Definitions of "Likelihood" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “likelihood” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The state or fact of something's being likely; probability.*
- *The probability of a specified outcome.*



Synonyms of "Likelihood" as a noun (9 Words)

chance	The occurrence of events in the absence of any obvious intention or cause. <i>He played down his chances of becoming chairman.</i>
conceivability	The state of being conceivable.
<u>feasibility</u>	The state or degree of being easily or conveniently done. <i>The feasibility of screening athletes for cardiac disease.</i>
likeliness	The probability of a specified outcome.
odds	The chances or likelihood of something happening or being the case. <i>He offered odds of two to one.</i>
plausibility	The quality of seeming reasonable or probable. <i>He offers no support for the plausibility of his theory.</i>
possibility	Capability of existing or happening or being true. <i>There was the possibility that he might be turned down.</i>

probability	A probable or the most probable event. <i>For a time revolution was a strong probability.</i>
prospect	A prediction of the course of a disease. <i>Norwich s unbeaten heavyweight prospect.</i>

Usage Examples of "Likelihood" as a noun

- Young people who can see no likelihood of finding employment.
- Situations where there is a likelihood of violence.

Associations of "Likelihood" (30 Words)

able	Having considerable skill proficiency or intelligence. <i>An able seaman.</i>
bound	Headed or intending to head in a certain direction often used as a combining form as in college bound students. <i>Children bound for school.</i>
chance	Be the case by chance. <i>He was very effusive if they chanced to meet.</i>
conceivably	It is conceivable or imaginable that. <i>It may conceivably cause liver disease.</i>
estimation	A rough calculation of the value, number, quantity, or extent of something. <i>The pop star rose in my estimation.</i>
feasibility	The quality of being doable. <i>The feasibility of screening athletes for cardiac disease.</i>
fluke	A stroke of luck. <i>Their victory was a bit of a fluke.</i>
likely	Likely but not certain to be or become true or real. <i>She is likely to forget.</i>
odds	The ratio between the amounts staked by the parties to a bet, based on the expected probability either way. <i>She clung to the lead against all the odds.</i>
opportune	Done or occurring at a favourable time; well timed. <i>An opportune time to receive guests.</i>
opportunity	A chance for employment or promotion. <i>The night drive gave us the opportunity of spotting rhinos.</i>

percent	A proportion in relation to a whole (which is usually the amount per hundred).
percentage	Personal benefit or advantage. <i>A large percentage increase.</i>
plausible	Apparently reasonable and valid, and truthful. <i>It seems plausible that one of two things may happen.</i>
possibility	A thing that may be chosen or done out of several possible alternatives. <i>There is no possibility of any government achieving this level of expenditure.</i>
possible	The highest possible score especially in a shooting competition. <i>The possible effects of global warming.</i>
potential	The inherent capacity for coming into being. <i>Measurements of induced electrical potentials.</i>
potentiality	An aptitude that may be developed. <i>The technology is still relatively not well known in spite of its great potentiality.</i>
practical	Having or put to a practical purpose or use. <i>A practical knowledge of Japanese.</i>
presumable	Capable of being inferred on slight grounds.
presumptive	Affording reasonable grounds for belief or acceptance. <i>A strong presumptive case is made out.</i>
probabilistic	Based on or adapted to a theory of probability; subject to or involving chance variation. <i>The main approaches are either rule based or probabilistic.</i>
probability	The quality of being probable; a probable event or the most probable event. <i>For a time revolution was a strong probability.</i>
probable	A person who is likely to become or do something, especially one who is likely to be chosen for a team. <i>The probable consequences of his action.</i>
probably	With considerable certainty; without much doubt. <i>She would probably never see him again.</i>
prospect	The possibility or likelihood of some future event occurring. <i>Many charities are prospecting for new donors.</i>
randomize	Make (a set of items, people, etc.) unpredictable, unsystematic, or random in order or arrangement. <i>You can randomize the ingredients with the tap of a button.</i>
