### elation

An exhilarating psychological state of pride and optimism; an absence of depression.

### legerity

### nimbleness

*The effects of **weightlessness** on astronauts.*

### beam

An oscillating shaft which transmits the vertical piston movement of a beam engine to the crank or pump.

### brighten

Make or become happier and more cheerful.  
*Most of the country should **brighten** up later.*

### **brightly**

In a way that is characterized by having vivid colours.  
***Brightly** painted fingernails.*

### brightness

The quality or state of being well lit.  
*We can change the **brightness** of the bulb.*

### **brilliance**

Exceptional talent or intelligence.  
*He s played the stock market with great **brilliance**.*

| <b>gloss</b>        | Apply a glossy substance to.<br><i>The pebble dash of the walls was <b>glossed</b> white.</i>  |
| <b>glow</b>         | A redness of the cheeks.<br><i>Her face <b>glowed</b> when she came out of the sauna.</i>  |
| <b>hue</b>          | The attribute of a colour by virtue of which it is discernible as red, green, etc., and which is dependent on its dominant wavelength and independent of intensity or lightness.<br><i>Verdigris is greenish yellow in <b>hue</b>.</i> |
| <b>illumination</b> | A condition of spiritual awareness divine illumination.<br><i>Higher levels of <b>illumination</b> are needed for reading.</i>   |
| <b>illumine</b>     | Enlighten (someone) spiritually or intellectually.<br><i>He moved her lamp so that her face was <b>illuminated</b>.</i>  |
| <b>lamp</b>         | Supply with lamps illuminate.<br><i>Poachers snared and <b>lamped</b> at night and sold their catch in the pubs.</i>   |
| <b>lantern</b>      | A square, curved, or polygonal structure on the top of a dome or a room, with the sides glazed or open so as to admit light.<br><i>A paper <b>lantern</b>.</i>   |
| <b>light</b>        | Provide with light or lighting illuminate.<br><i>A room that is <b>light</b> when the shutters are open.</i>   |
| <b>lighten</b>      | Become more cheerful.<br><i>Efforts to <b>lighten</b> the burden of regulation.</i>  |
| <b>luminescence</b> | Light not due to incandescence; occurs at low temperatures.<br><i>Honey fungus produces a ghostly greenish <b>luminescence</b>.</i>  |

| <b>luminosity</b>     | The quality of being luminous; emitting or reflecting light.<br><i>Altair has ten times the <b>luminosity</b> of the sun.</i>           |
| <b>luster</b>         | A surface coating for ceramics or porcelain.  |
| <b>opalescence</b>    | The visual property of something having a milky brightness and a play of colors from the surface.                                       |
| <b>phosphorescent</b> | Emitting light without appreciable heat as by slow oxidation of phosphorous.<br><i>The <b>phosphorescent</b> glow of decaying wood.</i> |
| <b>polish</b>         | Improve or perfect by pruning or polishing.<br><i>He s got to <b>polish</b> up his French for his job.</i>                              |
| <b>radiance</b>       | The amount of electromagnetic radiation leaving or arriving at a point on a surface.<br><i>The <b>radiance</b> of her countenance.</i>  |
| <b>shine</b>          | Make a surface shine.<br><i>His shoes were <b>shined</b> to perfection.</i>   |
