<b>blithe</b>	Happy or carefree. <i>A <b>blithe</b> disregard for the rules of the road.</i>
<b>blithesome</b>	Carefree and happy and lighthearted. <i>A merry <b>blithesome</b> nature.</i>
<b>light-hearted</b>	Carefree and happy and lighthearted.
<b>lightsome</b>	Gracefully nimble. <i>Trilling songs with a <b>lightsome</b> heart.</i>

## Associations of "Lighthearted" (30 Words)

<b>affability</b>	The quality of having a friendly and good-natured manner. <i>An air of benign <b>affability</b>.</i>
<b>amiability</b>	A disposition to be friendly and approachable (easy to talk to). <i>His good natured <b>amiability</b>.</i>
<b>barrack</b>	Lodge in barracks. <i>The granary in which the platoons were <b>barracked</b>.</i>
<b>blithe</b>	Carefree and happy and lighthearted. <i>A <b>blithe</b> disregard for the rules of the road.</i>
<b>bluff</b>	The act of bluffing in poker deception by a false show of confidence in the strength of your cards. <i>They <b>bluffed</b> their way past the sentries.</i>
<b>briskness</b>	Liveliness and eagerness.
<b>buoyant</b>	Able or tending to keep afloat or rise to the top of a liquid or gas. <i>The conference ended with the party in a <b>buoyant</b> mood.</i>
<b><u>cheerful</u></b>	Being full of or promoting cheer; having or showing good spirits. <i>A <b>cheerful</b> room.</i>
<b>cheerfulness</b>	The quality or state of being noticeably happy and optimistic. <i>Her brand of hearty <b>cheerfulness</b>.</i>
<b>condone</b>	Excuse, overlook, or make allowances for; be lenient with. <i>The college cannot <b>condone</b> any behaviour that involves illicit drugs.</i>
<b><u>disregard</u></b>	The action or state of paying no attention to something. <i>The body of evidence is too substantial to <b>disregard</b>.</i>
<b>except</b>	Take exception to. <i>Five classes of advertisement are <b>excepted</b> from control.</i>
<b>extrovert</b>	Relating to denoting or typical of an extrovert. <i>His <b>extrovert</b> personality made him the ideal host.</i>
<b>extroverted</b>	At ease in talking to others. <i>She is <b>extroverted</b> confident and gives rousing lectures.</i>
<b>geniality</b>	A disposition to be friendly and approachable (easy to talk to). <i>He was endowed with <b>geniality</b> and good humour.</i>
<b><u>hearty</u></b>	Providing abundant nourishment. <i>Jim goes for a long walk to work up a <b>hearty</b> appetite for dinner.</i>
<b>hilarity</b>	Boisterous merriment. <i>His incredulous expression was the cause of much <b>hilarity</b>.</i>

<b>ignore</b>	Be ignorant of or in the dark about. <i>The rules <b>ignore</b> one important principle of cricket.</i>
<b>joyful</b>	Full of high-spirited delight. <i>A <b>joyful</b> heart.</i>
<b>neglect</b>	The trait of neglecting responsibilities and lacking concern. <i>He <b>neglects</b> his children.</i>
<b>omit</b>	Leave out or exclude (someone or something), either intentionally or forgetfully. <i>He was <b>omitted</b> from the second Test.</i>
<b>optimism</b>	Hopefulness and confidence about the future or the success of something. <i>The talks had been amicable and there were grounds for <b>optimism</b>.</i>
<b>optimistic</b>	Expecting the best in this best of all possible worlds. <i>Took an <b>optimistic</b> view.</i>
<b>overlook</b>	Ignore or disregard (something, especially a fault or offence). <i>They told them they were <b>overlooked</b> by some unlucky Person.</i>
<b>repulse</b>	Be repellent to; cause aversion in. <i>His evasion of her scheme had been another <b>repulse</b>.</i>
<b>scoff</b>	Speak to someone or about something in a scornfully derisive or mocking way. <i><b>Scoffs</b> of disbelief.</i>
<b>smiling</b>	Smiling with happiness or optimism. <i><b>Smiling</b> groves and terraces.</i>
<b>snub</b>	A refusal to recognize someone you know. <i>The <b>snub</b> was clearly intentional.</i>
<b>unconcerned</b>	Lacking in interest or care or feeling. <i>Blithely <b>unconcerned</b> about his friend's plight.</i>
<b>upbeat</b>	An unaccented beat (especially the last beat of a measure). <i>He was <b>upbeat</b> about the company's future.</i>
