*A referendum followed by local legislative and **finally** presidential elections.*

#### **in closing**

To or toward the inside of.

#### **in conclusion**

To or toward the inside of.

#### **in drawing things to a close**

To or toward the inside of.

#### **in fine**

To or toward the inside of.

#### **in winding up**

To or toward the inside of.

<b>last</b>	Especially in enumerating points lastly. <i>A woman <b>last</b> heard of in Cornwall.</i>
<b>last but not least</b>	The item at the end.
<b>ultimately</b>	As the end result of a succession or process. <i>The largest firms may <b>ultimately</b> become unstoppable.</i>

## Associations of "Lastly" (30 Words)

<b>absolutely</b>	(of a verb) without a stated object. <i>You re <b>absolutely</b> right.</i>
<b>coda</b>	A concluding event, remark, or section. <i>The first movement ends with a fortissimo <b>coda</b>.</i>
<b>conclusion</b>	A position or opinion or judgment reached after consideration. <i>Each research group came to a similar <b>conclusion</b>.</i>
<b>conclusively</b>	In a decisive way that has the effect of proving a case. <i>The story had been <b>conclusively</b> debunked.</i>
<b>confront</b>	Face up to and deal with (a problem or difficulty). <i>The two enemies finally <b>confronted</b> each other.</i>
<b>decisively</b>	With finality; conclusively. <i>I will come along she said <b>decisively</b>.</i>
<b>end</b>	Be the end of be the last or concluding part of. <i>To this <b>end</b> schools were set up for peasant women.</i>
<b>epilogue</b>	A section or speech at the end of a book or play that serves as a comment on or a conclusion to what has happened. <i>The <b>epilogue</b> told what eventually happened to the main characters.</i>
<b>equally</b>	To the same degree (often followed by `as). <i>They split their winnings <b>equally</b>.</i>
<b>essential</b>	(of a disease) with no known external stimulus or cause; idiopathic. <i>We only had the bare <b>essentials</b> in the way of equipment.</i>
<b>eventually</b>	After an unspecified period of time or an especially long delay. <i><b>Eventually</b> after midnight I arrived at the hotel.</i>
<b>extremity</b>	The degree to which something is extreme. <i>The peninsula s western <b>extremity</b>.</i>

<b>finale</b>	The concluding part of any performance. <i>A fireworks <b>finale</b>.</i>
<b>finally</b>	Used to introduce a final point or reason. <i><b>Finally</b> it is common knowledge that travel broadens the horizons.</i>
<b>importantly</b>	Used to emphasize a significant point. <i>More <b>importantly</b> Weber held that the manifold meaning attached to the event by the social scientist could alter his definition of the concrete event itself.</i>
<b>last</b>	The last person or thing the one occurring mentioned or acting after all others. <i>Whether they were accomplices in the <b>last</b> degree or a lesser one was to be determined individually.</i>
<b>maybe</b>	A mere possibility or probability. <i><b>Maybe</b> I won't go back.</i>
<b>noticeably</b>	In a noticeable manner. <i>Chris was <b>noticeably</b> absent from this year's meeting.</i>
<b>percent</b>	A proportion in relation to a whole (which is usually the amount per hundred).
<b>perhaps</b>	By chance. <i>Would you <b>perhaps</b> consent to act as our guide.</i>
<b>possibly</b>	Used to emphasize that someone has or will put all their effort into something. <i>What can you <b>possibly</b> mean.</i>
<b>probably</b>	Almost certainly; as far as one knows or can tell. <i>He is <b>probably</b> out of the country.</i>
<b>quite</b>	Actually or truly or to an extreme. <i>I <b>quite</b> agree.</i>
<b>reach</b>	Reach a point in time or a certain state or level. <i><b>Reach</b> me those glasses.</i>
<b>really</b>	Used as intensifiers real is sometimes used informally for really rattling is informal. <i>A <b>really</b> enjoyable evening.</i>
<b>secondly</b>	In the second place (used to introduce a second point or reason). <i>He was presented first of all as a hopelessly unqualified candidate and <b>secondly</b> as an extremist.</i>
<b>significant</b>	Suggesting a meaning or message that is not explicitly stated. <i>A <b>significant</b> increase in sales.</i>
<b>significantly</b>	In an important way or to an important degree. <i>He paused <b>significantly</b>.</i>

**ultimately** Finally; in the end.  
***Ultimately** he had to give in.*

**undeniably** To an undeniable degree or in an undeniable manner.  
*The results were **undeniably** impressive.*
