- A class or category of quality or excellence.
- An agreement or alliance.

<b>affiliation</b>	The state or process of affiliating or being affiliated. <i>Welcomed the <b>affiliation</b> of the research center with the university.</i>
<b>alliance</b>	The act of forming an alliance or confederation. <i>A defensive <b>alliance</b> between Australia and New Zealand.</i>
<b>association</b>	The action of making a mental connection. <i>His <b>association</b> of his father with being beaten was too strong to break.</i>
<b>band</b>	An adornment consisting of a strip of a contrasting color or material. <i>A narrow <b>band</b> of gold was her only jewellery.</i>
<b>category</b>	A collection of things sharing a common attribute. <i>The various <b>categories</b> of research.</i>

- championship** The position or title of the winner of a championship contest.  
*A **championship** course.*
- circle** Something approximating the shape of a circle.  
*They had excellent seats in the dress **circle**.*
- class** A principal taxonomic grouping that ranks above order and below phylum or division, such as Mammalia or Insecta.  
*I was late for a **class**.*
- coalition** A temporary alliance for combined action, especially of political parties forming a government.  
*They had a taste of government in **coalition** with the Social Democrats.*
- combine** A consortium of independent organizations formed to limit competition by controlling the production and distribution of a product or service.  
*One of the world's biggest food and personal products **combines**.*
- compact** A mass of powdered metal compacted together in preparation for sintering.  
*Strength is then introduced by infiltrating glass into the **compact**.*
- competition** Interaction between animal or plant species, or individual organisms, that are attempting to gain a share of a limited environmental resource.  
*The **competition** for university places is greater than ever this year.*
- confederacy** A league or alliance, especially of confederate states.  
*The Yakuza is a secret **confederacy** of criminal fraternities.*
- confederation** The act of forming an alliance or confederation.  
*Canada became a **confederation** in 1867.*
- conference** A prearranged meeting for consultation or exchange of information or discussion (especially one with a formal agenda).  
*An international authority or if that was not possible a regional operators **conference**.*
- conglomerate** A thing consisting of a number of different and distinct parts or items that are grouped together.  
*The sediments vary from coarse **conglomerate** to fine silt and clay.*
- consortium** An association of companies for some definite purpose.  
*The amount awarded for loss of **consortium** must be included.*
- contest** An occasion on which a winner is selected from among two or more contestants.  
*A leadership **contest**.*



<u>cooperative</u>	<p>A jointly owned commercial enterprise (usually organized by farmers or consumers) that produces and distributes goods and services and is run for the benefit of its owners. <i>We run the agency as a workers <b>cooperative</b>.</i></p>
<b>corporation</b>	<p>A business firm whose articles of incorporation have been approved in some state. <i>Multinational <b>corporations</b>.</i></p>
<u>federation</u>	<p>A group of states with a central government but independence in internal affairs. <i>A first step in the <b>federation</b> of Europe.</i></p>
<b>fellowship</b>	<p>The status of a fellow of a college or society. <i>They valued fun and good <b>fellowship</b> as the cement of the community.</i></p>
<b>group</b>	<p>Two or more figures or objects forming a design. <i>A methyl <b>group</b>.</i></p>
<u>guild</u>	<p>A formal association of people with similar interests.</p>
<b>level</b>	<p>A horizontal plane or line with respect to the distance above or below a given point. <i>Park the car on the <b>level</b>.</i></p>
<b>level of ability</b>	<p>A flat surface at right angles to a plumb line.</p>
<b>partnership</b>	<p>The members of a business venture created by contract. <i>She will be eligible for a <b>partnership</b> after a few years.</i></p>
<b>ring</b>	<p>The sound of a bell ringing. <i>A <b>ring</b> of ships in the harbor.</i></p>
<u>syndicate</u>	<p>A group of individuals or organizations combined to promote a common interest. <i>A crime <b>syndicate</b>.</i></p>
<u>union</u>	<p>A trade union. <i>The <b>union</b> of opposing factions.</i></p>

## Synonyms of "League" as a verb (14 Words)

### affiliate

Officially attach or connect (a subsidiary group or a person) to an organization.

*She **affiliates** with her colleagues.*

### ally

Become an ally or associate as by a treaty or marriage.

*He **allied** himself with the forces of change.*

### **amalgamate**

Alloy (a metal) with mercury.

*He **amalgamated** his company with another.*

### **band together**

Bind or tie together, as with a band.

### **collaborate**

Work jointly on an activity or project.

