## Likewise as an Adverb

### Definitions of "Likewise" as an adverb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “likewise” as an adverb can have the following definitions:

- *In like or similar manner- Samuel Johnson.*
- *In addition.*
- *In the same way; also.*
- *In a like manner; similarly.*
- *In like or similar manner.*
- *Used to introduce a point similar or related to one just made.*

### Synonyms of "Likewise" as an adverb (12 Words)

<b>alike</b>	Equally. <i>They dressed <b>alike</b> in black trousers and jackets.</i>
<b>also</b>	In addition. <i>A brilliant linguist he was <b>also</b> interested in botany.</i>
<b>as well</b>	To the same degree (often followed by `as.

<b>besides</b>	Used to introduce an additional idea or explanation. <i>I don't want to go to a restaurant <b>besides</b> we can't afford it.</i>
<b>by the same token</b>	In reserve; not for immediate use.
<b>correspondingly</b>	In an analogous or equivalent way. <i>It has fewer problems and <b>correspondingly</b> requires less maintenance.</i>
<b>in addition</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>in like manner</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>in similar fashion</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>in the same way</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>similarly</b>	In like or similar manner- Samuel Johnson. <i>He was <b>similarly</b> affected.</i>
<b>too</b>	Moreover (used when adding a further point). <i><b>Too</b> big.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Likewise" as an adverb

- *The banks advise against sending cash. Likewise, sending British cheques may cause problems.*
- *Some people have little power to do good, and have likewise little strength to resist evil.*
- *The programmes of study will apply from five years of age, likewise the attainment targets.*
- *I stuck out my tongue and Frankie did likewise.*

## Associations of "Likewise" (30 Words)

<b>additionally</b>	Used to introduce a new fact or argument. <i>Brokers finance themselves <b>additionally</b> by short term borrowing.</i>
<b>again</b>	Another time; once more. <i>The wages were low but they made half as much <b>again</b> in tips.</i>
<b>also</b>	In addition; too. <i><b>Also</b> a car is very expensive to run.</i>
<b>ambivalence</b>	Mixed feelings or emotions. <i>The law's <b>ambivalence</b> about the importance of a victim's identity.</i>
<b>another</b>	Any of various alternatives; some other. <i>Put it off to <b>another</b> or some other day.</i>

<b>anyway</b>	Used to end a conversation, to change the subject, or to resume a subject after interruption. <i>I told you it s all right and <b>anyway</b> it was my fault.</i>
<b>besides</b>	Used to introduce an additional idea or explanation. <i>I don t want to go to a restaurant <b>besides</b> we can t afford it.</i>
<b>bilateral</b>	Involving two parties, especially countries. <i>The <b>bilateral</b> agreements with Japan.</i>
<b>both</b>	Two considered together; the two. <i><b>Both</b> girls are pretty.</i>
<b>compatibility</b>	The ability of one computer, piece of software, etc. to work with another. <i>He argues for the <b>compatibility</b> of science and religion.</i>
<b>either</b>	After a negative statement used as an intensive meaning something like `likewise' or `also.'
<b>exceedingly</b>	To a great extent. <i>The supply multiplied <b>exceedingly</b>.</i>
<b>except</b>	Take exception to. <i>Five classes of advertisement are <b>excepted</b> from control.</i>
<b>excessively</b>	To a greater degree or in greater amounts than is necessary, normal, or desirable; inordinately. <i><b>Excessively</b> high taxes.</i>
<b>exclude</b>	Expel (a pupil) from school. <i>One cannot <b>exclude</b> the possibility of a fall in house prices.</i>
<b>extremely</b>	To a very great degree; very. <i>This is an <b>extremely</b> difficult thing to do.</i>
<b>furthermore</b>	In addition; besides (used to introduce a fresh consideration in an argument). <i>Computer chess games are getting cheaper all the time <b>furthermore</b> their quality is improving.</i>
<b>like</b>	Conforming in every respect. <i>She <b>likes</b> to read Russian novels.</i>
<b>more</b>	Forming the comparative of adjectives and adverbs especially those of more than one syllable. <i>A hall with <b>more</b> seats.</i>
<b>moreover</b>	In addition. <i><b>Moreover</b> statistics show that competition for places is growing.</i>
<b>overdo</b>	Overcook. <i>She rather <b>overdoes</b> the early cockney scenes.</i>

<b><u>overly</u></b>	Excessively. <i>She was a jealous and <b>overly</b> possessive woman.</i>
<b>prolix</b>	Tediously prolonged or tending to speak or write at great length. <i>A <b>prolix</b> lecturer telling you more than you want to know.</i>
<b>remarkably</b>	In a way that is worthy of attention. <i>He seems <b>remarkably</b> relaxed about the whole thing.</i>
<b>reversion</b>	A property to which someone has the right of reversion. <i>A <b>reversion</b> to the two party system.</i>
<b>similar</b>	A person or thing similar to another. <i>They wore <b>similar</b> coats.</i>
<b>similarly</b>	In like or similar manner- Samuel Johnson. <i>He was <b>similarly</b> affected.</i>
<b><u>simplistic</u></b>	Characterized by extreme and often misleading simplicity. <i>A <b>simplistic</b> theory of the universe.</i>
<b><u>too</u></b>	To a higher degree than is desirable, permissible, or possible; excessively. <i>She is a grown woman and a strong one <b>too</b>.</i>
<b><u>undue</u></b>	Lacking justification or authorization. <i><b>Undue</b> influence.</i>
