<b><u>lackadaisical</u></b>	Lacking spirit or liveliness. <i>A <b>lackadaisical</b> spiritless young man about town.</i>
<b>lacking in energy</b>	Nonexistent.
<b>languorous</b>	Characterized by an oppressive stillness. <i>The <b>languorous</b> pace of the film.</i>
<b><u>lazy</u></b>	Moving slowly and gently. <i>Up a <b>lazy</b> river.</i>
<b><u>leisurely</u></b>	Not hurried or forced. <i>A <b>leisurely</b> breakfast at our hotel.</i>
<b>peaceful</b>	Peacefully resistant in response to injustice. <i>Everything was so quiet and <b>peaceful</b> in the early morning.</i>
<b>relaxed</b>	(of a muscle or other body part) not tense. <i>Gave the impression of being quite <b>relaxed</b>.</i>
<b><u>restful</u></b>	Affording physical or mental rest. <i>The rooms were cool and <b>restful</b>.</i>
<b><u>sickly</u></b>	(of a place or climate) causing or characterized by unhealthiness. <i>A <b>sickly</b> vaporous swamp.</i>
<b>slow</b>	Slow to learn or understand lacking intellectual acuity Thackeray. <i>A <b>slow</b> dot matrix printer.</i>
<b>slow-moving</b>	Moving slowly.
<b>unenergetic</b>	Lacking energy or vigour. <i>I felt lethargic and <b>unenergetic</b> and going into work was the last thing I wanted to do.</i>
<b>unhurried</b>	Moving, acting, or taking place without haste or urgency. <i>People strolling about in an <b>unhurried</b> way.</i>
<b><u>weak</u></b>	Relating to or denoting the weakest of the known kinds of force between particles which acts only at distances less than about 10 cm is very much weaker than the electromagnetic and the strong interactions and conserves neither strangeness parity nor isospin. <i>She managed a <b>weak</b> nervous smile.</i>

<b>asleep</b>	Dead. <i>Fell <b>asleep</b> at the wheel.</i>
<b>dispirited</b>	Having lost enthusiasm and hope; disheartened. <i>A <b>dispirited</b> and divided Party.</i>
<b>dreamy</b>	Dreamy in mood or nature. <i>The atmosphere is tranquil and <b>dreamy</b>.</i>
<b>drooping</b>	Weak from exhaustion. <i>Lilacs with <b>drooping</b> panicles of fragrant flowers.</i>
<b><u>drowsy</u></b>	Causing sleepiness. <i>The wine had made her <b>drowsy</b>.</i>
<b>effete</b>	Marked by excessive self-indulgence and moral decay. <i>The authority of an <b>effete</b> aristocracy began to dwindle.</i>

<b><u>emaciated</u></b>	Abnormally thin or weak, especially because of illness or a lack of food. <i>She was so <b>emaciated</b> she could hardly stand.</i>
<b>exhausted</b>	Drained of energy or effectiveness extremely tired completely exhausted. <i><b>Exhausted</b> peat workings.</i>
<b>fatigued</b>	Drained of energy or effectiveness; extremely tired; completely exhausted.
<b><u>feeble</u></b>	Failing to convince or impress. <i>A <b>feeble</b> old woman.</i>
<b>flagging</b>	Weak from exhaustion. <i>She wants to revive her <b>flagging</b> career.</i>
<b><u>fragile</u></b>	(of an object) easily broken or damaged. <i>She has the <b>fragile</b> beauty of youth.</i>
<b><u>frail</u></b>	The weight of a frail basket full of raisins or figs between 50 and 75 pounds. <i><b>Frail</b> humanity.</i>
<b><u>gaunt</u></b>	(of a building or place) grim or desolate in appearance. <i><b>Gaunt</b> tenement blocks.</i>
<b><u>gloomy</u></b>	Dark or poorly lit, especially so as to appear depressing or frightening. <i>A <b>gloomy</b> silence.</i>
<b><u>groggy</u></b>	Stunned or confused and slow to react (as from blows or drunkenness or exhaustion). <i>The sleeping pills had left her feeling <b>groggy</b>.</i>
<b>impotent</b>	Lacking power or ability- Freeman J. Dyson. <i>He was on medication which had made him <b>impotent</b>.</i>
<b><u>lackadaisical</u></b>	Lacking enthusiasm and determination; carelessly lazy. <i>A <b>lackadaisical</b> attempt.</i>
<b><u>lethargic</u></b>	Deficient in alertness or activity. <i>I felt tired and a little <b>lethargic</b>.</i>
<b><u>lethargy</u></b>	A pathological state of sleepiness or deep unresponsiveness and inactivity. <i>There was an air of <b>lethargy</b> about him.</i>
<b><u>limp</u></b>	A tendency to limp a gait impeded by injury or stiffness. <i>He felt his body go <b>limp</b>.</i>
<b><u>listless</u></b>	Lacking zest or vivacity. <i>Bouts of <b>listless</b> depression.</i>
<b>pendulous</b>	Hanging down loosely. <i>The <b>pendulous</b> branches of a weeping willow.</i>
<b>rickety</b>	Inclined to shake as from weakness or defect. <i>We went carefully up the <b>rickety</b> stairs.</i>

- sluggishness**      A state of comatose torpor (as found in sleeping sickness).  
*The **sluggishness** of the compass in the Arctic cold.*
- tired**      (of a thing) no longer fresh or in good condition.  
*Too **tired** to eat.*
- uninterested**      Not having or showing interest.  
*I was totally **uninterested** in boys.*
- weak**      Relating to or denoting the weakest of the known kinds of force between particles which acts only at distances less than about 10 cm is very much weaker than the electromagnetic and the strong interactions and conserves neither strangeness parity nor isospin.

- weary**      Exhaust or get tired through overuse or great strain or stress.  
*He gave a long **weary** sigh.*
