<b><u>ease</u></b>	Absence of rigidity or discomfort; poise. <i>A life of luxury and <b>ease</b>.</i>
<b>free time</b>	People who are free.
<b><u>freedom</u></b>	Familiarity or openness in speech or behaviour. <i>He was a champion of Irish <b>freedom</b>.</i>
<b>idle hours</b>	The state of an engine or other mechanism that is idling.
<b>leisure time</b>	Time available for ease and relaxation.
<b>peace</b>	A treaty agreeing peace between warring states. <i>The <b>peace</b> of mind this insurance gives you.</i>

<b>quiet</b>	Freedom from disturbance or interruption by others. <i>The ringing of the telephone shattered the early morning <b>quiet</b>.</i>
<b>relief</b>	A cause of or occasion for relief. <i>The <b>relief</b> nurse was late.</i>
<b>respite</b>	A short delay permitted before an unpleasant obligation is met or a punishment is carried out. <i>The refugee encampments will provide some <b>respite</b> from the suffering.</i>
<b>spare moments</b>	An extra car wheel and tire for a four-wheel vehicle.
<b>spare time</b>	A score in tenpins; knocking down all ten after rolling two balls.
<b>time off</b>	The period of time a prisoner is imprisoned.
<b>time to spare</b>	A period of time considered as a resource under your control and sufficient to accomplish something.

<b><u>badinage</u></b>	Humorous or witty conversation. <i>He developed a nice line in <b>badinage</b> with the Labour leader.</i>
<b>bagatelle</b>	A short, light piece of music, especially one for the piano. <i>Dealing with these boats was a mere <b>bagatelle</b> for the world's oldest yacht club.</i>
<b>bingo</b>	A game in which players mark off numbers on cards as the numbers are drawn randomly by a caller, the winner being the first person to mark off all their numbers. <i>A <b>bingo</b> hall.</i>
<b>boxing</b>	Fighting with the fists.
<b>camping</b>	The act of encamping and living in tents in a camp. <i><b>Camping</b> attracts people of all ages.</i>
<b>entertainment</b>	The action of providing or being provided with amusement or enjoyment. <i>Everyone just sits in front of the television for <b>entertainment</b>.</i>
<b><u>excursion</u></b>	A digression. <i>The firm's disastrous <b>excursion</b> into the US electrical market.</i>
<b><u>expedition</u></b>	The people involved in an expedition. <i>An <b>expedition</b> to the jungles of the Orinoco.</i>
<b>fishing</b>	The occupation of catching fish for a living. <i><b>Fishing</b> boats.</i>
<b>football</b>	The playing of football especially in a stylish and entertaining way. <i>Whose fingers would we prefer to have on America's nuclear <b>football</b>.</i>
<b>game</b>	A score of 100 points for tricks bid and made the best of three games constituting a rubber. <i>Other Russians <b>gamed</b> at the tables in Monte Carlo.</i>
<b><u>hobby</u></b>	Small Old World falcon formerly trained and flown at small birds. <i>Her hobbies are reading and gardening.</i>
<b>interest</b>	Excite the curiosity of engage the interest of. <i>The iron <b>interests</b> stepped up production.</i>
<b>jaunt</b>	Go on a short journey for pleasure. <i>Her regular <b>jaunts</b> to Europe.</i>
<b>outing</b>	A brief journey from home. <i>A family <b>outing</b> to Weston super Mare.</i>
<b><u>partake</u></b>	Be characterized by (a quality). <i>Visitors can <b>partake</b> in golfing or clay pigeon shooting.</i>
<b>pastime</b>	A diversion that occupies one's time and thoughts (usually pleasantly). <i>His favourite <b>pastimes</b> were shooting and golf.</i>

<b>philately</b>	The collection and study of postage stamps.
<b>picnic</b>	Have or take part in a picnic. <i>We packed up a <b>picnic</b> and went to the reservoir.</i>
<b>recreation</b>	An activity that diverts or amuses or stimulates. <i>His <b>recreations</b> included golf and rugby.</i>
<b>recreational</b>	Relating to or denoting activity done for enjoyment when one is not working. <i><b>Recreational</b> drug use.</i>
<b>stadium</b>	An ancient Roman or Greek measure of length about 185 metres originally the length of a stadium.
<b>tourism</b>	The commercial organization and operation of holidays and visits to places of interest. <i>A national fund for the promotion of <b>tourism</b>.</i>
<b><u>tournament</u></b>	A series of jousts between knights contesting for a prize. <i>The Royal <b>Tournament</b>.</i>
<b>travel</b>	Travel from place to place as for the purpose of finding work preaching or acting as a judge. <i>News <b>travelled</b> fast.</i>
<b>trip</b>	Make a trip for pleasure. <i>The plugs will <b>trip</b> as soon as any change in current is detected.</i>
<b><u>voyage</u></b>	Go on a voyage. <i>His <b>voyage</b> to America.</i>
