<b>abiding</b>	Unceasing. <i>He had an <b>abiding</b> respect for her.</i>
<b>constant</b>	Unvarying in nature. <i>A <b>constant</b> lover.</i>
<b>continuing</b>	Without a break in continuity; ongoing. <i>A <b>continuing</b> controversy.</i>
<b>deep-rooted</b>	Deeply rooted; firmly fixed or held.
<b><u> durable </u></b>	(of a person) having endurance. <i>A <b>durable</b> peace can be achieved.</i>
<b><u> enduring </u></b>	Lasting over a period of time; durable. <i>An <b>enduring</b> disposition.</i>
<b>established</b>	Brought about or set up or accepted especially long established. <i>A team <b>established</b> as a member of a major league.</i>

<b>fast</b>	Performing or able to perform a particular action quickly. <i>The journey was <b>fast</b> and enjoyable.</i>
<b>firm</b>	Marked by firm determination or resolution not shakable. <i>She had no <b>firm</b> plans for the next day.</i>
<b>fixed</b>	Fixed and unmoving. <i>A <b>fixed</b> smile.</i>
<b>for all one's life</b>	Completely given to or absorbed by.
<b><u>lasting</u></b>	Lasting a long time without change. <i>They left a <b>lasting</b> impression.</i>
<b>long-lasting</b>	Existing for a long time.
<b>long-term</b>	Relating to or extending over a relatively long time.
<b>persisting</b>	Relentless and indefatigable in pursuit or as if in pursuit.
<b>prevailing</b>	Most frequent or common. <i>The <b>prevailing</b> mood within Whitehall circles.</i>
<b><u>remaining</u></b>	Still to happen; future. <i>Lilly was my last <b>remaining</b> close relative.</i>
<b><u>secure</u></b>	Feeling no doubts about attaining. <i>Made a <b>secure</b> place for himself in his field.</i>
<b><u>stable</u></b>	Firm and dependable; subject to little fluctuation. <i>A <b>stable</b> peace.</i>
<b>steadfast</b>	Resolutely or dutifully firm and unwavering. <i><b>Steadfast</b> resolve.</i>
<b><u>steady</u></b>	(of a person) sensible, reliable, and self-restrained. <i>A <b>steady</b> beat.</i>

<b>abide</b>	(of a feeling or memory) continue without fading or being lost. <i>I said I would <b>abide</b> by their decision.</i>
<b>all</b>	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent whole is often used informally for wholly. <i>The directions were <b>all</b> wrong.</i>
<b>be</b>	Be present. <i>The exhibition will <b>be</b> in November.</i>
<b>being</b>	Being alive living. <i>The railway brought many towns into <b>being</b>.</i>
<b>colonial</b>	A house built in colonial style. <i>British <b>colonial</b> rule.</i>
<b>creature</b>	An animal, as distinct from a human being. <i>Night sounds of birds and other <b>creatures</b>.</i>
<b>domicile</b>	The residence where you have your permanent home or principal establishment and to where whenever you are absent you intend to return every person is compelled to have one and only one domicile at a time. <i>He was <b>domiciled</b> in a frame house in the outskirts of Bogot.</i>
<b> dwell</b>	Be an inhabitant of or reside in. <i>Don t <b>dwell</b> on the past.</i>
<b> dweller</b>	A person who inhabits a particular place. <i>City <b>dwellers</b>.</i>
<b>eternally</b>	Used to emphasize expressions of admiration, gratitude, etc. <i>He was prattling on <b>eternally</b>.</i>
<b>ever</b>	At all times all the time and on every occasion. <i>He toyed with his <b>ever</b> present cigar.</i>
<b>existing</b>	Presently existing. <i>The <b>existing</b> system.</i>
<b>extant</b>	Still in existence; surviving. <i>Specimens of graphic art found among <b>extant</b> barbaric folk.</i>
<b>habitant</b>	An inhabitant. <i>The <b>habitant</b> farmhouses of old Quebec.</i>
<b>habitat</b>	The natural home or environment of an animal, plant, or other organism. <i>A marine <b>habitat</b>.</i>
<b>immortalize</b>	Be or provide a memorial to a person or an event. <i>He will be forever <b>immortalized</b> in the history books.</i>

<b><u>incarnation</u></b>	With reference to reincarnation each of a series of earthly lifetimes. <i>Beethoven was an <b>incarnation</b> of artistic genius.</i>
<b><u>inhabit</u></b>	Be an inhabitant of or reside in. <i>The region was <b>inhabited</b> by Indians.</i>
<b>inhabitant</b>	A person who fulfils the residential or legal requirements for being a member of a state or parish.
<b>life</b>	A sentence of imprisonment for life. <i>Underlay helps to prolong the <b>life</b> of a carpet.</i>
<b>live</b>	Inhabit or live in be an inhabitant of. <i>People <b>lived</b> in Africa millions of years ago.</i>
<b><u>living</u></b>	People who are still living. <i>She is a <b>living</b> doll.</i>
<b>monogamy</b>	The practice of marrying or state of being married to one person at a time. <i>Judaism has journeyed from polygamy to strict <b>monogamy</b>.</i>
<b><u>occupy</u></b>	Occupy the whole of. <i>The young prince will soon <b>occupy</b> the throne.</i>
<b><u>perpetuity</u></b>	A restriction making an interest in land inalienable perpetually or for a period beyond certain limits fixed by law. <i>He did not believe in the <b>perpetuity</b> of military rule.</i>
<b>populate</b>	Cause people to settle in (a place). <i>A cosy rural town <b>populated</b> with friendly folk.</i>
<b><u>reside</u></b>	(of a quality) be present or inherent in something. <i>Legislative powers <b>reside</b> with the Federal Assembly.</i>
<b>resident</b>	A pupil who boards at a boarding school. <i><b>Resident</b> mute swans and wintering Bewick s swans.</i>
<b>stay</b>	A period of staying somewhere in particular of living somewhere temporarily as a visitor or guest. <i>Jenny decided to <b>stay</b> at home with their young child.</i>
<b><u>whole</u></b>	Acting together as a single undiversified whole. <i>A <b>whole</b> week.</i>
