Associations of "Laughed" (30 Words)

amusement	An activity that is diverting and that holds the attention. <i>An evening s amusement.</i>
badinage	Frivolous banter. <i>He developed a nice line in badinage with the Labour leader.</i>
banter	Light teasing repartee. <i>The men bantered with the waitresses.</i>
buffoonery	Acting like a clown or buffoon. <i>The film is full of wordplay and buffoonery.</i>
comedy	The style or genre represented by comedy films plays and broadcast programmes. <i>Satiric comedy.</i>
exhilaration	A feeling of excitement, happiness, or elation. <i>They felt the exhilaration of victory.</i>
fun	A source of fun. <i>Being on set with the cast and crew was really fun.</i>
funny	Unusual, especially in such a way as to arouse suspicion. <i>Up to some funny business.</i>
gaiety	A gay feeling. <i>He seemed to be a part of the gaiety having a wonderful time.</i>
glee	A song for men’s voices in three or more parts, usually unaccompanied, of a type popular especially c.1750–1830. <i>His face lit up with impish glee.</i>
hilarious	Boisterously merry. <i>The meal was noisy and hilarious.</i>
hilarity	Boisterous merriment. <i>By midnight the hilarity had increased.</i>

humor	The trait of appreciating and being able to express the humorous. <i>She didn't appreciate my humor.</i>
humorous	Full of or characterized by humor. <i>A humorous and entertaining talk.</i>
humour	The ability to express humour or amuse other people. <i>His tales are full of humour.</i>
jape	Say or do something in jest or mockery. <i>The childish jape of depositing a stink bomb in her locker.</i>
jest	Act in a funny or teasing way. <i>He laughed uproariously at his own jest.</i>
jocose	Characterized by jokes and good humor. <i>A jocose allusion.</i>
jocular	Fond of or characterized by joking; humorous or playful. <i>She sounded in a jocular mood.</i>
joke	Tell a joke speak humorously. <i>She could laugh and joke with her colleagues.</i>
jolly	To a moderately sufficient extent or degree. <i>The jolly crowd at the reunion.</i>
laughing	Showing or feeling mirth or pleasure or happiness. <i>Laughing children.</i>
merry	Slightly and good-humouredly drunk. <i>A merry evening.</i>
mirth	Amusement, especially as expressed in laughter. <i>His six foot frame shook with mirth.</i>
repartee	Conversation or speech characterized by quick, witty comments or replies. <i>Quick fire repartee.</i>
simper	Smile affectedly or derisively. <i>She simpered looking pleased with herself.</i>
slapstick	A boisterous comedy with chases and collisions and practical jokes. <i>Slapstick humour.</i>
smile	Express with a smile. <i>She greeted us all with a smile.</i>
snicker	A half-suppressed, typically scornful laugh; a snigger. <i>She is a woman they all love to snicker at.</i>
witticism	A witty remark. <i>Maurice roared with laughter at his own witticisms.</i>
