<b>commissioner</b>	The head of the Metropolitan Police in London. <i>A baseball <b>commissioner</b>.</i>
<b>congregate</b>	Come together, usually for a purpose. <i>The crowds <b>congregated</b> in front of the Vatican on Christmas Eve.</i>
<b>corroborate</b>	Confirm or give support to (a statement, theory, or finding). <i>The witness had <b>corroborated</b> the boy s account of the attack.</i>
<b>curator</b>	A keeper or custodian of a museum or other collection. <i>The <b>curator</b> of drawings at the National Gallery.</i>
<b>custodian</b>	A goalkeeper or wicketkeeper. <i>The <b>custodians</b> of pension and insurance funds.</i>
<b>demonstrate</b>	Provide evidence for; stand as proof of; show by one's behavior, attitude, or external attributes. <i>Their shameful silence <b>demonstrates</b> their ineptitude.</i>
<b>depository</b>	A facility where things can be deposited for storage or safekeeping. <i>Irish libraries became depositories for material from all over the world.</i>
<b>document</b>	Support or accompany with documentation. <i>The parents <b>documented</b> every step of their child s development.</i>
<b>espouse</b>	Take up the cause, ideology, practice, method, of someone and use it as one's own. <i>She was secretly <b>espoused</b> to his son Peter.</i>
<b>exhibition</b>	A display of a quality or emotion. <i>An <b>exhibition</b> match.</i>
<b>file</b>	File a formal charge against. <i><b>File</b> a complaint.</i>
<b>gallery</b>	Spectators at a golf or tennis match. <i>An art <b>gallery</b>.</i>
<b>genealogist</b>	A person who traces or studies lines of family descent. <i>According to a <b>genealogist</b> she is the queen s 18th cousin.</i>

<b><u>historian</u></b>	An expert in or student of history, especially that of a particular period, geographical region, or social phenomenon. <i>A military <b>historian</b>.</i>
<b><u>janitor</u></b>	A person employed to look after a building; a caretaker.
<b><u>museum</u></b>	A depository for collecting and displaying objects having scientific or historical or artistic value. <i>The <b>museum</b> is noted for its fine fossil collection.</i>
<b>repository</b>	A central location in which data is stored and managed. <i>The metadata will be aggregated in a <b>repository</b>.</i>
<b>steward</b>	An official appointed to supervise arrangements or keep order at a large public event, for example a race, match, or demonstration. <i>The event was organized and <b>stewarded</b> properly.</i>
<b><u>substantiate</u></b>	Solidify, firm, or strengthen. <i>They had found nothing to <b>substantiate</b> the allegations.</i>
<b>supporter</b>	Someone who supports or champions something. <i>Labour <b>supporters</b>.</i>
<b>verify</b>	Confirm the truth of. <i>Please <b>verify</b> that the doors are closed.</i>
