<a href="#">asterisk</a>	Mark with an asterisk. <i>He had <b>asterisked</b> the things about the case that still bothered him.</i>
<a href="#">connotation</a>	The abstract meaning or intension of a term, which forms a principle determining which objects or concepts it applies to. <i>The word discipline has unhappy <b>connotations</b> of punishment and repression.</i>
<b>context</b>	The circumstances that form the setting for an event, statement, or idea, and in terms of which it can be fully understood. <i>The proposals need to be considered in the <b>context</b> of new European directives.</i>
<a href="#">cryptic</a>	Having a secret or hidden meaning- John Gunther. <i><b>Cryptic</b> writings.</i>
<b>dah</b>	The longer of the two telegraphic signals used in Morse code. Read with difficulty.
<a href="#">decipher</a>	<i>Authorized government agencies can <b>decipher</b> encrypted telecommunications.</i>
<b>denotation</b>	The most direct or specific meaning of a word or expression; the class of objects that an expression refers to. <i>Beyond their immediate <b>denotation</b> the words have a connotative power.</i>
<b>egyptian</b>	Of or relating to or characteristic of Egypt or its people or their language.
<b>equivocally</b>	In an ambiguous manner.
<b>exclude</b>	Prevent from entering; shut out. <i>The cost for the trip <b>excludes</b> food and beverages.</i>
<a href="#">exhale</a>	Breathe out. <i>The chimney <b>exhales</b> a thick smoke.</i>
<a href="#">extrinsic</a>	Not forming an essential part of a thing or arising or originating from the outside. <i>That style is something <b>extrinsic</b> to the subject.</i>

<b>figurative</b>	Consisting of or forming human or animal figures. <i>The <b>figurative</b> art of the humanistic tradition.</i>
<b>glyph</b>	A hieroglyphic character or symbol. <i>Flanges painted with esoteric <b>glyphs</b>.</i>
<b>hieroglyph</b>	Writing that resembles hieroglyphics usually by being illegible. <i>The International Organisation for Standardization is introducing two new <b>hieroglyphs</b> to perplex washing machine owners.</i>
<b>home</b>	At or to or in the direction of one's home or family. <i>The floods forced many people to flee their <b>homes</b>.</i>
<b><u>import</u></b>	The action or process of importing goods or services. <i>Cheap <b>imports</b> from eastern Europe.</i>
<b>indication</b>	A reason to prescribe a drug or perform a procedure. <i>There were <b>indications</b> that it was time to leave.</i>
<b><u>interpret</u></b>	Give an interpretation or rendition of. <i><b>Interpreting</b> the music well takes hours of listening and experimentation.</i>
<b>literally</b>	Used for emphasis while not being literally true. <i>The driver took it <b>literally</b> when asked to go straight over the roundabout.</i>
<b>mark</b>	Make small marks into the surface of. <i><b>Mark</b> homework.</i>
<b>metaphorical</b>	Characteristic of or relating to metaphor; figurative. <i>Many of our <b>metaphorical</b> expressions develop from our perceptions of the body.</i>
<b>oracular</b>	Of or relating to an oracle. <i>An <b>oracular</b> message.</i>
<b><u>outside</u></b>	The region that is outside of something. <i>The <b>outside</b> world.</i>
<b>parenthesis</b>	A message that departs from the main subject. <i>The three months of coalition government were a lamentable political <b>parenthesis</b>.</i>
<b><u>semantic</u></b>	Relating to meaning in language or logic.
<b>significance</b>	The message that is intended or expressed or signified. <i>The <b>significance</b> of a red traffic light.</i>
<b>term</b>	Name formally or designate with a term. <i>The United States played a key role in prodding the two sides to come to <b>terms</b>.</i>
<b><u>text</u></b>	A textbook. <i>He took as his <b>text</b> the fact that Australia is paradise.</i>
