- *In large part; mainly or chiefly.*



## Synonyms of "Largely" as an adverb (19 Words)

**basically**

In essence; at bottom or by one's (or its) very nature.  
*I **basically** played the same thing every night.*

**chiefly**

For the most part; mostly.  
*An audience consisting **chiefly** of women between the ages of 18 and 54.*

**first and foremost**

Prominently forward.

**for all intents and purposes**

To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent (‘whole’ is often used informally for ‘wholly’.

**for the most part**

Very.

generally

By or to most people; widely.

*The term of a lease is **generally** 99 years.*

**in general**

To or toward the inside of.

**in great measure**

To or toward the inside of.

**in the main**

To or toward the inside of.

mainly

For the most part.

*The west will be **mainly** dry.*

mostly

Usually; as a rule.

*The culprits are **mostly** but not exclusively male.*

**on the whole**

To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent ('whole' is often used informally for 'wholly').

overall

Taken as a whole; in all.

***Overall** 10 000 jobs will go.*

**predominantly**

Mainly; for the most part.

*It is **predominantly** a coastal bird.*

**preponderantly**

Much greater in number or influence.

primarily

For the most part.

*This is **primarily** a question of economics.*

**principally**

For the most part.

*He was **principally** a landscape painter.*

**substantially**

In a strong substantial way.

***Substantially** higher pension costs.*

**to a large extent**

At a distance, wide of something (as of a mark).





## Usage Examples of "Largely" as an adverb

- *He was soon arrested, largely through the efforts of Tom Poole.*
- *These accounts are largely inactive.*



## Associations of "Largely" (30 Words)

<b>accepted</b>	Generally believed or recognized to be valid or correct. <i>Several <b>accepted</b> techniques for treating the condition.</i>
<b>always</b>	Without interruption. <i>Isabel had <b>always</b> been in rude health.</i>
<b>basically</b>	In the most essential respects; fundamentally. <i>I <b>basically</b> played the same thing every night.</i>
<u><b>broadly</b></u>	Without regard to specific details or exceptions. <i>He interprets the law <b>broadly</b>.</i>
<u><b>chiefly</b></u>	For the most part. <i>An audience consisting <b>chiefly</b> of women between the ages of 18 and 54.</i>
<b>commonly</b>	Very often; frequently. <i>A <b>commonly</b> used industrial chemical.</i>

<u>consist</u>	Be consistent in form tenor or character be congruous. <i>What does love <b>consist</b> in.</i>
<u>essentially</u>	In essence; at bottom or by one's (or its) very nature. <i><b>Essentially</b> they are amateurs.</i>
<u>ever</u>	At all times all the time and on every occasion. <i>They lived happily <b>ever</b> after.</i>
<b>exceptionally</b>	To a greater degree than normal; unusually. <i>The court allows half an hour in most cases one hour <b>exceptionally</b> for a very important case.</i>
<u>generally</u>	In most cases; usually. <i><b>Generally</b> speaking things have been getting better.</i>
<b>habitually</b>	According to habit or custom. <i>He <b>habitually</b> carried a pocket knife.</i>
<b>irresistibly</b>	In a way that is too attractive and tempting to be resisted. <i>I am <b>irresistibly</b> reminded of the advice of a friend of mine.</i>
<u>mainly</u>	More than anything else. <i>He is <b>mainly</b> interested in butterflies.</i>
<u>mostly</u>	In large part; mainly or chiefly. <i>The culprits are <b>mostly</b> but not exclusively male.</i>
<u>normally</u>	Under normal conditions. <i><b>Normally</b> it takes three or four years to complete the training.</i>
<b>ordinarily</b>	In a normal way. <i>A person who is <b>ordinarily</b> resident in the United Kingdom.</i>
<u>originally</u>	Before now. <i>The suggestions so <b>originally</b> and persuasively outlined.</i>
<u>overwhelmingly</u>	Incapable of being resisted. <i>The candy looked <b>overwhelmingly</b> desirable to the dieting man.</i>
<b>pantechnicon</b>	A large moving van (especially one used for moving furniture).
<b>predominantly</b>	Much greater in number or influence. <i>The patients are <b>predominantly</b> indigenous.</i>
<u>primarily</u>	For the most part. <i>Around 80 per cent of personal computers are used <b>primarily</b> for word processing.</i>
<b>principal</b>	An actor who plays a principal role. <i>I was appointed <b>principal</b> of the new school.</i>
<b>principally</b>	For the most part. <i>He was <b>principally</b> a landscape painter.</i>



**public**

Open to or shared by all the people of an area or country.  
A **public** library.

**routinely**

Frequently and without proper consideration of the consequences.  
*Large scale producers **routinely** vaccinate their birds against the disease.*

**typically**

In most cases; usually.  
**Typically** she showed no alarm.

**universally**

Everywhere.  
*Progress is not always **universally** welcomed.*

**usually**

Under normal conditions.  
*Heat resistant paints are **usually** black or aluminium coloured.*

**wont**

(of a person) in the habit of doing something; accustomed.  
**Wont** thy heart to thoughts hereof.
