drooping	Hanging down (as from exhaustion or weakness). <i>Lilacs with drooping panicles of fragrant flowers.</i>

lacking in energy	Nonexistent.
languorous	Characterized by an oppressive stillness. <i>The languorous pace of the film.</i>
<u>lazy</u>	Moving slowly and gently. <i>Up a lazy river.</i>
<u>leisurely</u>	Not hurried or forced. <i>A leisurely breakfast at our hotel.</i>
peaceful	Peacefully resistant in response to injustice. <i>Everything was so quiet and peaceful in the early morning.</i>
relaxed	(of a muscle or other body part) not tense. <i>Gave the impression of being quite relaxed.</i>
<u>restful</u>	Affording physical or mental rest. <i>The rooms were cool and restful.</i>
<u>sickly</u>	(of a place or climate) causing or characterized by unhealthiness. <i>A sickly vaporous swamp.</i>
slow	Slow to learn or understand lacking intellectual acuity Thackeray. <i>A slow dot matrix printer.</i>
slow-moving	Moving slowly.
unenergetic	Lacking energy or vigour. <i>I felt lethargic and unenergetic and going into work was the last thing I wanted to do.</i>
unhurried	Moving, acting, or taking place without haste or urgency. <i>People strolling about in an unhurried way.</i>
<u>weak</u>	Relating to or denoting the weakest of the known kinds of force between particles which acts only at distances less than about 10 cm is very much weaker than the electromagnetic and the strong interactions and conserves neither strangeness parity nor isospin. <i>She managed a weak nervous smile.</i>

drooping	Weak from exhaustion. <i>Lilacs with drooping panicles of fragrant flowers.</i>

effete	Marked by excessive self-indulgence and moral decay. <i>The authority of an effete aristocracy began to dwindle.</i>

<u>emaciated</u>	Abnormally thin or weak, especially because of illness or a lack of food. <i>She was so emaciated she could hardly stand.</i>
exhausted	Drained of energy or effectiveness extremely tired completely exhausted. <i>Exhausted peat workings.</i>
fatigued	Drained of energy or effectiveness; extremely tired; completely exhausted.
<u>feeble</u>	Failing to convince or impress. <i>A feeble old woman.</i>
flagging	Weak from exhaustion. <i>She wants to revive her flagging career.</i>
<u>fragile</u>	(of an object) easily broken or damaged. <i>She has the fragile beauty of youth.</i>
<u>frail</u>	The weight of a frail basket full of raisins or figs between 50 and 75 pounds. <i>Frail humanity.</i>
<u>gaunt</u>	(of a building or place) grim or desolate in appearance. <i>Gaunt tenement blocks.</i>
<u>gloomy</u>	Dark or poorly lit, especially so as to appear depressing or frightening. <i>A gloomy silence.</i>
<u>groggy</u>	Stunned or confused and slow to react (as from blows or drunkenness or exhaustion). <i>The sleeping pills had left her feeling groggy.</i>
impotent	Lacking power or ability- Freeman J. Dyson. <i>He was on medication which had made him impotent.</i>
<u>lackadaisical</u>	Lacking enthusiasm and determination; carelessly lazy. <i>A lackadaisical attempt.</i>
<u>lethargic</u>	Deficient in alertness or activity. <i>I felt tired and a little lethargic.</i>
<u>lethargy</u>	A pathological state of sleepiness or deep unresponsiveness and inactivity. <i>There was an air of lethargy about him.</i>
<u>limp</u>	A tendency to limp a gait impeded by injury or stiffness. <i>He felt his body go limp.</i>
<u>listless</u>	Lacking zest or vivacity. <i>Bouts of listless depression.</i>
pendulous	Hanging down loosely. <i>The pendulous branches of a weeping willow.</i>
rickety	Inclined to shake as from weakness or defect. <i>We went carefully up the rickety stairs.</i>

<u>sleepy</u>	Needing or ready for sleep. <i>The sleepy heat of the afternoon.</i>

<u>weary</u>	Exhaust or get tired through overuse or great strain or stress. <i>He gave a long weary sigh.</i>
