## Associations of "Laid back" (30 Words)

<b><u>anachronism</u></b>	Something located at a time when it could not have existed or occurred. <i>The town is a throwback to medieval times an <b>anachronism</b> that has survived the passing years.</i>
<b>backslide</b>	Drop to a lower level, as in one’s morals or standards. <i>There are many things that can cause slimmers to <b>backslide</b>.</i>
<b>backward</b>	Lacking the confidence to do (something). <i>He was not <b>backward</b> in displaying his talents.</i>
<b>backwards</b>	(of a movement) in the direction of one’s back. <i>A step <b>backwards</b> for the economy.</i>
<b>behind</b>	A kick that sends the ball over a behind line or a touch that sends it between the inner posts scoring one point. <i><b>Behind</b> by two points.</i>
<b>degeneracy</b>	The state of being degenerate in mental or moral qualities. <i>The <b>degeneracy</b> of later Roman work.</i>
<b>degeneration</b>	The state or process of being or becoming degenerate; decline or deterioration. <i><b>Degeneration</b> of the muscle fibres.</i>
<b>discontinuity</b>	Lack of connection or continuity. <i>There is no significant <b>discontinuity</b> between modern and primitive societies.</i>
<b>dorsal</b>	Facing away from the axis of an organ or organism. <i>The <b>dorsal</b> aorta.</i>
<b>inverse</b>	Something inverted in sequence or character or effect. <i>Numerous studies have shown an <b>inverse</b> relationship between exercise and the risk of heart disease.</i>
<b>later</b>	At or toward an end or late period or stage of development. <i><b>Later</b> medical science could have saved the child.</i>

<b>past</b>	A past tense or form of a verb. <i>A simple <b>past</b> of the first conjugation.</i>
<b>posterior</b>	A person's buttocks. <i>A date <b>posterior</b> to the first Reform Bill.</i>
<b>posthumous</b>	Occurring, awarded, or appearing after the death of the originator. <i>Newton was the <b>posthumous</b> son of an illiterate yeoman.</i>
<u><b>regress</b></u>	Calculate the coefficient or coefficients of regression of a variable against or on another variable. <i>A <b>regress</b> to the nursery.</i>
<u><b>regression</b></u>	A return to a former or less developed state. <i>There was 46.7 per cent complete <b>regression</b> in the placebo group.</i>
<b>regressive</b>	Adjusted so that the rate decreases as the amount of income increases. <i>Indirect taxes are as a group <b>regressive</b>.</i>
<u><b>relapse</b></u>	(of a sick or injured person) deteriorate after a period of improvement. <i>He <b>relapsed</b>.</i>
<b>restoration</b>	The restoration of the Bourbon monarchy in France in 1814 following the fall of Napoleon Louis XVIII was recalled from exile by Talleyrand. <i>The <b>restoration</b> of Andrew's sight.</i>
<b>retrace</b>	Trace (something) back to its source or beginning. <i>I wanted to <b>retrace</b> a particular evolutionary pathway.</i>
<b>retreat</b>	Make a retreat from an earlier commitment or activity. <i>After the funeral he <b>retreated</b> to Scotland.</i>
<u><b>retroactive</b></u>	(especially of legislation) taking effect from a date in the past. <i><b>Retroactive</b> tax increase.</i>
<b>retrograde</b>	Show retrograde motion. <i>The <b>retrograde</b> form of these inscriptions.</i>
<b>retrogression</b>	Passing from a more complex to a simpler biological form. <i>A <b>retrogression</b> to 19th century attitudes.</i>
<u><b>retrospect</b></u>	Contemplation of things past. <i>In <b>retrospect</b>.</i>
<b>retrospective</b>	An exhibition or compilation showing the development of an artist's work over a period of time. <i><b>Retrospective</b> pay awards.</i>
<b>return</b>	A good rate of return. <i>It might be worth checking with the box office for <b>returns</b>.</i>
<b>reversion</b>	A property to which someone has the right of reversion. <i>A problem applicable to most variegated plants is that of <b>reversion</b>.</i>

revert

Return to (a previous state, practice, topic, etc.)

*He ignored her words by **reverting** to the former subject.*

throwback

A reversion to an earlier ancestral characteristic.

*A lot of his work is a **throwback** to the fifties.*
