### Definitions of "Laws" as a noun

- *A rule or body of rules of conduct inherent in human nature and essential to or binding upon human society.*
- *The first of three divisions of the Hebrew Scriptures comprising the first five books of the Hebrew Bible considered as a unit.*
- *The force of policemen and officers.*
- *Legal document setting forth rules governing a particular kind of activity.*
- *A generalization that describes recurring facts or events in nature.*
- *The learned profession that is mastered by graduate study in a law school and that is responsible for the judicial system.*
- *The collection of rules imposed by authority.*
- *The branch of philosophy concerned with the law and the principles that lead courts to make the decisions they do.*

<b>enactment</b>	The controlled expression and acceptance of repressed emotions or impulses in behaviour during therapy. <i>The story becomes an <b>enactment</b> of his fantasies.</i>
<b>felony</b>	A serious crime (such as murder or arson). <i>An accusation of <b>felony</b>.</i>
<b>illegal</b>	Contrary to or forbidden by law, especially criminal law. <i><b>Illegal</b> drugs.</i>
<b>indict</b>	Accuse formally of a crime. <i>His former manager was <b>indicted</b> for fraud.</i>
<b>judicial</b>	Belonging or appropriate to the office of a judge. <i><b>Judicial</b> system.</i>
<b>jurisdiction</b>	A system of law courts; a judicature. <i>Several different tax <b>jurisdictions</b>.</i>
<b>killing</b>	An act of causing death, especially deliberately. <i>A <b>killing</b> disease.</i>
<b>lawsuit</b>	A comprehensive term for any proceeding in a court of law whereby an individual seeks a legal remedy. <i>His lawyer filed a <b>lawsuit</b> against Los Angeles city.</i>
<b>lawyer</b>	Practise law work as a lawyer. <i><b>Lawyering</b> is a craft that takes a long time to become proficient at.</i>
<b>legal</b>	Relating to theological legalism. <i>The European <b>legal</b> system.</i>
<b>legitimately</b>	In a way that can be defended with logic or justification; fairly. <i>Nobody can <b>legitimately</b> argue that he didn't pay his dues.</i>
<b>liability</b>	A thing for which someone is responsible, especially an amount of money owed. <i>She said the party had become a <b>liability</b> to green politics.</i>
<b>litigation</b>	The process of taking legal action. <i>The company wishes to avoid <b>litigation</b>.</i>
<b>malpractice</b>	A wrongful act that the actor had no right to do; improper professional conduct. <i>Victims of medical <b>malpractice</b>.</i>
<b>penalty</b>	A punishment imposed for breaking a law, rule, or contract. <i>The charge carries a maximum <b>penalty</b> of ten years imprisonment.</i>

<b>plaintiff</b>	A person who brings a case against another in a court of law. <i>The <b>plaintiff</b> commenced an action for damages.</i>
<b>probate</b>	The act of proving that an instrument purporting to be a will was signed and executed in accord with legal requirements. <i>The house has been valued for <b>probate</b>.</i>
<b>proceeding</b>	(law) the institution of a sequence of steps by which legal judgments are invoked.
<b>tort</b>	A wrongful act or an infringement of a right (other than under contract) leading to legal liability. <i>The law of <b>tort</b>.</i>
<b>trial</b>	Of a horse dog or other animal compete in trials. <i>Teachers all over the UK are <b>trailing</b> the materials.</i>
<b>valid</b>	(of an argument or point) having a sound basis in logic or fact; reasonable or cogent. <i>A <b>valid</b> argument.</i>
<b>verdict</b>	The findings of a jury on issues of fact submitted to it for decision; can be used in formulating a judgment. <i>This seems a fair <b>verdict</b> on the tabloids.</i>
<b>wanted</b>	Characterized by feeling or showing fond affection for. <i>So good to feel <b>wanted</b>.</i>
