segment	A portion of time allocated to a particular broadcast item on radio or television. <i>They probably want to tape you for the eleven o'clock segment.</i>
span	The wingspan of an aircraft or a bird. <i>A warehouse with a clear span of 28 feet.</i>
stretch	A stretch limo. <i>I got up and had a stretch.</i>
swatch	A small sample of fabric intended to demonstrate the look of a larger piece. <i>The walls were covered with multicoloured paint swatches.</i>

term

A fixed or limited period for which something, for example office, imprisonment, or investment, lasts or is intended to last.

*The **terms** of the treaty were generous.*

edge	Provide with a border or edge. <i>Edge a blade.</i>
elongate	Long in relation to width elongated. <i>The pup s globular body slowly elongates.</i>
<u>elongated</u>	Long in relation to width, especially unusually so. <i>An alien being with an elongated head.</i>
<u>enduring</u>	Lasting a long time. <i>He formed a number of enduring relationships with women.</i>
<u>extend</u>	Thrust or extend out. <i>My memory extends back to my fourth year of life.</i>
extended	Fully extended or stretched forth. <i>An extended period of time.</i>
extensible	Able to be extended or stretched; extendable. <i>An extensible architecture designed to accommodate changes.</i>

<u>further</u>	To or at a greater extent or degree or a more advanced stage further is used more often than farther in this abstract sense. <i>Cook for a further ten minutes.</i>
hypotenuse	The side of a right triangle opposite the right angle.
inch	As a unit of atmospheric pressure an amount that would support a column of mercury one inch high in a barometer equal to 33 86 millibars 29 5 inches being equal to one bar. <i>He inched the car forward.</i>
interval	A component of activity in interval training. <i>An interval of mourning.</i>
lengthen	Make longer. <i>In the spring when the days are lengthening.</i>
lengthy	Relatively long in duration; tediously protracted. <i>Lengthy delays.</i>

line	Space for one line of print one column wide and 1 14 inch deep used to measure advertising. <i>He fed me a line about some nightclubbing Japanese photographer.</i>
long	Of speech sounds or syllables of relatively long duration. <i>A long distance.</i>
longitudinal	Relating to longitude; measured from east to west. <i>A longitudinal study of twins.</i>
oblong	Having the shape of an oblong. <i>An oblong of grass.</i>
perigee	Periapsis in Earth orbit; the point in its orbit where a satellite is nearest to the Earth.
perihelion	Periapsis in solar orbit; the point in the orbit of a planet or comet where it is nearest to the sun. <i>Today Mercury is at perihelion.</i>
protracted	Relatively long in duration tediously protracted. <i>A protracted and bitter dispute.</i>
queue	Form a queue form a line stand in line. <i>Input or output requests to a file are queued by the operating system.</i>
scope	A telescope microscope or other device having a name ending in scope. <i>Such questions go beyond the scope of this book.</i>
span	The wingspan of an aircraft or a bird. <i>A warehouse with a clear span of 28 feet.</i>
stretch	The capacity of a material or garment to stretch or be stretched elasticity. <i>I stretched out a weary arm to turn on my radio.</i>
width	The measurement or extent of something from side to side; the lesser of two or the least of three dimensions of a body. <i>The width of experience required for these positions.</i>
