Lawyer as a Noun

Definitions of "Lawyer" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “lawyer” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A professional person authorized to practice law; conducts lawsuits or gives legal advice.*
- *A person who practises or studies law, especially (in the UK) a solicitor or a barrister or (in the US) an attorney.*



Synonyms of "Lawyer" as a noun (3 Words)

agent

Any agent or representative of a federal agency or bureau.
*His **agent** was able to negotiate a long term contract.*

attorney

A solicitor.

member of the bar The male organ of copulation ('member' is a euphemism.)



Associations of "Lawyer" (30 Words)

acquittal	A judgment of not guilty. <i>The trial resulted in an acquittal.</i>
appeal	Make a serious, urgent, or heartfelt request. <i>The range of topics will appeal to youngsters.</i>
appellate	Of or relating to or taking account of appeals (usually legal appeals). <i>Appellate court.</i>
ask	Require or ask for as a price or condition. <i>This job asks a lot of patience and skill.</i>
attorney	A professional person authorized to practice law; conducts lawsuits or gives legal advice.

barrister	A person called to the bar and entitled to practise as an advocate, particularly in the higher courts.
client	A dependant; a hanger-on. <i>Workstation clients are going to be easy to install.</i>
counselor	A lawyer who pleads cases in court.
court	The courtiers retinue and household of a sovereign. <i>The house was built around an inner court.</i>
diplomatist	An official engaged in international negotiations.
disbar	Expel (a barrister) from the Bar, so that they no longer have the right to practise law. <i>Competitors wearing rings will be disbarred from competition.</i>
entreaty	An earnest or humble request. <i>An entreaty to stop the fighting.</i>
exhortation	The act of exhorting; an earnest attempt at persuasion. <i>No amount of exhortation had any effect.</i>
<u>indict</u>	Formally accuse of or charge with a crime. <i>His former manager was indicted for fraud.</i>
judicial	Expressing careful judgment-Tyler Dennett. <i>A judicial system.</i>
juror	Someone who serves (or waits to be called to serve) on a jury.
jury	A body of people selected to judge a competition. <i>The jury returned unanimous guilty verdicts.</i>
legal	Having legal efficacy or force. <i>He claimed that it had all been legal.</i>
malpractice	A wrongful act that the actor had no right to do; improper professional conduct. <i>The widow sued his surgeon for malpractice.</i>
mistrial	A trial rendered invalid through an error in the proceedings. <i>The judge dismissed the charge and declared a mistrial.</i>
paralegal	A person trained in subsidiary legal matters but not fully qualified as a lawyer.
<u>petition</u>	Write a petition for something to somebody request formally and in writing. <i>A Highland chief petitioned her father for her hand in marriage.</i>
<u>plead</u>	Make an allegation in an action or other legal proceeding especially answer the previous pleading of the other party by denying facts therein stated or by alleging new facts. <i>She was pleading insanity.</i>

probate	Put a convicted person on probation by suspending his sentence. <i>She has been granted a probate to execute her late father s estate.</i>
proposal	The act of making a proposal. <i>Surely a woman as beautiful as you has had proposals.</i>
prosecutor	A person, especially a public official, who institutes legal proceedings against someone. <i>Prosecutors are fully entitled to bring any number of offences against a single defendant.</i>
solicitor	A member of the legal profession qualified to deal with conveyancing the drawing up of wills and other legal matters A solicitor may also instruct barristers and represent clients in some courts. <i>She had been a telephone solicitor for a Chicago newspaper.</i>
supplicate	Make a humble, earnest petition. <i>He supplicated the King for clemency.</i>
trial	Of a horse dog or other animal compete in trials. <i>He had a fair trial and the jury found him guilty.</i>
verdict	A decision on an issue of fact in a civil or criminal case or an inquest. <i>The jury returned a verdict of not guilty.</i>
