blasé	Nonchalantly unconcerned.
careless	Not giving sufficient attention or thought to avoiding harm or errors. <i>She had been careless and had left the window unlocked.</i>
casual	Employed or established on a temporary or irregular basis. <i>The casual way in which victims were treated.</i>
dreamy	Dreamy in mood or nature. <i>The atmosphere is tranquil and dreamy.</i>
half-hearted	Feeling or showing little interest or enthusiasm.

indifferent	(often followed by `to') lacking importance; not mattering one way or the other. <i>Indifferent to the sufferings of others.</i>
insouciant	Showing a casual lack of concern. <i>An insouciant shrug.</i>
<u>languid</u>	Weak or faint from illness or fatigue. <i>His languid demeanour irritated her.</i>
languorous	Characterized by an oppressive stillness. <i>A hot languorous afternoon.</i>
<u>lax</u>	Of the limbs or muscles relaxed. <i>The merger of tense and lax vowels before l.</i>
<u>lazy</u>	(of a river) slow-moving. <i>A lazy lowland river.</i>
<u>leisurely</u>	Acting or done at leisure; unhurried or relaxed. <i>A leisurely breakfast at our hotel.</i>
lukewarm	Moderately warm. <i>Britain is lukewarm about the proposal.</i>
offhand	With little or no preparation or forethought. <i>An offhand manner.</i>
relaxed	Without strain or anxiety. <i>A relaxed and informal discussion.</i>
<u>uncaring</u>	Lacking affection or warm feeling. <i>An uncaring father.</i>
<u>unconcerned</u>	Showing a lack of worry or interest, especially when this is surprising or callous. <i>Scott seemed unconcerned by his companion's problem.</i>
<u>unenthusiastic</u>	Not enthusiastic; lacking excitement or ardor. <i>Unenthusiastic applause.</i>
uninterested	Not having or showing interest. <i>I was totally uninterested in boys.</i>

<u>apathetic</u>	Marked by a lack of interest. <i>An apathetic electorate.</i>
<u>blase</u>	Uninterested because of frequent exposure or indulgence. <i>A blase attitude about housecleaning.</i>
bored	Feeling weary and impatient because one is unoccupied or lacks interest in one's current activity. <i>Strolled through the museum with a bored air.</i>
dejected	Sad and depressed; dispirited. <i>Is dejected but trying to look cheerful.</i>
dispirited	Marked by low spirits; showing no enthusiasm. <i>A dispirited and divided Party.</i>
dreamy	Dreamy in mood or nature. <i>A slow dreamy melody.</i>
drooping	Hanging down (as from exhaustion or weakness). <i>Lilacs with drooping panicles of fragrant flowers.</i>
<u>drowsy</u>	Showing lack of attention or boredom. <i>The wine had made her drowsy.</i>
exhausted	Drained of energy or effectiveness extremely tired completely exhausted. <i>The day's events left her completely exhausted her strength drained.</i>
<u>feeble</u>	Lacking strength of character. <i>By now he was too feeble to leave his room.</i>
flagging	Becoming tired or less dynamic; declining in strength. <i>She wants to revive her flagging career.</i>
<u>gloomy</u>	Filled with melancholy and despondency. <i>A dark gloomy day.</i>
<u>groggy</u>	Stunned or confused and slow to react (as from blows or drunkenness or exhaustion). <i>The sleeping pills had left her feeling groggy.</i>
indifferent	Showing no care or concern in attitude or action. <i>Most workers were indifferent to foreign affairs.</i>
<u>languid</u>	Lacking spirit or liveliness. <i>A languid mood.</i>
lassitude	A feeling of lack of interest or energy. <i>She was overcome by lassitude and retired to bed.</i>

<u>lazy</u>	(of a river) slow-moving. <i>They were enjoying a really lazy holiday.</i>
<u>lethargic</u>	Affected by lethargy; sluggish and apathetic. <i>Bullfrogs became lethargic with the first cold nights.</i>
<u>lethargy</u>	Inactivity; showing an unusual lack of energy. <i>A history of weight loss lethargy and fluid retention.</i>
<u>listless</u>	(of a person or their manner) lacking energy or enthusiasm. <i>He was listless and bored.</i>
pendulous	Hanging down loosely. <i>The pendulous branches of a weeping willow.</i>
<u>sleepy</u>	Inducing sleep; soporific. <i>He turned off the road into a sleepy little town.</i>
sluggish	(of business) not active or brisk. <i>The car had been sluggish all morning.</i>
sluggishness	The pace of things that move relatively slowly. <i>The sluggishness of the economy.</i>
somnolence	A very sleepy state.
somnolent	Inclined to or marked by drowsiness. <i>The sound had a somnolent effect.</i>
tire	Exhaust or get tired through overuse or great strain or stress. <i>Automobile tires are usually made of rubber and filled with compressed air.</i>
tired	(especially of a statement or idea) boring or uninteresting because overfamiliar. <i>Fisher rubbed his tired eyes.</i>
torpor	A state of physical or mental inactivity; lethargy. <i>They veered between apathetic torpor and hysterical fanaticism.</i>
uninterested	Having no care or interest in knowing. <i>She appeared totally uninterested.</i>
