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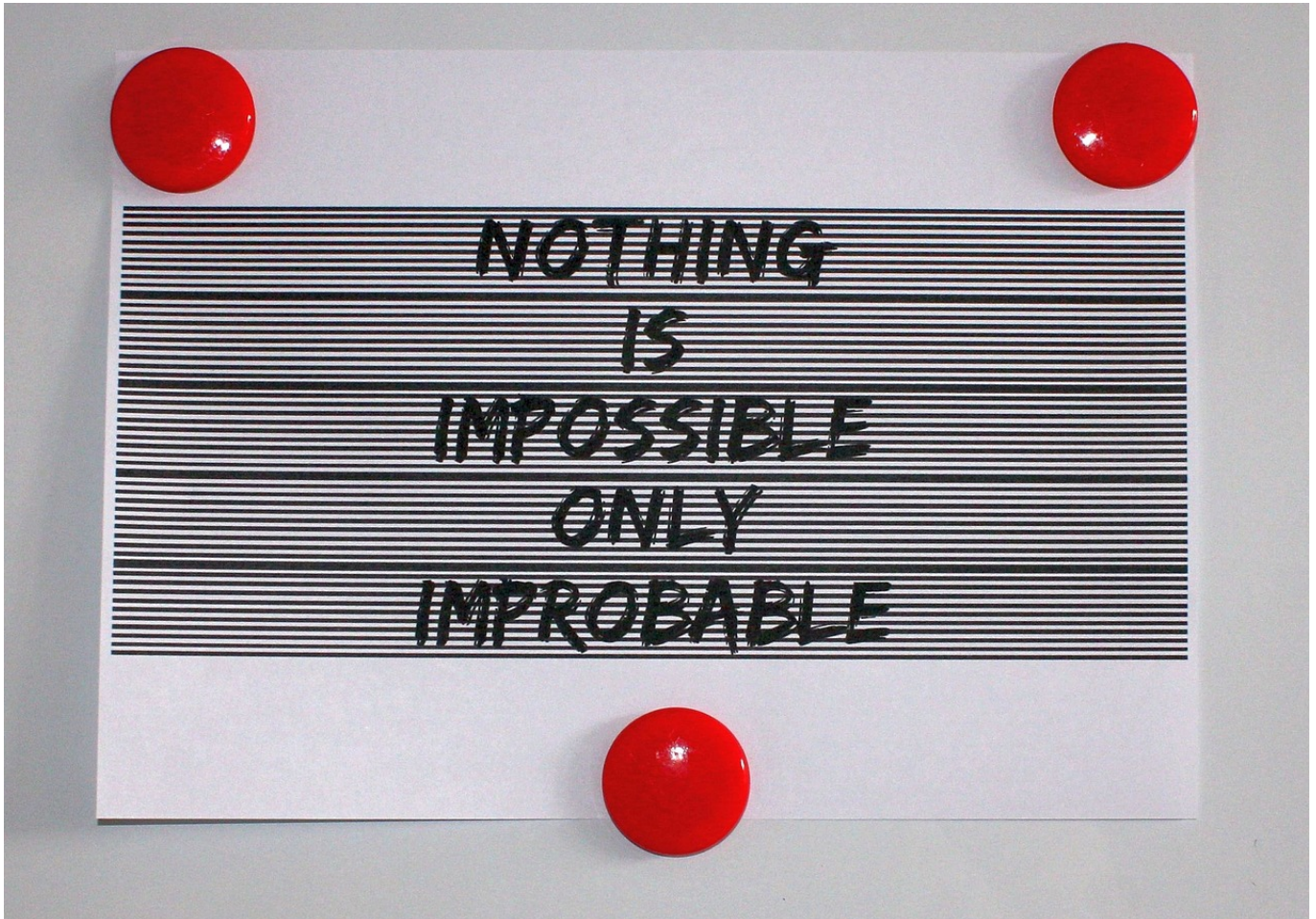
**The synonyms of “Likelihood” are: likeliness, probability, chance, prospect, possibility, odds, feasibility, plausibility, conceivability**

## Likelihood as a Noun

### Definitions of "Likelihood" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “likelihood” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The state or fact of something's being likely; probability.*
- *The probability of a specified outcome.*



