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Associations of "Laid back" (30 Words)

<u>anachronism</u>	Something located at a time when it could not have existed or occurred. <i>The town is a throwback to medieval times an anachronism that has survived the passing years.</i>
backslide	Drop to a lower level, as in one’s morals or standards. <i>There are many things that can cause slimmers to backslide.</i>
backward	Lacking the confidence to do (something). <i>He was not backward in displaying his talents.</i>
backwards	(of a movement) in the direction of one’s back. <i>A step backwards for the economy.</i>
behind	A kick that sends the ball over a behind line or a touch that sends it between the inner posts scoring one point. <i>Behind by two points.</i>
degeneracy	The state of being degenerate in mental or moral qualities. <i>The degeneracy of later Roman work.</i>
degeneration	The state or process of being or becoming degenerate; decline or deterioration. <i>Degeneration of the muscle fibres.</i>
discontinuity	Lack of connection or continuity. <i>There is no significant discontinuity between modern and primitive societies.</i>
dorsal	Facing away from the axis of an organ or organism. <i>The dorsal aorta.</i>
inverse	Something inverted in sequence or character or effect. <i>Numerous studies have shown an inverse relationship between exercise and the risk of heart disease.</i>
later	At or toward an end or late period or stage of development. <i>Later medical science could have saved the child.</i>

past	A past tense or form of a verb. <i>A simple past of the first conjugation.</i>
posterior	A person's buttocks. <i>A date posterior to the first Reform Bill.</i>
posthumous	Occurring, awarded, or appearing after the death of the originator. <i>Newton was the posthumous son of an illiterate yeoman.</i>
<u>regress</u>	Calculate the coefficient or coefficients of regression of a variable against or on another variable. <i>A regress to the nursery.</i>
<u>regression</u>	A return to a former or less developed state. <i>There was 46.7 per cent complete regression in the placebo group.</i>
regressive	Adjusted so that the rate decreases as the amount of income increases. <i>Indirect taxes are as a group regressive.</i>
<u>relapse</u>	(of a sick or injured person) deteriorate after a period of improvement. <i>He relapsed.</i>
restoration	The restoration of the Bourbon monarchy in France in 1814 following the fall of Napoleon Louis XVIII was recalled from exile by Talleyrand. <i>The restoration of Andrew's sight.</i>
retrace	Trace (something) back to its source or beginning. <i>I wanted to retrace a particular evolutionary pathway.</i>
retreat	Make a retreat from an earlier commitment or activity. <i>After the funeral he retreated to Scotland.</i>
<u>retroactive</u>	(especially of legislation) taking effect from a date in the past. <i>Retroactive tax increase.</i>
retrograde	Show retrograde motion. <i>The retrograde form of these inscriptions.</i>
retrogression	Passing from a more complex to a simpler biological form. <i>A retrogression to 19th century attitudes.</i>
<u>retrospect</u>	Contemplation of things past. <i>In retrospect.</i>
retrospective	An exhibition or compilation showing the development of an artist's work over a period of time. <i>Retrospective pay awards.</i>
return	A good rate of return. <i>It might be worth checking with the box office for returns.</i>
reversion	A property to which someone has the right of reversion. <i>A problem applicable to most variegated plants is that of reversion.</i>

revert

Return to (a previous state, practice, topic, etc.)

*He ignored her words by **reverting** to the former subject.*

throwback

A reversion to an earlier ancestral characteristic.

*A lot of his work is a **throwback** to the fifties.*