*He **collaborated** with the Nazis when they occupied Paris.*

### **combine**

Combine so as to form a whole mix.

*Oxygen **combines** with haemoglobin.*

### confederate

Form a group or unite.

*The treaty **confederated** the fourteen tribes.*

<b>form a federation</b>	Assume a form or shape.
<b>form an association</b>	Make something, usually for a specific function.
<b>join forces</b>	Become part of; become a member of a group or organization.
<b>join together</b>	Make contact or come together.
<b>join up</b>	Cause to become joined or linked.
<b>team up</b>	Form a team.
<b>unite</b>	Be or become joined or united or linked. <i>He called on the party to <b>unite</b>.</i>

## Associations of "League" (30 Words)

<b><u>affiliate</u></b>	A subordinate or subsidiary associate a person who is affiliated with another or with an organization. <i>The two colleges <b>affiliated</b>.</i>
<b>affiliation</b>	A social or business relationship. <i>A valuable financial <b>affiliation</b>.</i>
<b>alliance</b>	The act of forming an alliance or confederation. <i>An <b>alliance</b> between medicine and morality.</i>
<b><u>ally</u></b>	A state formally cooperating with another for a military or other purpose. <i>He s a good <b>ally</b> in fight.</i>



<b>association</b>	A mental connection between things. <i>The word bureaucracy has unpleasant <b>associations</b>.</i>
<b>club</b>	Gather into a club like mass. <i>He joined a golf <b>club</b>.</i>
<b>coalescence</b>	The joining or merging of elements to form one mass or whole. <i>The lack of <b>coalescence</b> among fields of science.</i>
<b>coalition</b>	A temporary alliance for combined action, especially of political parties forming a government. <i>A <b>coalition</b> between Liberals and Conservatives.</i>
<b>collaboration</b>	Something produced in collaboration with someone. <i>He wrote a book in <b>collaboration</b> with his son.</i>
<b>combination</b>	A sequence of numbers or letters used to open a combination lock. <i>The <b>combination</b> of recession and falling property values proved fatal to the business community.</i>
<b>committee</b>	In the UK the whole House of Commons when sitting as a committee. <i>A <b>committee</b> is a group that keeps minutes and loses hours.</i>
<b>confederacy</b>	The southern states that seceded from the United States in 1861. <i>The Italian <b>confederacy</b> known as the Lombard League.</i>
<b>confederation</b>	The act of forming an alliance or confederation. <i>Canada became a <b>confederation</b> in 1867.</i>
<b>conjugate</b>	A mixture of two partially miscible liquids A and B produces two conjugate solutions one of A in B and another of B in A. <i><b>Conjugate</b> the verb.</i>
<b>consolidation</b>	The action or process of combining a number of financial accounts or funds into a single overall account or set of accounts. <i>He dropped the <b>consolidation</b> into the acid bath.</i>
<b>cooperation</b>	Joint operation or action. <i>Economic <b>cooperation</b>.</i>
<b>federation</b>	A group of states with a central government but independence in internal affairs. <i>A first step in the <b>federation</b> of Europe.</i>
<b>fusion</b>	The combining of images from the two eyes to form a single visual percept. <i>A <b>fusion</b> reactor.</i>
<b>group</b>	Form a group or group together. <i>I now belong to my local drama <b>group</b>.</i>
<b>guild</b>	An association of people for mutual aid or the pursuit of a common goal.

<b>member</b>	The male organ of copulation member is a euphemism. <i>The EU s <b>member</b> countries.</i>
<b>membership</b>	The members or the number of members in a group. <i>A <b>membership</b> card.</i>
<u><b>national</b></u>	Of or relating to nationality. <i>The <b>national</b> highway system.</i>
<u><b>reunion</b></u>	The action of being brought together again as a unified whole. <i>A school <b>reunion</b>.</i>
<b>society</b>	A specified section of society. <i>The ethnic diversity of British <b>society</b>.</i>
<b>synthesis</b>	The process of producing a chemical compound (usually by the union of simpler chemical compounds). <i>The <b>synthesis</b> of intellect and emotion in his work.</i>
<b>team</b>	Come together as a team to achieve a common goal. <i><b>Team</b> members.</i>
<u><b>unify</b></u>	Join or combine. <i>The government hoped to centralize and <b>unify</b> the nation.</i>
<u><b>union</b></u>	A trade union. <i>A <b>union</b> shop clause in the contract.</i>
<u><b>united</b></u>	Of or relating to two people who are married to each other. <i>Presented a <b>united</b> front.</i>
