- The metrical quantity or duration of a vowel or syllable.
- The full extent of one's body.
- The extent of a garment in a vertical direction when worn.
- (in bridge or whist) the number of cards of a suit held in one's hand, especially when



five or more.

- A piece or stretch of something.
- A section of something that is long and narrow.
- An extreme to which a course of action is taken.

swatch	A small sample of fabric intended to demonstrate the look of a larger piece. The walls were covered with multicoloured paint swatch es.

interval	A component of activity in interval training. An interval of mourning.
lengthen	Make longer. In the spring when the days are lengthen ing.
lengthy	Relatively long in duration; tediously protracted. <i>Lengthy</i> delays.

long	Of speech sounds or syllables of relatively long duration. A long distance.
