Having a physical or moral blemish so as to make impure according to

impure dietary or ceremonial laws.

Impure thoughts.

intemperate Given to or characterized by excessive indulgence, especially in alcohol.

Intemperate outbursts concerning global conspiracies.

lascivious Feeling or revealing an overt sexual interest or desire.

He gave her a **lascivious** wink.

lewd Crude and offensive in a sexual way.

She began to gyrate to the music and sing a **lewd** song.

libidinous Showing excessive sexual drive; lustful.

Libidinous teenagers.

Lacking moral discipline; especially sexually unrestrained.

<u>licentious</u> Unlike many of the artists who frequented the Soho scene of the 1960s he

did not lead a licentious life.

Not close, compact, or solid in structure or formation.

The stamp came **loose**.

lubricious Characterized by lust.

The skin of cephalopods is thin and **lubricious**.

lustful Driven by lust preoccupied with or exhibiting lustful desires.

Lustful glances.

prurient Characterized by lust.

Prurient thoughts.

salacious Having or conveying undue or inappropriate interest in sexual matters.

Salacious stories.

sinful Far more than usual or expected.

A **sinful** waste.

Relating to or engaging in sexual activity, especially of an illicit or

unchaste extramarital nature.

Unchaste desires.



Sexually unrestrained or having many casual sexual relationships (typically

wanton used of a woman.

Sheer wanton vandalism.

Given to excess in consumption of especially food or drink. gluttonous

A **gluttonous** appetite for food and praise and pleasure.

Understanding with difficulty.

grasping A **grasping** old miser.

Intense and selfish desire for something, especially wealth, power, or food. greed

Mercenaries who had allowed **greed** to overtake their principles.

Immoderately desirous of acquiring e.g. wealth. greedy

Greedy for fame.

(of God) demanding faithfulness and exclusive worship. **iealous**

A **jealous** lover.

Zealous vigilance. **jealousy**

A sharp pang of **jealousy**.

A stingy hoarder of money and possessions often living miserably. miser
