<b>course of life</b>	A line or route along which something travels or moves.
<b>days</b>	A day assigned to a particular purpose or observance. <i>The monarch s last <b>days</b>.</i>
<b>duration</b>	The time during which something continues. <i>A flight of over eight hours <b>duration</b>.</i>
<b>duration of life</b>	The property of enduring or continuing in time.
<b>existence</b>	Everything that exists anywhere. <i>The organization has been in <b>existence</b> for fifteen years.</i>

<b>functioning period</b>	A formal or official social gathering or ceremony.
<b>life</b>	A sentence of imprisonment for life. <i>He could no longer cope with the complexities of <b>life</b>.</i>
<b>life expectancy</b>	Living things collectively.
<b>life-time</b>	The period during which something is functional (as between birth and death.
<b>lifespan</b>	The length of time for which a person or animal lives or a thing functions. <i>The human <b>lifespan</b>.</i>
<b>one's career</b>	The general progression of your working or professional life.
<b>one's threescore years and ten</b>	A period of time containing 365 (or 366) days.
<b>one's time</b>	A person's experience on a particular occasion.
<b>period of effectiveness</b>	A punctuation mark (.) placed at the end of a declarative sentence to indicate a full stop or after abbreviations.
<b>period of efficacy</b>	The monthly discharge of blood from the uterus of nonpregnant women from puberty to menopause-Hippocrates.
<b>period of usefulness</b>	The end or completion of something.
<b>period of validity</b>	The monthly discharge of blood from the uterus of nonpregnant women from puberty to menopause-Hippocrates.
<b>this mortal coil</b>	A human being.
<b>time on earth</b>	A suitable moment.

<b>all</b>	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent whole is often used informally for wholly. <i>The directions were <b>all</b> wrong.</i>
<b>anthropomorphous</b>	Suggesting human characteristics for animals or inanimate things.
<b>being</b>	Being alive living. <i>A rational <b>being</b>.</i>
<b>carnal</b>	Marked by the appetites and passions of the body. <i><b>Carnal</b> knowledge.</i>
<b>complete</b>	Complete a pass. <i>No woman s wardrobe is <b>complete</b> without this pretty top.</i>
<b>denizen</b>	A person, animal, or plant that lives or is found in a particular place. <i><b>Denizens</b> of the deep.</i>



<b>entire</b>	Constituting the undiminished entirety lacking nothing essential especially not damaged. <i>My plans are to travel the <b>entire</b> world.</i>
<b>ethnicity</b>	The quality or fact of belonging to a population group or subgroup made up of people who share a common cultural background or descent. <i>The interrelationship between gender <b>ethnicity</b> and class.</i>
<b>experience</b>	Go through mental or physical states or experiences. <i>He recalled the <b>experience</b> vividly.</i>
<b>genome</b>	The complete set of genes or genetic material present in a cell or organism. <i>The human <b>genome</b> contains approximately three billion chemical base pairs.</i>
<b>human</b>	Showing the better qualities of humankind such as kindness. <i><b>Human</b> frailty.</i>
<b>humanity</b>	The quality of being humane. <i>He praised them for their standards of <b>humanity</b> and care.</i>
<b>humankind</b>	All of the living human inhabitants of the earth. <i>She always used <b>humankind</b> because mankind seemed to slight the women.</i>
<b>incarnation</b>	The form taken by a person or thing during an incarnation. <i>Rama was Vishnu s <b>incarnation</b> on earth.</i>
<b>individual</b>	Of or for a particular person. <i><b>Individual</b> drops of rain.</i>
<b>laddie</b>	A boy or young man (often as a form of address). <i>He s just a wee <b>laddie</b>.</i>
<b>lifelong</b>	Continuing through life. <i>His <b>lifelong</b> study of Greek art.</i>
<b>lifespan</b>	The length of time for which a person or animal lives or a thing functions. <i>The human <b>lifespan</b>.</i>
<b>macho</b>	Masculine in an overly assertive or aggressive way. <i>The big <b>macho</b> tough guy.</i>
<b>mankind</b>	Men, as distinct from women. <i>She always used <b>humankind</b> because <b>mankind</b> seemed to slight the women.</i>
<b>nobody</b>	A person of no influence. <i>They went from <b>nobodies</b> to superstars.</i>

<b><u>organism</u></b>	The material structure of an organism. <i>The heart s contribution to the maintenance of the human <b>organism</b>.</i>
<b>overcrowd</b>	Fill (accommodation or a space) beyond what is comfortable, safe, or desirable. <i>The students <b>overcrowded</b> the cafeteria.</i>
<b>person</b>	A category used in the classification of pronouns possessive determiners and verb forms according to whether they indicate the speaker first person the addressee second person or a third party third person. <i>A weapon was hidden on his <b>person</b>.</i>
<b><u>polarize</u></b>	Become polarized in a conflict or contrasting situation. <i><b>Polarized</b> laser light.</i>
<b>predestine</b>	Foreordain or determine beforehand. <i>Calvinists believed that every person was <b>predestined</b> by God to go to heaven or to hell.</i>
<b>somebody</b>	A human being.
<b>someone</b>	A human being.
<b><u>who</u></b>	A United Nations agency to coordinate international health activities and to help governments improve health services.
<b><u>whole</u></b>	Acting together as a single undiversified whole. <i><b>Whole</b> in mind and body.</i>
