An **easygoing** teacher who allowed extra time for assignments.

effortless Not showing effort or strain.

Each skill is practised to the point that it becomes **effortless**.

gentle Having little impact. A **gentle** reprimand.

lackadaisical Lacking enthusiasm and determination; carelessly lazy.

alsical A lackadaisical attempt.

languid Weak or faint from illness or fatigue.

A **languid** mood.



languorous Lacking spirit or liveliness.

Summer has a slow **languorous** feel to it here.

Disinclined to work or exertion.

At a **lazy** pace.

lingeringLasting for a long time or slow to end.

There are still some **lingering** doubts in my mind.

relaxed Free from tension and anxiety.

A **relaxed** and informal discussion.

restful Affording physical or mental rest.

She spent a **restful** night at home.

sedate Quiet and rather dull.

Sedate suburban domesticity.

slow to learn or understand lacking intellectual acuity Thackeray.

He was **slow** in reacting to the news.

(especially of a task) not demanding.

undemanding An undemanding boss.


unhurried Relaxed and leisurely; without hurry or haste.

People strolling about in an **unhurried** way.

unrushed Characterized by an absence of haste; unhurried.

He seemed to have a controlled **unrushed** way of moving.

mellow Soften make mellow.

An optical illusion of motion produced by viewing a rapid succession of

plod

We **plod**ded back up the hill.

relaxed Without strain or anxiety.

Of a sports field or ground likely to make the ball bounce or run slowly or

to prevent competitors from travelling fast.

The train went **slow**er and **slow**er.

slowly Without speed slow is sometimes used informally for slowly.

They moved forward **slowly**.

thoughtfully
In a way that suggests being absorbed in thought.

He nodded **thoughtfully** as I finished speaking.

trudge Walk heavily and firmly, as when weary, or through mud.

I **trudge**d up the stairs.

unhurried Relaxed and leisurely; without hurry or haste.

Spoke in a calm and unhurried voice.

untroubled Not beset by troubles or disturbance or distress.

A man untroubled by a guilty conscience.
