lucullan	Characterized by extravagance and profusion. <i>A lucullan feast.</i>
<u>lush</u>	Tender and full of juice. <i>Lush fruits.</i>
luxuriant	Produced or growing in extreme abundance. <i>She tossed her luxuriant dark hair.</i>
<u>luxurious</u>	Displaying luxury and furnishing gratification to the senses. <i>The island's most luxurious hotel.</i>
munificent	Very generous. <i>A munificent patron of the arts.</i>
<u>opulent</u>	Wealthy. <i>His more opulent tenants.</i>
<u>ornate</u>	Marked by elaborate rhetoric and elaborated with decorative details-John Milton. <i>An ornate wrought iron railing.</i>
overgenerous	Very generous. <i>She was not overgenerous with praise.</i>
plentiful	Producing in abundance. <i>Coal is cheap and plentiful.</i>
plush	Characterized by extravagance and profusion. <i>A plush Mayfair flat.</i>
plushy	Characterized by extravagance and profusion. <i>Her heels sank into the plushy carpet.</i>

profuse	Produced or growing in extreme abundance. <i>They are profuse in hospitality.</i>
prolific	Present in large numbers or quantities; plentiful. <i>A prolific goalscorer.</i>
regal	Belonging to or befitting a supreme ruler. <i>Her regal bearing.</i>
rich	Marked by richness and fullness of flavor. <i>A rich gas mixture.</i>
