blithe	Happy or carefree. <i>A blithe disregard for the rules of the road.</i>
blithesome	Carefree and happy and lighthearted. <i>A merry blithesome nature.</i>
light-hearted	Carefree and happy and lighthearted.
lightsome	Gracefully nimble. <i>Trilling songs with a lightsome heart.</i>

affability	The quality of having a friendly and good-natured manner. <i>An air of benign affability.</i>
amiability	A disposition to be friendly and approachable (easy to talk to). <i>His good natured amiability.</i>
barrack	Lodge in barracks. <i>The granary in which the platoons were barracked.</i>
blithe	Carefree and happy and lighthearted. <i>A blithe disregard for the rules of the road.</i>
bluff	The act of bluffing in poker deception by a false show of confidence in the strength of your cards. <i>They bluffed their way past the sentries.</i>
briskness	Liveliness and eagerness.
buoyant	Able or tending to keep afloat or rise to the top of a liquid or gas. <i>The conference ended with the party in a buoyant mood.</i>
<u>cheerful</u>	Being full of or promoting cheer; having or showing good spirits. <i>A cheerful room.</i>
cheerfulness	The quality or state of being noticeably happy and optimistic. <i>Her brand of hearty cheerfulness.</i>
condone	Excuse, overlook, or make allowances for; be lenient with. <i>The college cannot condone any behaviour that involves illicit drugs.</i>
<u>disregard</u>	The action or state of paying no attention to something. <i>The body of evidence is too substantial to disregard.</i>
except	Take exception to. <i>Five classes of advertisement are excepted from control.</i>
extrovert	Relating to denoting or typical of an extrovert. <i>His extrovert personality made him the ideal host.</i>
extroverted	At ease in talking to others. <i>She is extroverted confident and gives rousing lectures.</i>
geniality	A disposition to be friendly and approachable (easy to talk to). <i>He was endowed with geniality and good humour.</i>
<u>hearty</u>	Providing abundant nourishment. <i>Jim goes for a long walk to work up a hearty appetite for dinner.</i>
hilarity	Boisterous merriment. <i>His incredulous expression was the cause of much hilarity.</i>

ignore	Be ignorant of or in the dark about. <i>The rules ignore one important principle of cricket.</i>
joyful	Full of high-spirited delight. <i>A joyful heart.</i>
neglect	The trait of neglecting responsibilities and lacking concern. <i>He neglects his children.</i>
omit	Leave out or exclude (someone or something), either intentionally or forgetfully. <i>He was omitted from the second Test.</i>
optimism	Hopefulness and confidence about the future or the success of something. <i>The talks had been amicable and there were grounds for optimism.</i>
optimistic	Expecting the best in this best of all possible worlds. <i>Took an optimistic view.</i>
overlook	Ignore or disregard (something, especially a fault or offence). <i>They told them they were overlooked by some unlucky Person.</i>
repulse	Be repellent to; cause aversion in. <i>His evasion of her scheme had been another repulse.</i>
scoff	Speak to someone or about something in a scornfully derisive or mocking way. <i>Scoffs of disbelief.</i>
smiling	Smiling with happiness or optimism. <i>Smiling groves and terraces.</i>
snub	A refusal to recognize someone you know. <i>The snub was clearly intentional.</i>
unconcerned	Lacking in interest or care or feeling. <i>Blithely unconcerned about his friend's plight.</i>
upbeat	An unaccented beat (especially the last beat of a measure). <i>He was upbeat about the company's future.</i>
