breathing space	The bodily process of inhalation and exhalation; the process of taking in oxygen from inhaled air and releasing carbon dioxide by exhalation.
breathing spell	The bodily process of inhalation and exhalation; the process of taking in oxygen from inhaled air and releasing carbon dioxide by exhalation.
<u>ease</u>	Absence of rigidity or discomfort; poise. A life of luxury and ease .
free time	People who are free.
<u>freedom</u>	Familiarity or openness in speech or behaviour. <i>He was a champion of Irish freedom.</i>
idle hours	The state of an engine or other mechanism that is idling.
leisure time	Time available for ease and relaxation.
peace	A treaty agreeing peace between warring states. The peace of mind this insurance gives you.



quiet	Freedom from disturbance or interruption by others. The ringing of the telephone shattered the early morning quiet .
relief	A cause of or occasion for relief. The relief nurse was late.
<u>respite</u>	A short delay permitted before an unpleasant obligation is met or a punishment is carried out. The refugee encampments will provide some respite from the suffering.
spare moments	An extra car wheel and tire for a four-wheel vehicle.
spare time	A score in tenpins; knocking down all ten after rolling two balls.
time off	The period of time a prisoner is imprisoned.
time to spare	A period of time considered as a resource under your control and sufficient to accomplish something.

<u>excursion</u>	A digression. The firm s disastrous excursion into the US electrical market.
<u>expedition</u>	The people involved in an expedition. An expedition to the jungles of the Orinoco.
fishing	The occupation of catching fish for a living. <i>Fishing</i> boats.
football	The playing of football especially in a stylish and entertaining way. Whose fingers would we prefer to have on America s nuclear football .
game	A score of 100 points for tricks bid and made the best of three games constituting a rubber. Other Russians game d at the tables in Monte Carlo.
<u>hobby</u>	Small Old World falcon formerly trained and flown at small birds. <i>Her hobbies are reading and gardening.</i>
interest	Excite the curiosity of engage the interest of. The iron interest s stepped up production.
jaunt	Go on a short journey for pleasure. <i>Her regular jaunts to Europe.</i>
outing	A brief journey from home. A family outing to Weston super Mare.
<u>partake</u>	Be characterized by (a quality. Visitors can partake in golfing or clay pigeon shooting.
pastime	A diversion that occupies one's time and thoughts (usually pleasantly. <i>His favourite pastimes were shooting and golf.</i>
