breathing space	The bodily process of inhalation and exhalation; the process of taking in oxygen from inhaled air and releasing carbon dioxide by exhalation.
breathing spell	The bodily process of inhalation and exhalation; the process of taking in oxygen from inhaled air and releasing carbon dioxide by exhalation.
<u>ease</u>	Absence of rigidity or discomfort; poise. <i>A life of luxury and ease.</i>
free time	People who are free.
<u>freedom</u>	Familiarity or openness in speech or behaviour. <i>He was a champion of Irish freedom.</i>
idle hours	The state of an engine or other mechanism that is idling.
leisure time	Time available for ease and relaxation.
peace	A treaty agreeing peace between warring states. <i>The peace of mind this insurance gives you.</i>

quiet	Freedom from disturbance or interruption by others. <i>The ringing of the telephone shattered the early morning quiet.</i>
relief	A cause of or occasion for relief. <i>The relief nurse was late.</i>
respite	A short delay permitted before an unpleasant obligation is met or a punishment is carried out. <i>The refugee encampments will provide some respite from the suffering.</i>
spare moments	An extra car wheel and tire for a four-wheel vehicle.
spare time	A score in tenpins; knocking down all ten after rolling two balls.
time off	The period of time a prisoner is imprisoned.
time to spare	A period of time considered as a resource under your control and sufficient to accomplish something.

<u>badinage</u>	Humorous or witty conversation. <i>He developed a nice line in badinage with the Labour leader.</i>
bagatelle	A short, light piece of music, especially one for the piano. <i>Dealing with these boats was a mere bagatelle for the world's oldest yacht club.</i>
bingo	A game in which players mark off numbers on cards as the numbers are drawn randomly by a caller, the winner being the first person to mark off all their numbers. <i>A bingo hall.</i>
boxing	Fighting with the fists.
camping	The act of encamping and living in tents in a camp. <i>Camping attracts people of all ages.</i>
entertainment	The action of providing or being provided with amusement or enjoyment. <i>Everyone just sits in front of the television for entertainment.</i>
<u>excursion</u>	A digression. <i>The firm's disastrous excursion into the US electrical market.</i>
<u>expedition</u>	The people involved in an expedition. <i>An expedition to the jungles of the Orinoco.</i>
fishing	The occupation of catching fish for a living. <i>Fishing boats.</i>
football	The playing of football especially in a stylish and entertaining way. <i>Whose fingers would we prefer to have on America's nuclear football.</i>
game	A score of 100 points for tricks bid and made the best of three games constituting a rubber. <i>Other Russians gamed at the tables in Monte Carlo.</i>
<u>hobby</u>	Small Old World falcon formerly trained and flown at small birds. <i>Her hobbies are reading and gardening.</i>
interest	Excite the curiosity of engage the interest of. <i>The iron interests stepped up production.</i>
jaunt	Go on a short journey for pleasure. <i>Her regular jaunts to Europe.</i>
outing	A brief journey from home. <i>A family outing to Weston super Mare.</i>
<u>partake</u>	Be characterized by (a quality). <i>Visitors can partake in golfing or clay pigeon shooting.</i>
pastime	A diversion that occupies one's time and thoughts (usually pleasantly). <i>His favourite pastimes were shooting and golf.</i>

philately	The collection and study of postage stamps.
picnic	Have or take part in a picnic. <i>We packed up a picnic and went to the reservoir.</i>
recreation	An activity that diverts or amuses or stimulates. <i>His recreations included golf and rugby.</i>
recreational	Relating to or denoting activity done for enjoyment when one is not working. <i>Recreational drug use.</i>
stadium	An ancient Roman or Greek measure of length about 185 metres originally the length of a stadium.
tourism	The commercial organization and operation of holidays and visits to places of interest. <i>A national fund for the promotion of tourism.</i>
<u>tournament</u>	A series of jousts between knights contesting for a prize. <i>The Royal Tournament.</i>
travel	Travel from place to place as for the purpose of finding work preaching or acting as a judge. <i>News travelled fast.</i>
trip	Make a trip for pleasure. <i>The plugs will trip as soon as any change in current is detected.</i>
<u>voyage</u>	Go on a voyage. <i>His voyage to America.</i>
