Definitions of "Lastly" as an adverb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “lastly” as an adverb can have the following definitions:

- *In the last place (used to introduce the last of a series of points or actions).*
- *The item at the end.*

Synonyms of "Lastly" as an adverb (9 Words)

finally	After an unspecified period of time or an especially long delay. <i>A referendum followed by local legislative and finally presidential elections.</i>
in closing	To or toward the inside of.
in conclusion	To or toward the inside of.
in drawing things to a close	To or toward the inside of.
in fine	To or toward the inside of.
in winding up	To or toward the inside of.

last	Especially in enumerating points lastly. <i>A woman last heard of in Cornwall.</i>
last but not least	The item at the end.
ultimately	As the end result of a succession or process. <i>The largest firms may ultimately become unstoppable.</i>

- *Lastly, I would like to thank my parents.*

Associations of "Lastly" (30 Words)

absolutely	(of a verb) without a stated object. <i>You re absolutely right.</i>
coda	A concluding event, remark, or section. <i>The first movement ends with a fortissimo coda.</i>
conclusion	A position or opinion or judgment reached after consideration. <i>Each research group came to a similar conclusion.</i>
conclusively	In a decisive way that has the effect of proving a case. <i>The story had been conclusively debunked.</i>
confront	Face up to and deal with (a problem or difficulty). <i>The two enemies finally confronted each other.</i>
decisively	With finality; conclusively. <i>I will come along she said decisively.</i>
end	Be the end of be the last or concluding part of. <i>To this end schools were set up for peasant women.</i>
epilogue	A section or speech at the end of a book or play that serves as a comment on or a conclusion to what has happened. <i>The epilogue told what eventually happened to the main characters.</i>
equally	To the same degree (often followed by `as). <i>They split their winnings equally.</i>
essential	(of a disease) with no known external stimulus or cause; idiopathic. <i>We only had the bare essentials in the way of equipment.</i>
eventually	After an unspecified period of time or an especially long delay. <i>Eventually after midnight I arrived at the hotel.</i>
extremity	The degree to which something is extreme. <i>The peninsula s western extremity.</i>

finale	The concluding part of any performance. <i>A fireworks finale.</i>
finally	Used to introduce a final point or reason. <i>Finally it is common knowledge that travel broadens the horizons.</i>
importantly	Used to emphasize a significant point. <i>More importantly Weber held that the manifold meaning attached to the event by the social scientist could alter his definition of the concrete event itself.</i>
last	The last person or thing the one occurring mentioned or acting after all others. <i>Whether they were accomplices in the last degree or a lesser one was to be determined individually.</i>
maybe	A mere possibility or probability. <i>Maybe I won't go back.</i>
noticeably	In a noticeable manner. <i>Chris was noticeably absent from this year's meeting.</i>
percent	A proportion in relation to a whole (which is usually the amount per hundred).
perhaps	By chance. <i>Would you perhaps consent to act as our guide.</i>
possibly	Used to emphasize that someone has or will put all their effort into something. <i>What can you possibly mean.</i>
probably	Almost certainly; as far as one knows or can tell. <i>He is probably out of the country.</i>
quite	Actually or truly or to an extreme. <i>I quite agree.</i>
reach	Reach a point in time or a certain state or level. <i>Reach me those glasses.</i>
really	Used as intensifiers real is sometimes used informally for really rattling is informal. <i>A really enjoyable evening.</i>
secondly	In the second place (used to introduce a second point or reason). <i>He was presented first of all as a hopelessly unqualified candidate and secondly as an extremist.</i>
significant	Suggesting a meaning or message that is not explicitly stated. <i>A significant increase in sales.</i>
significantly	In an important way or to an important degree. <i>He paused significantly.</i>

ultimately Finally; in the end.
***Ultimately** he had to give in.*

undeniably To an undeniable degree or in an undeniable manner.
*The results were **undeniably** impressive.*
