crude	Belonging to an early stage of technical development characterized by simplicity and often crudeness. <i>The crude facts.</i>
debauched	Indulging in or characterized by excessive indulgence in sex, alcohol, or drugs. <i>A debauched lifestyle.</i>
degenerate	Having lost the physical, mental, or moral qualities considered normal and desirable; showing evidence of decline. <i>A degenerate form of a higher civilization.</i>
depraved	Morally corrupt; wicked. <i>He was a depraved lecher.</i>

dissipated	Preoccupied with the pursuit of pleasure and especially games of chance. <i>Deplorably dissipated and degraded.</i>
dissolute	Unrestrained by convention or morality. <i>Unfortunately his heir was feckless and dissolute.</i>
fast	At a rapid tempo. <i>The fast life she led in London.</i>
impure	Having a physical or moral blemish so as to make impure according to dietary or ceremonial laws. <i>Impure thoughts.</i>
intemperate	Given to or characterized by excessive indulgence, especially in alcohol. <i>Intemperate outbursts concerning global conspiracies.</i>
lascivious	Feeling or revealing an overt sexual interest or desire. <i>He gave her a lascivious wink.</i>
lewd	Crude and offensive in a sexual way. <i>She began to gyrate to the music and sing a lewd song.</i>
libidinous	Showing excessive sexual drive; lustful. <i>Libidinous teenagers.</i>
licentious	Lacking moral discipline; especially sexually unrestrained. <i>Unlike many of the artists who frequented the Soho scene of the 1960s he did not lead a licentious life.</i>
loose	Not close, compact, or solid in structure or formation. <i>The stamp came loose.</i>
lubricious	Characterized by lust. <i>The skin of cephalopods is thin and lubricious.</i>
lustful	Driven by lust preoccupied with or exhibiting lustful desires. <i>Lustful glances.</i>
prurient	Characterized by lust. <i>Prurient thoughts.</i>
salacious	Having or conveying undue or inappropriate interest in sexual matters. <i>Salacious stories.</i>
sinful	Far more than usual or expected. <i>A sinful waste.</i>
unchaste	Relating to or engaging in sexual activity, especially of an illicit or extramarital nature. <i>Unchaste desires.</i>

wanton Sexually unrestrained or having many casual sexual relationships (typically used of a woman).
*Sheer **wanton** vandalism.*

acquisitive	Eager to acquire and possess things especially material possessions or ideas. <i>We live in a competitive and acquisitive society.</i>
avarice	Extreme greed for material wealth. <i>He was rich beyond the dreams of avarice.</i>
avaricious	Having or showing an extreme greed for wealth or material gain. <i>A corrupt and avaricious government.</i>
covetous	Immoderately desirous of acquiring e.g. wealth. <i>Casting covetous eyes on his neighbor s fields.</i>
covetousness	Extreme greed for material wealth.
cupidity	Extreme greed for material wealth. <i>New wealth however tainted by cupidity and egoism tends to be favourable for the arts.</i>
desire	Something desired. <i>John spake unto him and desired him in like manner and contestation as before.</i>
desirous	Having or characterized by desire. <i>Desirous of finding a quick solution to the problem.</i>
egocentric	An egocentric person. <i>Egocentric loners with an overinflated sense of self worth.</i>
envious	Showing extreme cupidity; painfully desirous of another's advantages. <i>An envious glance.</i>
envy	A person or thing that inspires envy. <i>She felt a twinge of envy for the people on board.</i>
flirt	A person who habitually flirts. <i>The lark was flirting around the site.</i>

gluttonous	Given to excess in consumption of especially food or drink. <i>A gluttonous appetite for food and praise and pleasure.</i>
grasping	Understanding with difficulty. <i>A grasping old miser.</i>
greed	Intense and selfish desire for something, especially wealth, power, or food. <i>Mercenaries who had allowed greed to overtake their principles.</i>
greedy	Immoderately desirous of acquiring e.g. wealth. <i>Greedy for fame.</i>
jealous	(of God) demanding faithfulness and exclusive worship. <i>A jealous lover.</i>
jealousy	Zealous vigilance. <i>A sharp pang of jealousy.</i>
miser	A stingy hoarder of money and possessions often living miserably. <i>A typical miser he hid his money in the house in various places.</i>
miserly	(of a quantity) pitifully small or inadequate. <i>He left a miserly tip.</i>
moneylender	A person whose business is lending money to others who pay interest.
prehensile	Adapted for grasping especially by wrapping around an object. <i>Many monkeys have long prehensile tails which they use in swinging through the trees.</i>
rapacious	Excessively greedy and grasping. <i>A rapacious divorcee on the prowl.</i>
ravening	Living by preying on other animals especially by catching living prey. <i>Ravening wolves.</i>
sordid	Unethical or dishonest. <i>The story paints a sordid picture of bribes and scams.</i>
stingy	Mean; ungenerous. <i>His boss is stingy and idle.</i>
swine	A pig. <i>A contagious viral disease of animals that primarily affects swine.</i>
unscrupulous	Having or showing no moral principles; not honest or fair. <i>Unscrupulous landlords might be tempted to harass existing tenants.</i>
usury	Interest at unreasonably high rates. <i>The medieval prohibition on usury.</i>
voracious	Excessively greedy and grasping. <i>Voracious sharks.</i>
