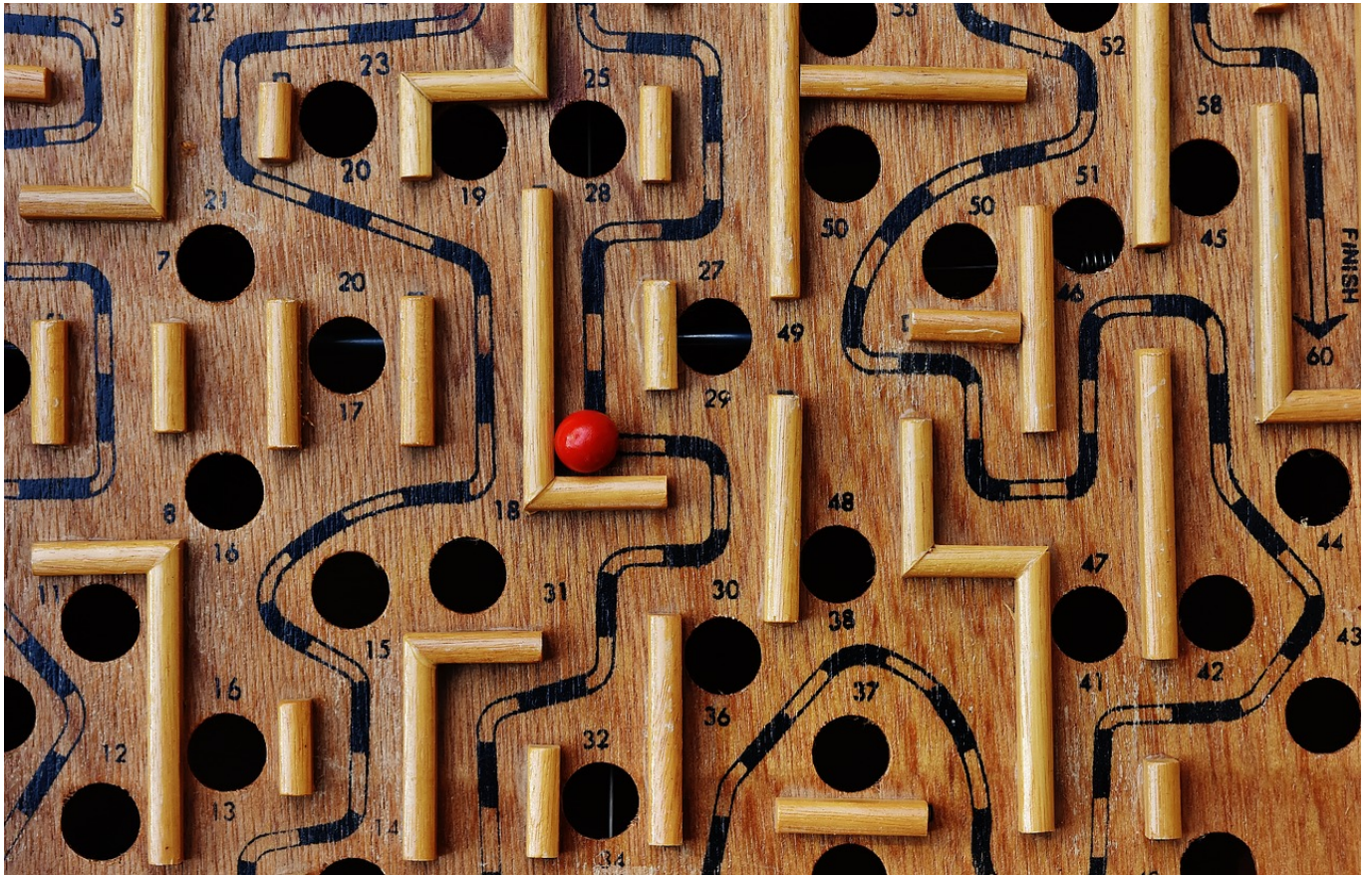

### Definitions of "Labyrinth" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “labyrinth” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A complicated irregular network of passages or paths in which it is difficult to find one's way; a maze.*
- *A complex structure in the inner ear which contains the organs of hearing and balance. It consists of bony cavities (the bony labyrinth) filled with fluid and lined with sensitive membranes (the membranous labyrinth).*
- *Complex system of paths or tunnels in which it is easy to get lost.*
- *A complex system of interconnecting cavities; concerned with hearing and equilibrium.*
- *An intricate and confusing arrangement.*
- *An accessory respiratory organ of certain fish.*

