| <u>crude</u> | Belonging to an early stage of technical development characterized by simplicity and often crudeness. <i>The crude facts.</i> |

| debauched | Indulging in or characterized by excessive indulgence in sex, alcohol, or drugs. A debauched lifestyle. |
| degenerate | Having lost the physical, mental, or moral qualities considered normal and desirable; showing evidence of decline. A degenerate form of a higher civilization. |
| depraved | Morally corrupt; wicked. <i>He was a depraved lecher.</i> |



| dissipated | Preoccupied with the pursuit of pleasure and especially games of chance. <i>Deplorably dissipated and degraded.</i> |

| dissolute | Unrestrained by convention or morality. Unfortunately his heir was feckless and dissolute . |
| fast | At a rapid tempo. The fast life she led in London. |
| impure | Having a physical or moral blemish so as to make impure according to dietary or ceremonial laws. <i>Impure thoughts.</i> |
| intemperate | Given to or characterized by excessive indulgence, especially in alcohol. <i>Intemperate</i> outbursts concerning global conspiracies. |
| lascivious | Feeling or revealing an overt sexual interest or desire. <i>He gave her a lascivious wink.</i> |
| lewd | Crude and offensive in a sexual way. She began to gyrate to the music and sing a lewd song. |
| libidinous | Showing excessive sexual drive; lustful. <i>Libidinous</i> teenagers. |
| <u>licentious</u> | Lacking moral discipline; especially sexually unrestrained. Unlike many of the artists who frequented the Soho scene of the 1960s he did not lead a licentious life. |
| <u>loose</u> | Not close, compact, or solid in structure or formation. <i>The stamp came loose</i> . |
| lubricious | Characterized by lust. The skin of cephalopods is thin and lubricious . |
| <u>lustful</u> | Driven by lust preoccupied with or exhibiting lustful desires. <i>Lustful glances</i> . |
| prurient | Characterized by lust. Prurient thoughts. |
| salacious | Having or conveying undue or inappropriate interest in sexual matters. <i>Salacious</i> stories. |
| sinful | Far more than usual or expected. A sinful waste. |
| unchaste | Relating to or engaging in sexual activity, especially of an illicit or extramarital nature. <i>Unchaste desires.</i> |



wanton

Sexually unrestrained or having many casual sexual relationships (typically used of a woman. Sheer wanton vandalism.

| <u>avarice</u> | Extreme greed for material wealth. <i>He was rich beyond the dreams of avarice.</i> |
| avaricious | Having or showing an extreme greed for wealth or material gain. A corrupt and avaricious government. |
| covetous | Immoderately desirous of acquiring e.g. wealth. Casting covetous eyes on his neighbor s fields. |
| covetousness | Extreme greed for material wealth. |
| cupidity | Extreme greed for material wealth. New wealth however tainted by cupidity and egoism tends to be favourable for the arts. |
| desire | Something desired. John spake unto him and desire d him in like manner and contestation as before. |
| desirous | Having or characterized by desire. Desirous of finding a quick solution to the problem. |
| <u>egocentric</u> | An egocentric person. Egocentric loners with an overinflated sense of self worth. |
| <u>envious</u> | Showing extreme cupidity; painfully desirous of another's advantages. An envious glance. |
| envy | A person or thing that inspires envy. She felt a twinge of envy for the people on board. |
| <u>flirt</u> | A person who habitually flirts. The lark was flirt ing around the site. |



| gluttonous | Given to excess in consumption of especially food or drink. A gluttonous appetite for food and praise and pleasure. |

| grasping | Understanding with difficulty. A grasping old miser. |
| greed | Intense and selfish desire for something, especially wealth, power, or food. <i>Mercenaries who had allowed</i> greed to overtake their principles. |
| greedy | Immoderately desirous of acquiring e.g. wealth. <i>Greedy</i> for fame. |
| <u>jealous</u> | (of God) demanding faithfulness and exclusive worship. A jealous lover. |
| jealousy | Zealous vigilance. A sharp pang of jealousy . |
| miser | A stingy hoarder of money and possessions often living miserably. A typical miser he hid his money in the house in various places. |
| miserly | (of a quantity) pitiably small or inadequate. <i>He left a miserly tip.</i> |
| moneylender | A person whose business is lending money to others who pay interest. |
| prehensile | Adapted for grasping especially by wrapping around an object. Many monkeys have long prehensile tails which they use in swinging through the trees. |
| rapacious | Excessively greedy and grasping. A rapacious divorcee on the prowl. |
| ravening | Living by preying on other animals especially by catching living prey. <i>Ravening</i> wolves. |
| <u>sordid</u> | Unethical or dishonest. The story paints a sordid picture of bribes and scams. |
| stingy | Mean; ungenerous. His boss is stingy and idle. |
| swine | A pig. A contagious viral disease of animals that primarily affects swine . |
| <u>unscrupulous</u> | Having or showing no moral principles; not honest or fair. Unscrupulous landlords might be tempted to harass existing tenants. |
| usury | Interest at unreasonably high rates. <i>The medieval prohibition on usury</i> . |
| <u>voracious</u> | Excessively greedy and grasping. <i>Voracious</i> sharks. |
