hot gases that radiates energy derived from thermonuclear reactions in the interior.

**the writing on the wall**

The work of a writer; anything expressed in letters of the alphabet (especially when considered from the point of view of style and effect).

**what is to come**

A light strong brittle grey toxic bivalent metallic element.

**what is written in the stars**

A light strong brittle grey toxic bivalent metallic element.

| <b>fatalist</b>                   | Of or relating to fatalism.<br><i>A <b>fatalist</b> person.</i>   |
| <a href="#"><u>fate</u></a>       | Decree or designate beforehand.<br><i>His injury is a cruel twist of <b>fate</b>.</i>   |
| <b>fateful</b>                    | Controlled or decreed by fate; predetermined.<br><i>A <b>fateful</b> oversight.</i>   |
| <b>felicitate</b>                 | Congratulate.<br><i>The award winner was <b>felicitated</b> by the cultural association.</i>  |
| <b>foreknowledge</b>              | Awareness of something before it happens or exists.<br><i>There was the <b>foreknowledge</b> of every role she would dance.</i>   |
| <b>foreordination</b>             | Being determined in advance; especially the doctrine (usually associated with Calvin) that God has foreordained every event throughout eternity (including the final salvation of mankind). |
| <a href="#"><u>fortuitous</u></a> | Happening by chance rather than intention.<br><i><b>Fortuitous</b> encounters strange accidents of fortune.</i>   |

| <b><u>fortunate</u></b>     | Auspicious or favourable.<br><i>It was <b>fortunate</b> that the weather was good.</i>  |

| <b><u>fortune</u></b>       | An unknown and unpredictable phenomenon that causes an event to result one way rather than another.<br><i>He inherited a substantial <b>fortune</b>.</i>  |
| <b>incidentally</b>         | Of a minor or subordinate nature.<br><i><b>Incidentally</b> I won't go to the party.</i>  |
| <b>luck</b>                 | Something regarded as bringing about or portending good or bad things.<br><i>I don't like Friday it's bad <b>luck</b>.</i>  |
| <b>lucky</b>                | Presaging or likely to bring good luck or a good outcome.<br><i><b>Lucky</b> stars.</i>   |
| <b><u>opportunist</u></b>   | Opportunistic.<br><i>Most burglaries are committed by casual <b>opportunists</b>.</i>   |
| <b>predestination</b>       | (theology) being determined in advance; especially the doctrine (usually associated with Calvin) that God has foreordained every event throughout eternity (including the final salvation of mankind).                                      |
| <b>predestine</b>           | (of God) destine (someone) for a particular fate or purpose.<br><i>She was certain that fate was with her and everything was <b>predestined</b>.</i>  |
| <b>randomly</b>             | In a way that involves equal chances for each item.<br><i>Troops fired <b>randomly</b> from tanks.</i>  |
| <b><u>superstition</u></b>  | A widely held but irrational belief in supernatural influences, especially as leading to good or bad luck, or a practice based on such a belief.<br><i>She touched her locket for luck a <b>superstition</b> she'd had since childhood.</i> |
