<b><u>deliverance</u></b>	A formal or authoritative utterance. <i>Work is the <b>deliverance</b> of mankind.</i>
<b>discharge</b>	A substance that has been discharged. <i>Machinery to rehabilitate the bankrupt through the process of <b>discharge</b>.</i>
<b><u>dismissal</u></b>	A judgment disposing of the matter without a trial. <i>The government's <b>dismissal</b> of the report.</i>
<b>dismission</b>	Official notice that you have been fired from your job.
<b>emancipation</b>	Freeing someone from the control of another; especially a parent's relinquishing authority and control over a minor child. <i>The early struggle for <b>emancipation</b> from slavery.</i>
<b>enfranchisement</b>	The action of making land freehold. <i>Legal costs attributable to the <b>enfranchisement</b> of leasehold properties.</i>
<b>equal rights</b>	A person who is of equal standing with another in a group.
<b>equality</b>	A state of being essentially equal or equivalent; equally balanced. <i>An organization aiming to promote racial <b>equality</b>.</i>

<b>extrication</b>	The act of releasing from a snarled or tangled condition.
<b>firing</b>	The act of firing weapons or artillery at an enemy. <i>No missile <b>firings</b> were planned.</i>
<b>freedom</b>	The state of being unrestricted and able to move easily. <i>The shark thrashed its way to <b>freedom</b>.</i>
<b>freeing</b>	People who are free.
<b>independence</b>	The fact or state of being independent. <i>Argentina gained <b>independence</b> from Spain in 1816.</i>
<b>non-discrimination</b>	Fairness in treating people without prejudice.
<b>release</b>	A document effecting a release of property money etc. <i>The movie will be on <b>release</b> from Christmas.</i>
<b>relief</b>	A representation of relief given by an arrangement of line or colour or shading. <i>Employees who donate to charity will receive tax <b>relief</b>.</i>
<b>rescue</b>	Denoting or relating to a domestic animal that has been removed from a situation of abuse or neglect by a welfare organization. <i>He came to our <b>rescue</b> with a loan of 100.</i>
<b>sack</b>	The quantity contained in a sack. <i>They were given the <b>sack</b>.</i>
<b>sacking</b>	The termination of someone's employment (leaving them free to depart). <i>The offence merited a written warning that could lead to a <b>sacking</b>.</i>
<b>salvation</b>	The act of delivering from sin or saving from evil. <i>His only <b>salvation</b> was to outfly the enemy.</i>
<b>setting free</b>	A mounting consisting of a piece of metal (as in a ring or other jewelry) that holds a gem in place.

<b>complimentary</b>	Costing nothing. A <b>complimentary</b> remark.
<b>discharge</b>	A substance that has been discharged. A greeny yellow nasal <b>discharge</b> .
<b>disengage</b>	Release from something that holds fast, connects, or entangles. Plans were already afoot for the Americans to <b>disengage</b> from the city.
<b>dislodge</b>	Change place or direction. The hoofs of their horses <b>dislodged</b> loose stones.
<b>dismissal</b>	Permission to go; the sending away of someone. Their controversial <b>dismissal</b> from the competition.
<b>emancipate</b>	Set (a child) free from the authority of its parents. An <b>emancipated</b> minor.
<b>emancipation</b>	The freeing of someone from slavery. The early struggle for <b>emancipation</b> from slavery.
<b>escape</b>	Interrupt an operation by means of the escape key. The baby was fine but it was a lucky <b>escape</b> .
<b>exude</b>	(with reference to moisture or a smell) discharge or be discharged slowly and steadily. The beetle <b>exudes</b> a caustic liquid.
<b>footloose</b>	Able to travel freely and do as one pleases due to a lack of responsibilities or commitments. Americans have always been a <b>footloose</b> people always moving on.
<b>free</b>	Free or remove obstruction from. She spent her <b>free</b> time shopping.
<b>freelance</b>	A freelance worker. He <b>freelanced</b> for the BBC and regional companies.
<b>gratis</b>	Costing nothing. A monthly programme was issued <b>gratis</b> .
<b>illimitable</b>	Without limits in extent or size or quantity. The <b>illimitable</b> human capacity for evil.
<b>inexpensive</b>	Not costing a great deal; cheap. <b>Inexpensive</b> family restaurants.
<b>leeway</b>	(of a ship or plane) sideways drift. There is little <b>leeway</b> if anything goes wrong.

<b>liberally</b>	In a way that is not precise or strictly literal; loosely. <i><b>Liberal</b>ly educated students.</i>
<b>liberate</b>	Release (someone) from a situation which limits freedom of thought or behaviour. <i>Ways of working politically that <b>liberate</b> women.</i>
<b>loosely</b>	Without regard to specific details or exceptions. <i>The term is interpreted <b>loosely</b>.</i>
<b>looseness</b>	Movement or space for movement. <i>Misunderstandings can often be traced to a <b>looseness</b> of expression.</i>
<b>manumit</b>	Free from slavery or servitude. <i>Old Angus had never <b>manumitted</b> a single slave.</i>
<b>release</b>	The action or process of releasing or being released. <i>He <b>released</b> the handbrake.</i>
<b>renewable</b>	A natural resource or source of energy that is not depleted by use, such as water, wind, or solar power. <i>Production costs for the <b>renewables</b> are higher than for coal oil or gas.</i>
<b>separatist</b>	Relating to separatists or separatism. <i>Religious <b>separatists</b>.</i>
<b>unencumbered</b>	Not burdened with cares or responsibilities. <i>Inherited an <b>unencumbered</b> estate.</i>
<b>unfettered</b>	Unrestrained or uninhibited. <i><b>Unfettered</b> artistic genius.</i>
<b>unofficial</b>	Not officially authorized or confirmed. <i>An <b>unofficial</b> estimate.</i>
<b>untie</b>	Undo or unfasten (something that is tied or tied up). <i>She knelt to <b>untie</b> her laces.</i>
<b>waiver</b>	An act or instance of waiving a right or claim. <i>Their acquiescence could amount to a <b>waiver</b>.</i>
