Associations of "Let alone" (30 Words)

cloistered	Enclosed by or having a cloister. <i>The cloistered academic world of books.</i>
detached	(of a social worker or social work) operating or based in the community rather than in an office. <i>The detached shutter fell on him.</i>
<u>forlorn</u>	Pitifully sad and abandoned or lonely. <i>The last forlorn attempt.</i>
<u>hermit</u>	One retired from society for religious reasons.
homesick	Experiencing a longing for one’s home during a period of absence from it. <i>He was homesick for America after five weeks in Europe.</i>
isolate	A culture of microorganisms isolated for study. <i>Social isolates often become careless of their own welfare.</i>
isolated	Far away from other places, buildings, or people; remote. <i>Isolated incidents of student unrest.</i>
<u>isolation</u>	The process or fact of isolating or being isolated. <i>Isolation from family and friends may also contribute to anxiety.</i>
<u>lone</u>	Being the only one; single and isolated from others. <i>The lone doctor in the entire county.</i>
loneliness	The state of being alone in solitary isolation. <i>Feelings of depression and loneliness.</i>
lonely	(of a place) unfrequented and remote. <i>Felt sad and lonely.</i>
lonesome	Marked by dejection from being alone. <i>A lonesome pine.</i>
<u>outsider</u>	A person who does not belong to a particular organization or profession. <i>He started as a rank outsider.</i>

privacy	The state of being free from public attention. <i>A law to restrict newspapers freedom to invade people s privacy.</i>
recluse	Favouring a solitary life. <i>She has turned into a virtual recluse.</i>
remote	A remote control device. <i>The theory seems rather intellectual and remote from everyday experience.</i>
seclude	Keep (someone) away from other people. <i>I secluded myself up here for a life of study and meditation.</i>
secluded	Providing privacy or seclusion. <i>A secluded romantic spot.</i>
seclusion	The act of secluding yourself from others. <i>They enjoyed ten days of peace and seclusion.</i>
segregate	Someone who is or has been segregated. <i>We don t segregate in this county.</i>
separated	Separated at the joint. <i>The separated spacecraft will return to their home bases.</i>
sequester	A general cut in government spending. <i>The estate was sequestered.</i>
single	Reduce a railway track to a single line. <i>A single lens.</i>
sole	Put a new sole on. <i>A big blister on each heel and sole.</i>
solitary	(of a flower or other part) borne singly. <i>He had something of the solitary about him.</i>
solitude	A lonely or uninhabited place. <i>She savoured her few hours of freedom and solitude.</i>
troglodyte	Someone who lives in a cave. Not likely to be rewarded.
unappreciated	<i>She had been brought up in a family where she felt unappreciated and undervalued.</i>
unrewarding	Not rewarding; not providing personal satisfaction. <i>It was dull unrewarding work.</i>
unsung	Not celebrated or praised. <i>Unsung heroes of the war.</i>
