<u>deliverance</u>	A formal or authoritative utterance. <i>Work is the deliverance of mankind.</i>
discharge	A substance that has been discharged. <i>Machinery to rehabilitate the bankrupt through the process of discharge.</i>
<u>dismissal</u>	A judgment disposing of the matter without a trial. <i>The government's dismissal of the report.</i>
dismission	Official notice that you have been fired from your job.
emancipation	Freeing someone from the control of another; especially a parent's relinquishing authority and control over a minor child. <i>The early struggle for emancipation from slavery.</i>
enfranchisement	The action of making land freehold. <i>Legal costs attributable to the enfranchisement of leasehold properties.</i>
equal rights	A person who is of equal standing with another in a group.
equality	A state of being essentially equal or equivalent; equally balanced. <i>An organization aiming to promote racial equality.</i>

extrication	The act of releasing from a snarled or tangled condition.
firing	The act of firing weapons or artillery at an enemy. <i>No missile firings were planned.</i>
freedom	The state of being unrestricted and able to move easily. <i>The shark thrashed its way to freedom.</i>
freeing	People who are free.
independence	The fact or state of being independent. <i>Argentina gained independence from Spain in 1816.</i>
non-discrimination	Fairness in treating people without prejudice.
release	A document effecting a release of property money etc. <i>The movie will be on release from Christmas.</i>
relief	A representation of relief given by an arrangement of line or colour or shading. <i>Employees who donate to charity will receive tax relief.</i>
rescue	Denoting or relating to a domestic animal that has been removed from a situation of abuse or neglect by a welfare organization. <i>He came to our rescue with a loan of 100.</i>
sack	The quantity contained in a sack. <i>They were given the sack.</i>
sacking	The termination of someone's employment (leaving them free to depart). <i>The offence merited a written warning that could lead to a sacking.</i>
salvation	The act of delivering from sin or saving from evil. <i>His only salvation was to outfly the enemy.</i>
setting free	A mounting consisting of a piece of metal (as in a ring or other jewelry) that holds a gem in place.

discharge	A substance that has been discharged. A <i>greeny yellow nasal discharge</i> .
disengage	Release from something that holds fast, connects, or entangles. <i>Plans were already afoot for the Americans to disengage from the city.</i>
dislodge	Change place or direction. <i>The hoofs of their horses dislodged loose stones.</i>
dismissal	Permission to go; the sending away of someone. <i>Their controversial dismissal from the competition.</i>
emancipate	Set (a child) free from the authority of its parents. An emancipated minor.
emancipation	The freeing of someone from slavery. <i>The early struggle for emancipation from slavery.</i>
escape	Interrupt an operation by means of the escape key. <i>The baby was fine but it was a lucky escape.</i>
exude	(with reference to moisture or a smell) discharge or be discharged slowly and steadily. <i>The beetle exudes a caustic liquid.</i>
footloose	Able to travel freely and do as one pleases due to a lack of responsibilities or commitments. <i>Americans have always been a footloose people always moving on.</i>
free	Free or remove obstruction from. <i>She spent her free time shopping.</i>
freelance	A freelance worker. <i>He freelanced for the BBC and regional companies.</i>
gratis	Costing nothing. <i>A monthly programme was issued gratis.</i>
illimitable	Without limits in extent or size or quantity. <i>The illimitable human capacity for evil.</i>
inexpensive	Not costing a great deal; cheap. Inexpensive family restaurants.
leeway	(of a ship or plane) sideways drift. <i>There is little leeway if anything goes wrong.</i>

liberally	In a way that is not precise or strictly literal; loosely. <i>Liberally educated students.</i>
liberate	Release (someone) from a situation which limits freedom of thought or behaviour. <i>Ways of working politically that liberate women.</i>
loosely	Without regard to specific details or exceptions. <i>The term is interpreted loosely.</i>
looseness	Movement or space for movement. <i>Misunderstandings can often be traced to a looseness of expression.</i>
manumit	Free from slavery or servitude. <i>Old Angus had never manumitted a single slave.</i>
release	The action or process of releasing or being released. <i>He released the handbrake.</i>
renewable	A natural resource or source of energy that is not depleted by use, such as water, wind, or solar power. <i>Production costs for the renewables are higher than for coal oil or gas.</i>
separatist	Relating to separatists or separatism. <i>Religious separatists.</i>
unencumbered	Not burdened with cares or responsibilities. <i>Inherited an unencumbered estate.</i>
unfettered	Unrestrained or uninhibited. <i>Unfettered artistic genius.</i>
unofficial	Not officially authorized or confirmed. <i>An unofficial estimate.</i>
untie	Undo or unfasten (something that is tied or tied up). <i>She knelt to untie her laces.</i>
waiver	An act or instance of waiving a right or claim. <i>Their acquiescence could amount to a waiver.</i>
