#### Definitions of "Laughable" as an adjective

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "laughable" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- Incongruous; inviting ridicule.
- Arousing or provoking laughter.
- So ludicrous as to be amusing.
- So unreasonable as to invite derision.

#### Synonyms of "Laughable" as an adjective (23 Words)

absurd	So unreasonable as to invite derision. It may look <b>absurd</b> but having a treadmill desk could improve your attention span.
amusing	Providing enjoyment; pleasantly entertaining. An <b>amusing</b> speaker.
cockeyed	Turned or twisted toward one side- G.K.Chesterton. Do you expect us to believe a <b>cockeyed</b> story like that.



comic	Causing or meant to cause laughter. <i>Comic</i> drama.
comical	Amusing, especially in a ludicrous or absurd way. A <b>comical</b> look of surprise.
derisory	Ridiculously small or inadequate. They were given a <b>derisory</b> pay rise.
<u>diverting</u>	Entertaining or amusing. A <b>diverting</b> story.
droll	Comical in an odd or whimsical manner. A <b>droll</b> little man with a quiet tongue in cheek kind of humor.
<u>entertaining</u>	Agreeably diverting. An <b>entertaining</b> puppet show.
farcical	Relating to or resembling farce, especially because of absurd or ridiculous aspects. The wild <b>farcical</b> exuberance of a clown.
funny	Arousing or provoking laughter. There was something <b>funny</b> going on.
<u>hilarious</u>	Marked by or causing boisterous merriment or convulsive laughter. <i>Hilarious</i> broad comedy.
humorous	Causing laughter and amusement; comic. <i>Humorous</i> stories.
<u>idiotic</u>	Insanely irresponsible. An <b>idiotic</b> idea.
<u>irrational</u>	Of a number quantity or expression not expressible as a ratio of two integers and having an infinite and non recurring expansion when expressed as a decimal Examples of irrational numbers are the number and the square root of 2. <i>Irrational feelings of hostility.</i>
ludicrous	So unreasonable as to invite derision. <i>Ludicrous</i> green hair.
mirthful	Full of or showing high-spirited merriment. A <b>mirthful</b> laugh.
nonsensical	Ridiculously impractical or ill-advised. A <b>nonsensical</b> argument.
preposterous	So unreasonable as to invite derision. A <b>preposterous</b> attempt to turn back the pages of history.



ridiculous	Broadly or extravagantly humorous; resembling farce. <i>That <b>ridiculous</b> tartan cap.</i>
risible	Provoking laughter through being ludicrous. <i>Risible courtroom antics.</i>
uproarious	Characterized by or provoking loud noise or uproar. An <b>uproarious</b> party.

worthy of scorn Having worth or merit or value; being honorable or admirable.

### Usage Examples of "Laughable" as an adjective

- It would have been laughable if it hadn't hurt so much.
- If it didn't make me so angry it would be laughable.
- A contribution so small as to be laughable.

absurd	An absurd state of affairs. The incidents that followed bordered on the <b>absurd</b> .
amusing	Causing laughter and providing entertainment. An <b>amusing</b> film with a steady stream of pranks and pratfalls.
<u>comedy</u>	The style or genre represented by comedy films plays and broadcast programmes. <i>Satiric comedy.</i>
comical	Amusing, especially in a ludicrous or absurd way. A <b>comical</b> look of surprise.
derisive	Expressing contempt or ridicule. <i>He gave a harsh <b>derisive</b> laugh.</i>
droll	Curious or unusual in a way that provokes dry amusement. <i>His unique brand of <b>droll</b> self mockery.</i>
<u>entertaining</u>	Providing amusement or enjoyment. A charming and <b>entertaining</b> companion.
<u>exhilaration</u>	The feeling of lively and cheerful joy. <i>They felt the <b>exhilaration</b> of victory.</i>
farcical	Relating to or resembling farce, especially because of absurd or ridiculous aspects. The wild <b>farcical</b> exuberance of a clown.



fun	A source of fun. The column s just a bit of <b>fun</b> .
funny	Arousing or provoking laughter. Suddenly my stomach felt <b>funny</b> .
<u>goofy</u>	A cartoon character created by Walt Disney. Wore a <b>goofy</b> hat.
<u>hilarious</u>	Extremely amusing. <i>Her <b>hilarious</b> novel.</i>
humor	The trait of appreciating and being able to express the humorous. You can t survive in the army without a sense of <b>humor</b> .
humorous	Causing laughter and amusement; comic. In a <b>humorous</b> vein.
<u>idiotic</u>	So unreasonable as to invite derision. I was able to hum its <b>idiotic</b> theme tune.
jesting	Characterized by jokes and good humor. Laughing and <b>jesting</b> were out of the question.
jocose	Playful or humorous. A <b>jocose</b> allusion.
jocular	Characterized by jokes and good humor. They tried to deal with this painful subject <b>jocular</b> ly.
<u>ludicrous</u>	So foolish, unreasonable, or out of place as to be amusing. <i>Ludicrous</i> green hair.
preposterous	Contrary to reason or common sense; utterly absurd or ridiculous. A <b>preposterous</b> suggestion.
<u>quirky</u>	(informal) strikingly unconventional. Her sense of humour was decidedly <b>quirky</b> .
repartee	Conversation or speech characterized by quick, witty comments or replies. <i>Quick fire <b>repartee</b></i> .
ridiculous	So unreasonable as to invite derision. That <b>ridiculous</b> tartan cap.
risible	Arousing or provoking laughter. A <b>risible</b> scene of lovemaking in a tent.
satiric	Exposing human folly to ridicule. A persistent campaign of mockery by the <b>satiric</b> al fortnightly magazine.
skit	A short comedy sketch or piece of humorous writing, especially a parody. Students will create <b>skit</b> s about bullying and go to each elementary school to perform them.



slapstick	Acoustic device consisting of two paddles hinged together; used by an actor to make a loud noise without inflicting injury when striking someone. <i>Slapstick</i> style of humor.
<u>whimsical</u>	Acting or behaving in a capricious manner. The <b>whimsical</b> arbitrariness of autocracy.
<u>witty</u>	Showing or characterized by quick and inventive verbal humour. <i>His sermons were unpredictably</i> <b>witty</b> and satirical as well as eloquent.