## Synonyms of "Likelihood" as a noun (9 Words)

<b>chance</b>	The occurrence of events in the absence of any obvious intention or cause. <i>He played down his <b>chances</b> of becoming chairman.</i>
<b>conceivability</b>	The state of being conceivable.
<b>feasibility</b>	The state or degree of being easily or conveniently done. <i>The <b>feasibility</b> of screening athletes for cardiac disease.</i>
<b>likeliness</b>	The probability of a specified outcome.
<b>odds</b>	The chances or likelihood of something happening or being the case. <i>He offered <b>odds</b> of two to one.</i>
<b>plausibility</b>	The quality of seeming reasonable or probable. <i>He offers no support for the <b>plausibility</b> of his theory.</i>
<b>possibility</b>	Capability of existing or happening or being true. <i>There was the <b>possibility</b> that he might be turned down.</i>

<b>probability</b>	A probable or the most probable event. <i>For a time revolution was a strong <b>probability</b>.</i>
<b>prospect</b>	A prediction of the course of a disease. <i>Norwich s unbeaten heavyweight <b>prospect</b>.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Likelihood" as a noun

- *Young people who can see no likelihood of finding employment.*
- *Situations where there is a likelihood of violence.*

## Associations of "Likelihood" (30 Words)

<b>able</b>	Having considerable skill proficiency or intelligence. <i>An <b>able</b> seaman.</i>
<b>bound</b>	Headed or intending to head in a certain direction often used as a combining form as in college bound students. <i>Children <b>bound</b> for school.</i>
<b>chance</b>	Be the case by chance. <i>He was very effusive if they <b>chanced</b> to meet.</i>
<b>conceivably</b>	It is conceivable or imaginable that. <i>It may <b>conceivably</b> cause liver disease.</i>
<b>estimation</b>	A rough calculation of the value, number, quantity, or extent of something. <i>The pop star rose in my <b>estimation</b>.</i>
<b>feasibility</b>	The quality of being doable. <i>The <b>feasibility</b> of screening athletes for cardiac disease.</i>
<b>fluke</b>	A stroke of luck. <i>Their victory was a bit of a <b>fluke</b>.</i>
<b>likely</b>	Likely but not certain to be or become true or real. <i>She is <b>likely</b> to forget.</i>
<b>odds</b>	The ratio between the amounts staked by the parties to a bet, based on the expected probability either way. <i>She clung to the lead against all the <b>odds</b>.</i>
<b>opportune</b>	Done or occurring at a favourable time; well timed. <i>An <b>opportune</b> time to receive guests.</i>
<b>opportunity</b>	A chance for employment or promotion. <i>The night drive gave us the <b>opportunity</b> of spotting rhinos.</i>

<b>percent</b>	A proportion in relation to a whole (which is usually the amount per hundred).
<b>percentage</b>	Personal benefit or advantage. <i>A large <b>percentage</b> increase.</i>
<b>plausible</b>	Apparently reasonable and valid, and truthful. <i>It seems <b>plausible</b> that one of two things may happen.</i>
<b>possibility</b>	A thing that may be chosen or done out of several possible alternatives. <i>There is no <b>possibility</b> of any government achieving this level of expenditure.</i>
<b>possible</b>	The highest possible score especially in a shooting competition. <i>The <b>possible</b> effects of global warming.</i>
<b>potential</b>	The inherent capacity for coming into being. <i>Measurements of induced electrical <b>potentials</b>.</i>
<b>potentiality</b>	An aptitude that may be developed. <i>The technology is still relatively not well known in spite of its great <b>potentiality</b>.</i>
<b>practical</b>	Having or put to a practical purpose or use. <i>A <b>practical</b> knowledge of Japanese.</i>
<b>presumable</b>	Capable of being inferred on slight grounds.
<b>presumptive</b>	Affording reasonable grounds for belief or acceptance. <i>A strong <b>presumptive</b> case is made out.</i>
<b>probabilistic</b>	Based on or adapted to a theory of probability; subject to or involving chance variation. <i>The main approaches are either rule based or <b>probabilistic</b>.</i>
<b>probability</b>	The quality of being probable; a probable event or the most probable event. <i>For a time revolution was a strong <b>probability</b>.</i>
<b>probable</b>	A person who is likely to become or do something, especially one who is likely to be chosen for a team. <i>The <b>probable</b> consequences of his action.</i>
<b>probably</b>	With considerable certainty; without much doubt. <i>She would <b>probably</b> never see him again.</i>
<b>prospect</b>	The possibility or likelihood of some future event occurring. <i>Many charities are <b>prospecting</b> for new donors.</i>
<b>randomize</b>	Make (a set of items, people, etc.) unpredictable, unsystematic, or random in order or arrangement. <i>You can <b>randomize</b> the ingredients with the tap of a button.</i>
