### Synonyms of "Lecherous" as an adjective (21 Words)

<b><a href="#">crude</a></b>	Belonging to an early stage of technical development characterized by simplicity and often crudeness. <i>The <b>crude</b> facts.</i>
<b>debauched</b>	Indulging in or characterized by excessive indulgence in sex, alcohol, or drugs. <i>A <b>debauched</b> lifestyle.</i>
<b>degenerate</b>	Having lost the physical, mental, or moral qualities considered normal and desirable; showing evidence of decline. <i>A <b>degenerate</b> form of a higher civilization.</i>
<b>depraved</b>	Morally corrupt; wicked. <i>He was a <b>depraved</b> lecher.</i>

<b>dissipated</b>	Preoccupied with the pursuit of pleasure and especially games of chance. <i>Deplorably <b>dissipated</b> and degraded.</i>
<b>dissolute</b>	Unrestrained by convention or morality. <i>Unfortunately his heir was feckless and <b>dissolute</b>.</i>
<b>fast</b>	At a rapid tempo. <i>The <b>fast</b> life she led in London.</i>
<b>impure</b>	Having a physical or moral blemish so as to make impure according to dietary or ceremonial laws. <i><b>Impure</b> thoughts.</i>
<b>intemperate</b>	Given to or characterized by excessive indulgence, especially in alcohol. <i><b>Intemperate</b> outbursts concerning global conspiracies.</i>
<b>lascivious</b>	Feeling or revealing an overt sexual interest or desire. <i>He gave her a <b>lascivious</b> wink.</i>
<b>lewd</b>	Crude and offensive in a sexual way. <i>She began to gyrate to the music and sing a <b>lewd</b> song.</i>
<b>libidinous</b>	Showing excessive sexual drive; lustful. <i><b>Libidinous</b> teenagers.</i>
<b>licentious</b>	Lacking moral discipline; especially sexually unrestrained. <i>Unlike many of the artists who frequented the Soho scene of the 1960s he did not lead a <b>licentious</b> life.</i>
<b>loose</b>	Not close, compact, or solid in structure or formation. <i>The stamp came <b>loose</b>.</i>
<b>lubricious</b>	Characterized by lust. <i>The skin of cephalopods is thin and <b>lubricious</b>.</i>
<b>lustful</b>	Driven by lust preoccupied with or exhibiting lustful desires. <i><b>Lustful</b> glances.</i>
<b>prurient</b>	Characterized by lust. <i><b>Prurient</b> thoughts.</i>
<b>salacious</b>	Having or conveying undue or inappropriate interest in sexual matters. <i><b>Salacious</b> stories.</i>
<b>sinful</b>	Far more than usual or expected. <i>A <b>sinful</b> waste.</i>
<b>unchaste</b>	Relating to or engaging in sexual activity, especially of an illicit or extramarital nature. <i><b>Unchaste</b> desires.</i>

**wanton** Sexually unrestrained or having many casual sexual relationships (typically used of a woman).  
*Sheer **wanton** vandalism.*

## Associations of "Lecherous" (30 Words)

<b>acquisitive</b>	Eager to acquire and possess things especially material possessions or ideas. <i>We live in a competitive and <b>acquisitive</b> society.</i>
<b>avarice</b>	Extreme greed for material wealth. <i>He was rich beyond the dreams of <b>avarice</b>.</i>
<b>avaricious</b>	Having or showing an extreme greed for wealth or material gain. <i>A corrupt and <b>avaricious</b> government.</i>
<b>covetous</b>	Immoderately desirous of acquiring e.g. wealth. <i>Casting <b>covetous</b> eyes on his neighbor s fields.</i>
<b>covetousness</b>	Extreme greed for material wealth.
<b>cupidity</b>	Extreme greed for material wealth. <i>New wealth however tainted by <b>cupidity</b> and egoism tends to be favourable for the arts.</i>
<b>desire</b>	Something desired. <i>John spake unto him and <b>desired</b> him in like manner and contestation as before.</i>
<b>desirous</b>	Having or characterized by desire. <i><b>Desirous</b> of finding a quick solution to the problem.</i>
<b>egocentric</b>	An egocentric person. <i><b>Egocentric</b> loners with an overinflated sense of self worth.</i>
<b>envious</b>	Showing extreme cupidity; painfully desirous of another's advantages. <i>An <b>envious</b> glance.</i>
<b>envy</b>	A person or thing that inspires envy. <i>She felt a twinge of <b>envy</b> for the people on board.</i>
<b>flirt</b>	A person who habitually flirts. <i>The lark was <b>flirting</b> around the site.</i>

<b>gluttonous</b>	Given to excess in consumption of especially food or drink. <i>A <b>gluttonous</b> appetite for food and praise and pleasure.</i>
<b>grasping</b>	Understanding with difficulty. <i>A <b>grasping</b> old miser.</i>
<b>greed</b>	Intense and selfish desire for something, especially wealth, power, or food. <i>Mercenaries who had allowed <b>greed</b> to overtake their principles.</i>
<b>greedy</b>	Immoderately desirous of acquiring e.g. wealth. <i><b>Greedy</b> for fame.</i>
<b>jealous</b>	(of God) demanding faithfulness and exclusive worship. <i>A <b>jealous</b> lover.</i>
<b>jealousy</b>	Zealous vigilance. <i>A sharp pang of <b>jealousy</b>.</i>
<b>miser</b>	A stingy hoarder of money and possessions often living miserably. <i>A typical <b>miser</b> he hid his money in the house in various places.</i>
<b>miserly</b>	(of a quantity) pitifully small or inadequate. <i>He left a <b>miserly</b> tip.</i>
<b>moneylender</b>	A person whose business is lending money to others who pay interest.
<b>prehensile</b>	Adapted for grasping especially by wrapping around an object. <i>Many monkeys have long <b>prehensile</b> tails which they use in swinging through the trees.</i>
<b>rapacious</b>	Excessively greedy and grasping. <i>A <b>rapacious</b> divorcee on the prowl.</i>
<b>ravening</b>	Living by preying on other animals especially by catching living prey. <i><b>Ravening</b> wolves.</i>
<b>sordid</b>	Unethical or dishonest. <i>The story paints a <b>sordid</b> picture of bribes and scams.</i>
<b>stingy</b>	Mean; ungenerous. <i>His boss is <b>stingy</b> and idle.</i>
<b>swine</b>	A pig. <i>A contagious viral disease of animals that primarily affects <b>swine</b>.</i>
<b>unscrupulous</b>	Having or showing no moral principles; not honest or fair. <i><b>Unscrupulous</b> landlords might be tempted to harass existing tenants.</i>
<b>usury</b>	Interest at unreasonably high rates. <i>The medieval prohibition on <b>usury</b>.</i>
<b>voracious</b>	Excessively greedy and grasping. <i><b>Voracious</b> sharks.</i>
