make-up	An event that is substituted for a previously cancelled event.
order	An institution founded by a monarch along the lines of a medieval crusading monastic order for the purpose of honouring meritorious conduct. <i>They were dedicated to overthrowing the established order.</i>
orderliness	A condition of regular or proper arrangement.
organization	The act of organizing a business or an activity related to a business. <i>The organization of conferences.</i>
planning	The act or process of drawing up plans or layouts for some project or enterprise. <i>Planning applications.</i>
presentation	A visual representation of something. <i>All patients in this group were symptomatic at initial presentation.</i>
proportion	Harmonious arrangement or relation of parts or elements within a whole (as in a design)- John Ruskin. <i>A building of vast proportions.</i>
shape	The state of good health especially in the phrases in condition or in shape or out of condition or out of shape. <i>She liked the shape of his nose.</i>
structure	The people in a society considered as a system organized by a characteristic pattern of relationships. <i>The station is a magnificent structure and should not be demolished.</i>
style	In an invertebrate a small slender pointed appendage a stylet. <i>Different styles of management.</i>
symmetry	(physics) the property of being isotropic; having the same value when measured in different directions. <i>This series has a line of symmetry through its centre.</i>
system	A set of staves in a musical score joined by a brace. <i>In a static system oil cannot be replaced by water on a surface.</i>

An arrangement of troops.
*He was clothed in fine **array**.*

cloy	Disgust or sicken (someone) with an excess of sweetness, richness, or sentiment. <i>Too much spicy food cloyed his appetite.</i>
<u>configuration</u>	An arrangement of parts or elements in a particular form, figure, or combination. <i>The broad configuration of the economy remains capitalist.</i>
dimensional	Having dimension—the quality or character or stature proper to a person. <i>Well rounded fully dimensional characters.</i>
discharge	Go off or discharge. <i>The eyes and nose began to discharge.</i>
dispensable	Able to be replaced or done without; superfluous. <i>The captain's loss of form made him dispensable.</i>
display	Attract attention by displaying some body part or posing of animals. <i>Every clansman was determined to outdo the Campbells in display.</i>
<u>excess</u>	Excessive indulgence. <i>Trying to lose excess weight.</i>
exhibit	An exhibition. <i>He exhibits a great talent.</i>
extra	Excessive or extravagant. <i>An extra pair of shoes.</i>
extraneous	Coming from the outside. <i>When the transmitter pack is turned off no extraneous noise is heard.</i>
<u>gallery</u>	A balcony or upper floor projecting from an interior back or side wall of a hall or church, providing space for an audience or musicians. <i>An art gallery.</i>
glut	Overeat or eat immodestly; make a pig of oneself. <i>He planned a treacherous murder to glut his desire for revenge.</i>
grid	A grid of regular squares on a map that are marked with numbers or letters to enable a place to be precisely located. <i>The fen is gridded by intersecting dykes.</i>
needless	(of something undesirable) not necessary because avoidable. <i>I deplore needless waste.</i>
oversupply	An excessive supply. <i>Oversupply causes prices to fall.</i>
permissive	Denoting a path available for public use by the landowner's consent, not as a legal right of way. <i>Permissive parents.</i>

planned	Planned in advance. <i>The planned outlays for new equipment.</i>
plethora	An excess of a bodily fluid, particularly blood. <i>Allen won a plethora of medals during his illustrious career.</i>
redundance	The attribute of being superfluous and unneeded.
redundancy	The state of being no longer in employment because there is no more work available. <i>The use of industrial robots created redundancy among workers.</i>
redundant	(of words or data) able to be omitted without loss of meaning or function. <i>The modules are linked using a redundant fibre optic cable.</i>
supererogatory	More than is needed, desired, or required. <i>It was supererogatory of her to gloat.</i>
superfluity	An unnecessarily or excessively large amount or number of something. <i>They thought the garrison a superfluity.</i>
superfluous	More than is needed, desired, or required. <i>The purchaser should avoid asking for superfluous information.</i>
supernumerary	A supernumerary person or thing. <i>Books were obviously supernumerary and he began jettisoning them.</i>
surfeit	Supply or feed to surfeit. <i>A surfeit of food and drink.</i>
surplus	An amount of something left over when requirements have been met; an excess of production or supply. <i>The firm told 284 employees that they were surplus to requirements.</i>
unnecessary	Unnecessary things. <i>Some people feel that holiday insurance is unnecessary.</i>
