Synonyms of "Leisurely" as an adjective (17 Words)

comfortable	Providing or experiencing physical well-being or relief ('comfy' is informal). <i>The Rector enjoyed a comfortable lifestyle with plenty of servants.</i>
easy	Free from worry or anxiety. <i>An easy victim.</i>
easygoing	Not burdensome or demanding; borne or done easily and without hardship. <i>An easygoing teacher who allowed extra time for assignments.</i>
effortless	Not showing effort or strain. <i>Each skill is practised to the point that it becomes effortless.</i>
gentle	Having little impact. <i>A gentle reprimand.</i>
lackadaisical	Lacking enthusiasm and determination; carelessly lazy. <i>A lackadaisical attempt.</i>
languid	Weak or faint from illness or fatigue. <i>A languid mood.</i>

languorous	Lacking spirit or liveliness. <i>Summer has a slow languorous feel to it here.</i>
<u>lazy</u>	Disinclined to work or exertion. <i>At a lazy pace.</i>
lingering	Lasting for a long time or slow to end. <i>There are still some lingering doubts in my mind.</i>
relaxed	Free from tension and anxiety. <i>A relaxed and informal discussion.</i>
<u>restful</u>	Affording physical or mental rest. <i>She spent a restful night at home.</i>
<u>sedate</u>	Quiet and rather dull. <i>Sedate suburban domesticity.</i>
slow	Slow to learn or understand lacking intellectual acuity Thackeray. <i>He was slow in reacting to the news.</i>
undemanding	(especially of a task) not demanding. <i>An undemanding boss.</i>
unhurried	Relaxed and leisurely; without hurry or haste. <i>People strolling about in an unhurried way.</i>
unrushed	Characterized by an absence of haste; unhurried. <i>He seemed to have a controlled unrushed way of moving.</i>



Usage Examples of "Leisurely" as an adjective

- *A leisurely breakfast at our hotel.*
- *At a leisurely (or easygoing) pace.*

andantino	A movement or passage marked to be performed andantino. <i>The ominous sadness of the andantino second movement was beautifully paced.</i>
carefree	Free of trouble and worry and care. Carefree millionaires untroubled financially.
casual	A youth belonging to a subculture characterized by the wearing of expensive casual clothing and frequently associated with football hooliganism. A casual remark.
drawl	A slow speech pattern with prolonged vowels. Drawl one s vowels.
easy	With ease easy is sometimes used informally for easily. An easy victory.

easygoing	Relaxed and informal in attitude or standards. <i>The easygoing life of a parttime consultant.</i>
erode	(of a disease) gradually destroy (bodily tissue). <i>Many had their upper incisors missing and their maxillae eroded.</i>
facile	Arrived at without due care or effort; lacking depth. <i>Facile generalizations.</i>
gradually	In a gradual manner. <i>The snake moved gradually toward its victim.</i>
halcyon	A tropical Asian and African kingfisher with brightly coloured plumage. <i>A halcyon atmosphere.</i>
happy-go-lucky	Presaging or likely to bring good luck.
idler	Person who does no work.
indolence	Avoidance of activity or exertion; laziness. <i>My failure is probably due to my own indolence.</i>
intelligently	In a knowledgeable and insightful way; cleverly. <i>Many spoke intelligently about the issues.</i>
laconic	Brief and to the point; effectively cut short. <i>His laconic reply suggested a lack of interest in the topic.</i>
laggard	A person who makes slow progress and falls behind others. <i>A bell to summon laggard children to school.</i>
lazy	(of a river) slow-moving. <i>Up a lazy river.</i>
measured	(of speech or writing) carefully considered and restrained. <i>With measured irony.</i>
mellow	Soften make mellow. <i>Jean Claude was feeling mellow.</i>
motion	An optical illusion of motion produced by viewing a rapid succession of still pictures of a moving object. <i>73 of the patients had fewer than three bowel motions a day.</i>
plod	Work slowly and perseveringly at a dull task. <i>We plodded back up the hill.</i>
relaxed	Without strain or anxiety. <i>We were having a great time and feeling very relaxed.</i>
slack	Make less active or intense. <i>The veteran king of slack chat.</i>
slacken	Make less active or fast. <i>The pace never slackens.</i>

slow	Of a sports field or ground likely to make the ball bounce or run slowly or to prevent competitors from travelling fast. <i>The train went slower and slower.</i>
slowly	Without speed slow is sometimes used informally for slowly. <i>They moved forward slowly.</i>
<u>thoughtfully</u>	In a way that suggests being absorbed in thought. <i>He nodded thoughtfully as I finished speaking.</i>
trudge	Walk heavily and firmly, as when weary, or through mud. <i>I trudged up the stairs.</i>
unhurried	Relaxed and leisurely; without hurry or haste. <i>Spoke in a calm and unhurried voice.</i>
untroubled	Not beset by troubles or disturbance or distress. <i>A man untroubled by a guilty conscience.</i>
