besides	Used to introduce an additional idea or explanation. <i>I don't want to go to a restaurant besides we can't afford it.</i>
by the same token	In reserve; not for immediate use.
correspondingly	In an analogous or equivalent way. <i>It has fewer problems and correspondingly requires less maintenance.</i>
in addition	To or toward the inside of.
in like manner	To or toward the inside of.
in similar fashion	To or toward the inside of.
in the same way	To or toward the inside of.
similarly	In like or similar manner- Samuel Johnson. <i>He was similarly affected.</i>
too	Moreover (used when adding a further point). <i>Too big.</i>

- *Some people have little power to do good, and have likewise little strength to resist evil.*
- *The programmes of study will apply from five years of age, likewise the attainment targets.*
- *I stuck out my tongue and Frankie did likewise.*

again	Another time; once more. <i>The wages were low but they made half as much again in tips.</i>
also	In addition; too. <i>Also a car is very expensive to run.</i>
ambivalence	Mixed feelings or emotions. <i>The law's ambivalence about the importance of a victim's identity.</i>
another	Any of various alternatives; some other. <i>Put it off to another or some other day.</i>

anyway	Used to end a conversation, to change the subject, or to resume a subject after interruption. <i>I told you it s all right and anyway it was my fault.</i>
besides	Used to introduce an additional idea or explanation. <i>I don t want to go to a restaurant besides we can t afford it.</i>
bilateral	Involving two parties, especially countries. <i>The bilateral agreements with Japan.</i>
both	Two considered together; the two. <i>Both girls are pretty.</i>
compatibility	The ability of one computer, piece of software, etc. to work with another. <i>He argues for the compatibility of science and religion.</i>
either	After a negative statement used as an intensive meaning something like `likewise' or `also.'
exceedingly	To a great extent. <i>The supply multiplied exceedingly.</i>
except	Take exception to. <i>Five classes of advertisement are excepted from control.</i>
excessively	To a greater degree or in greater amounts than is necessary, normal, or desirable; inordinately. <i>Excessively high taxes.</i>
exclude	Expel (a pupil) from school. <i>One cannot exclude the possibility of a fall in house prices.</i>
extremely	To a very great degree; very. <i>This is an extremely difficult thing to do.</i>
furthermore	In addition; besides (used to introduce a fresh consideration in an argument). <i>Computer chess games are getting cheaper all the time furthermore their quality is improving.</i>
like	Conforming in every respect. <i>She likes to read Russian novels.</i>
more	Forming the comparative of adjectives and adverbs especially those of more than one syllable. <i>A hall with more seats.</i>
moreover	In addition. <i>Moreover statistics show that competition for places is growing.</i>
overdo	Overcook. <i>She rather overdoes the early cockney scenes.</i>

<u>overly</u>	Excessively. <i>She was a jealous and overly possessive woman.</i>
prolix	Tediously prolonged or tending to speak or write at great length. <i>A prolix lecturer telling you more than you want to know.</i>
remarkably	In a way that is worthy of attention. <i>He seems remarkably relaxed about the whole thing.</i>
reversion	A property to which someone has the right of reversion. <i>A reversion to the two party system.</i>
similar	A person or thing similar to another. <i>They wore similar coats.</i>
similarly	In like or similar manner- Samuel Johnson. <i>He was similarly affected.</i>
<u>simplistic</u>	Characterized by extreme and often misleading simplicity. <i>A simplistic theory of the universe.</i>
<u>too</u>	To a higher degree than is desirable, permissible, or possible; excessively. <i>She is a grown woman and a strong one too.</i>
<u>undue</u>	Lacking justification or authorization. <i>Undue influence.</i>