<b>entanglement</b>	The action or fact of entangling or being entangled. <i>Romantic <b>entanglements</b>.</i>
<b>intricacy</b>	The quality of being intricate. <i>The <b>intricacy</b> of the procedure.</i>
<b>jungle</b>	An impenetrable equatorial forest. <i>We set off into the <b>jungle</b>.</i>
<u><a href="#">maze</a></u>	Something jumbled or confused. <i>A <b>maze</b> of petty regulations.</i>
<b>morass</b>	A complicated or confused situation. <i>She would become lost in a <b>morass</b> of lies and explanations.</i>
<b>network</b>	A complex system of railways, roads, or other routes. <i>A <b>network</b> of canals.</i>
<u><a href="#">snarl</a></u>	An act or sound of snarling. <i>A <b>snarl</b> of rage.</i>
<u><a href="#">tangle</a></u>	A twisted and tangled mass that is highly interwoven. <i>A <b>tangle</b> of golden hair.</i>
<b>turn</b>	Turning or twisting around in place. <i>The twists and <b>turns</b> in the passageways.</i>
<u><a href="#">twist</a></u>	A fine strong thread consisting of twisted strands of cotton or silk. <i>A barley sugar <b>twist</b>.</i>
<b>warren</b>	United States jurist who served as chief justice of the United States Supreme Court (1891-1974). <i>A <b>warren</b> of narrow gas lit streets.</i>
<u><a href="#">web</a></u>	The flattened weblike part of a feather consisting of a series of barbs on either side of the shaft. <i>He found himself caught up in a <b>web</b> of bureaucracy.</i>

<b>adulterant</b>	A substance used to adulterate another. <i>It is necessary to remove the <b>adulterants</b> before use.</i>
<b>complex</b>	Make an atom or compound form a complex with another. <i>The situation is more <b>complex</b> than it appears.</i>
<b>complexity</b>	A factor involved in a complicated process or situation. <i>An issue of great <b>complexity</b>.</i>
<b><u>complicated</u></b>	Difficult to analyze or understand. <i><b>Complicated</b> Middle East politics.</i>
<b><u>conglomeration</u></b>	A number of different things, parts or items that are grouped together; collection. <i>A loose <b>conglomeration</b> of pieces.</i>
<b>convoluted</b>	Intricately folded, twisted, or coiled. <i><b>Convoluted</b> reasoning.</i>
<b>convolution</b>	A thing that is complex and difficult to follow. <i>Crosses adorned with elaborate <b>convolutions</b>.</i>
<b>corridor</b>	An enclosed passageway; rooms usually open onto it. <i>Even on long journeys early trains had no <b>corridors</b>.</i>

<b>detail</b>	Provide details for. <i><b>Detail</b> of right eye showing marks on the lids.</i>
<b>elaborate</b>	Develop or present (a theory, policy, or system) in further detail. <i><b>Elaborate</b> wrought iron gates.</i>
<b>elaboration</b>	The process of developing or presenting a theory, policy, or system in further detail. <i>The speech lacked any <b>elaboration</b> on concrete measures taken.</i>
<b>interlocking</b>	The act of interlocking or meshing. <i>A design of <b>interlocking</b> leaves.</i>
<b>intricacy</b>	Details, especially of an involved or perplexing subject. <i>The <b>intricacy</b> of the procedure.</i>
<b>intricate</b>	Having many complexly arranged elements; elaborate. <i><b>Intricate</b> lacework.</i>
<b>involution</b>	The process of raising a quantity to some assigned power. <i>Periods of artistic <b>involution</b>.</i>
<b>knotty</b>	Full of knots. <i>A <b>knotty</b> problem.</i>
<b><u>labyrinthine</u></b>	(of a network) like a labyrinth; irregular and twisting. <i><b>Labyrinthine</b> plots and counterplots.</i>
<b>lapidary</b>	Relating to the engraving, cutting, or polishing of stones and gems. <i>A <b>lapidary</b> statement.</i>
<b><u>maze</u></b>	A complex network of paths or passages. <i>She was still <b>mazed</b> with the drug she had taken.</i>
<b><u>minutia</u></b>	A small or minor detail. <i>He had memorized the many <b>minutiae</b> of the legal code.</i>
<b>navigate</b>	(of an animal) find its way. <i>Whales use their own inbuilt sonar system to <b>navigate</b>.</i>
<b>nuance</b>	Give nuances to. <i>He was familiar with the <b>nuances</b> of the local dialect.</i>
<b>perplexity</b>	Inability to deal with or understand something. <i>The dense <b>perplexity</b> of dwarf palm garlanded creepers glossy undergrowth.</i>
<b><u>puzzle</u></b>	A jigsaw puzzle. <i>A book with picture <b>puzzles</b>.</i>
<b>ravel</b>	A row of unravelled stitches. <i>A <b>ravelled</b> story.</i>

<b>sinuosity</b>	The ability to curve or bend easily and flexibly. <i>He hated the <b>sinuosity</b> of mountain roads.</i>
<b>subtlety</b>	The quality of being difficult to detect or analyze. <i>The textural <b>subtlety</b> of Degas.</i>
<b>tangle</b>	Tangle or complicate. <i>She got into a <b>tangle</b> with staff.</i>
<b>tangled</b>	Highly complex or intricate and occasionally devious. <i>The <b>tangled</b> ropes.</i>
<b>tortuous</b>	Not straightforward. <i>His <b>tortuous</b> reasoning.</i>
