affiliation	The state or process of affiliating or being affiliated. <i>Welcomed the affiliation of the research center with the university.</i>
alliance	The act of forming an alliance or confederation. <i>A defensive alliance between Australia and New Zealand.</i>
association	The action of making a mental connection. <i>His association of his father with being beaten was too strong to break.</i>
band	An adornment consisting of a strip of a contrasting color or material. <i>A narrow band of gold was her only jewellery.</i>
category	A collection of things sharing a common attribute. <i>The various categories of research.</i>

championship	The position or title of the winner of a championship contest. <i>A championship course.</i>
<u>circle</u>	Something approximating the shape of a circle. <i>They had excellent seats in the dress circle.</i>
class	A principal taxonomic grouping that ranks above order and below phylum or division, such as Mammalia or Insecta. <i>I was late for a class.</i>
<u>coalition</u>	A temporary alliance for combined action, especially of political parties forming a government. <i>They had a taste of government in coalition with the Social Democrats.</i>
combine	A consortium of independent organizations formed to limit competition by controlling the production and distribution of a product or service. <i>One of the world s biggest food and personal products combines.</i>
<u>compact</u>	A mass of powdered metal compacted together in preparation for sintering. <i>Strength is then introduced by infiltrating glass into the compact.</i>
competition	Interaction between animal or plant species, or individual organisms, that are attempting to gain a share of a limited environmental resource. <i>The competition for university places is greater than ever this year.</i>
confederacy	A league or alliance, especially of confederate states. <i>The Yakuza is a secret confederacy of criminal fraternities.</i>
<u>confederation</u>	The act of forming an alliance or confederation. <i>Canada became a confederation in 1867.</i>
<u>conference</u>	A prearranged meeting for consultation or exchange of information or discussion (especially one with a formal agenda). <i>An international authority or if that was not possible a regional operators conference.</i>
conglomerate	A thing consisting of a number of different and distinct parts or items that are grouped together. <i>The sediments vary from coarse conglomerate to fine silt and clay.</i>
<u>consortium</u>	An association of companies for some definite purpose. <i>The amount awarded for loss of consortium must be included.</i>
<u>contest</u>	An occasion on which a winner is selected from among two or more contestants. <i>A leadership contest.</i>

<u>cooperative</u>	<p>A jointly owned commercial enterprise (usually organized by farmers or consumers) that produces and distributes goods and services and is run for the benefit of its owners.</p> <p><i>We run the agency as a workers cooperative.</i></p>
corporation	<p>A business firm whose articles of incorporation have been approved in some state.</p> <p><i>Multinational corporations.</i></p>
<u>federation</u>	<p>A group of states with a central government but independence in internal affairs.</p> <p><i>A first step in the federation of Europe.</i></p>
fellowship	<p>The status of a fellow of a college or society.</p> <p><i>They valued fun and good fellowship as the cement of the community.</i></p>
group	<p>Two or more figures or objects forming a design.</p> <p><i>A methyl group.</i></p>
<u>guild</u>	<p>A formal association of people with similar interests.</p>
level	<p>A horizontal plane or line with respect to the distance above or below a given point.</p> <p><i>Park the car on the level.</i></p>
level of ability	<p>A flat surface at right angles to a plumb line.</p>
partnership	<p>The members of a business venture created by contract.</p> <p><i>She will be eligible for a partnership after a few years.</i></p>
ring	<p>The sound of a bell ringing.</p> <p><i>A ring of ships in the harbor.</i></p>
<u>syndicate</u>	<p>A group of individuals or organizations combined to promote a common interest.</p> <p><i>A crime syndicate.</i></p>

affiliate

Officially attach or connect (a subsidiary group or a person) to an organization.

*She **affiliates** with her colleagues.*

ally

Become an ally or associate as by a treaty or marriage.

*He **allied** himself with the forces of change.*

amalgamate

Alloy (a metal) with mercury.

*He **amalgamated** his company with another.*

band together

Bind or tie together, as with a band.

collaborate

Work jointly on an activity or project.

*He **collaborated** with the Nazis when they occupied Paris.*

combine

Combine so as to form a whole mix.

*Oxygen **combines** with haemoglobin.*

confederate

Form a group or unite.

*The treaty **confederated** the fourteen tribes.*

form a federation	Assume a form or shape.
form an association	Make something, usually for a specific function.
join forces	Become part of; become a member of a group or organization.
join together	Make contact or come together.
join up	Cause to become joined or linked.
team up	Form a team.
unite	Be or become joined or united or linked. <i>He called on the party to unite.</i>

A subordinate or subsidiary associate a person who is affiliated with another or with an organization.

*The two colleges **affiliated**.*

affiliation

A social or business relationship.

*A valuable financial **affiliation**.*

alliance

The act of forming an alliance or confederation.

*An **alliance** between medicine and morality.*

ally

A state formally cooperating with another for a military or other purpose.

*He s a good **ally** in fight.*

association	A mental connection between things. <i>The word bureaucracy has unpleasant associations.</i>
club	Gather into a club like mass. <i>He joined a golf club.</i>
coalescence	The joining or merging of elements to form one mass or whole. <i>The lack of coalescence among fields of science.</i>
coalition	A temporary alliance for combined action, especially of political parties forming a government. <i>A coalition between Liberals and Conservatives.</i>
collaboration	Something produced in collaboration with someone. <i>He wrote a book in collaboration with his son.</i>
combination	A sequence of numbers or letters used to open a combination lock. <i>The combination of recession and falling property values proved fatal to the business community.</i>
committee	In the UK the whole House of Commons when sitting as a committee. <i>A committee is a group that keeps minutes and loses hours.</i>
confederacy	The southern states that seceded from the United States in 1861. <i>The Italian confederacy known as the Lombard League.</i>
confederation	The act of forming an alliance or confederation. <i>Canada became a confederation in 1867.</i>
conjugate	A mixture of two partially miscible liquids A and B produces two conjugate solutions one of A in B and another of B in A. <i>Conjugate the verb.</i>
consolidation	The action or process of combining a number of financial accounts or funds into a single overall account or set of accounts. <i>He dropped the consolidation into the acid bath.</i>
cooperation	Joint operation or action. <i>Economic cooperation.</i>
federation	A group of states with a central government but independence in internal affairs. <i>A first step in the federation of Europe.</i>
fusion	The combining of images from the two eyes to form a single visual percept. <i>A fusion reactor.</i>
group	Form a group or group together. <i>I now belong to my local drama group.</i>
guild	An association of people for mutual aid or the pursuit of a common goal.

member	The male organ of copulation member is a euphemism. <i>The EU s member countries.</i>
membership	The members or the number of members in a group. <i>A membership card.</i>
<u>national</u>	Of or relating to nationality. <i>The national highway system.</i>
<u>reunion</u>	The action of being brought together again as a unified whole. <i>A school reunion.</i>
society	A specified section of society. <i>The ethnic diversity of British society.</i>
synthesis	The process of producing a chemical compound (usually by the union of simpler chemical compounds). <i>The synthesis of intellect and emotion in his work.</i>
team	Come together as a team to achieve a common goal. <i>Team members.</i>
<u>unify</u>	Join or combine. <i>The government hoped to centralize and unify the nation.</i>
