### Synonyms of "Lackadaisical" as an adjective (19 Words)

<b>blasé</b>	Nonchalantly unconcerned.
<b><a href="#">careless</a></b>	Not giving sufficient attention or thought to avoiding harm or errors. <i>She had been <b>careless</b> and had left the window unlocked.</i>
<b><a href="#">casual</a></b>	Employed or established on a temporary or irregular basis. <i>The <b>casual</b> way in which victims were treated.</i>
<b>dreamy</b>	Dreamy in mood or nature. <i>The atmosphere is tranquil and <b>dreamy</b>.</i>
<b>half-hearted</b>	Feeling or showing little interest or enthusiasm.

<b>indifferent</b>	(often followed by `to') lacking importance; not mattering one way or the other. <i><b>Indifferent</b> to the sufferings of others.</i>
<b>insouciant</b>	Showing a casual lack of concern. <i>An <b>insouciant</b> shrug.</i>
<b><u>languid</u></b>	Weak or faint from illness or fatigue. <i>His <b>languid</b> demeanour irritated her.</i>
<b>languorous</b>	Characterized by an oppressive stillness. <i>A hot <b>languorous</b> afternoon.</i>
<b><u>lax</u></b>	Of the limbs or muscles relaxed. <i>The merger of tense and <b>lax</b> vowels before l.</i>
<b><u>lazy</u></b>	(of a river) slow-moving. <i>A <b>lazy</b> lowland river.</i>
<b><u>leisurely</u></b>	Acting or done at leisure; unhurried or relaxed. <i>A <b>leisurely</b> breakfast at our hotel.</i>
<b>lukewarm</b>	Moderately warm. <i>Britain is <b>lukewarm</b> about the proposal.</i>
<b>offhand</b>	With little or no preparation or forethought. <i>An <b>offhand</b> manner.</i>
<b>relaxed</b>	Without strain or anxiety. <i>A <b>relaxed</b> and informal discussion.</i>
<b><u>uncaring</u></b>	Lacking affection or warm feeling. <i>An <b>uncaring</b> father.</i>
<b><u>unconcerned</u></b>	Showing a lack of worry or interest, especially when this is surprising or callous. <i>Scott seemed <b>unconcerned</b> by his companion's problem.</i>
<b><u>unenthusiastic</u></b>	Not enthusiastic; lacking excitement or ardor. <i><b>Unenthusiastic</b> applause.</i>
<b>uninterested</b>	Not having or showing interest. <i>I was totally <b>uninterested</b> in boys.</i>

## Associations of "Lackadaisical" (30 Words)

<b><u>apathetic</u></b>	Marked by a lack of interest. <i>An <b>apathetic</b> electorate.</i>
<b><u>blase</u></b>	Uninterested because of frequent exposure or indulgence. <i>A <b>blase</b> attitude about housecleaning.</i>
<b>bored</b>	Feeling weary and impatient because one is unoccupied or lacks interest in one's current activity. <i>Strolled through the museum with a <b>bored</b> air.</i>
<b>dejected</b>	Sad and depressed; dispirited. <i>Is <b>dejected</b> but trying to look cheerful.</i>
<b>dispirited</b>	Marked by low spirits; showing no enthusiasm. <i>A <b>dispirited</b> and divided Party.</i>
<b>dreamy</b>	Dreamy in mood or nature. <i>A slow <b>dreamy</b> melody.</i>
<b>drooping</b>	Hanging down (as from exhaustion or weakness). <i>Lilacs with <b>drooping</b> panicles of fragrant flowers.</i>
<b><u>drowsy</u></b>	Showing lack of attention or boredom. <i>The wine had made her <b>drowsy</b>.</i>
<b>exhausted</b>	Drained of energy or effectiveness extremely tired completely exhausted. <i>The day's events left her completely <b>exhausted</b> her strength drained.</i>
<b><u>feeble</u></b>	Lacking strength of character. <i>By now he was too <b>feeble</b> to leave his room.</i>
<b>flagging</b>	Becoming tired or less dynamic; declining in strength. <i>She wants to revive her <b>flagging</b> career.</i>
<b><u>gloomy</u></b>	Filled with melancholy and despondency. <i>A dark <b>gloomy</b> day.</i>
<b><u>groggy</u></b>	Stunned or confused and slow to react (as from blows or drunkenness or exhaustion). <i>The sleeping pills had left her feeling <b>groggy</b>.</i>
<b>indifferent</b>	Showing no care or concern in attitude or action. <i>Most workers were <b>indifferent</b> to foreign affairs.</i>
<b><u>languid</u></b>	Lacking spirit or liveliness. <i>A <b>languid</b> mood.</i>
<b>lassitude</b>	A feeling of lack of interest or energy. <i>She was overcome by <b>lassitude</b> and retired to bed.</i>

<b>lazy</b>	(of a river) slow-moving. <i>They were enjoying a really <b>lazy</b> holiday.</i>
<b>lethargic</b>	Affected by lethargy; sluggish and apathetic. <i>Bullfrogs became <b>lethargic</b> with the first cold nights.</i>
<b>lethargy</b>	Inactivity; showing an unusual lack of energy. <i>A history of weight loss <b>lethargy</b> and fluid retention.</i>
<b>listless</b>	(of a person or their manner) lacking energy or enthusiasm. <i>He was <b>listless</b> and bored.</i>
<b>pendulous</b>	Hanging down loosely. <i>The <b>pendulous</b> branches of a weeping willow.</i>
<b>sleepy</b>	Inducing sleep; soporific. <i>He turned off the road into a <b>sleepy</b> little town.</i>
<b>sluggish</b>	(of business) not active or brisk. <i>The car had been <b>sluggish</b> all morning.</i>
<b>sluggishness</b>	The pace of things that move relatively slowly. <i>The <b>sluggishness</b> of the economy.</i>
<b>somnolence</b>	A very sleepy state.
<b>somnolent</b>	Inclined to or marked by drowsiness. <i>The sound had a <b>somnolent</b> effect.</i>
<b>tire</b>	Exhaust or get tired through overuse or great strain or stress. <i>Automobile <b>tires</b> are usually made of rubber and filled with compressed air.</i>
<b>tired</b>	(especially of a statement or idea) boring or uninteresting because overfamiliar. <i>Fisher rubbed his <b>tired</b> eyes.</i>
<b>torpor</b>	A state of physical or mental inactivity; lethargy. <i>They veered between apathetic <b>torpor</b> and hysterical fanaticism.</i>
<b>uninterested</b>	Having no care or interest in knowing. <i>She appeared totally <b>uninterested</b>.</i>
