### Definitions of "Limbo" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “limbo” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *(theology) in Roman Catholicism, the place of unbaptized but innocent or righteous souls (such as infants and virtuous individuals).*
- *An imaginary place for lost or neglected things.*
- *A state of neglect or oblivion.*
- *The state of being disregarded or forgotten.*
- *An uncertain period of awaiting a decision or resolution; an intermediate state or condition.*
- *(in some Christian beliefs) the supposed abode of the souls of unbaptized infants, and of the just who died before Christ's coming.*
- *In Roman Catholicism, the place of unbaptized but innocent or righteous souls (such as infants and virtuous individuals).*



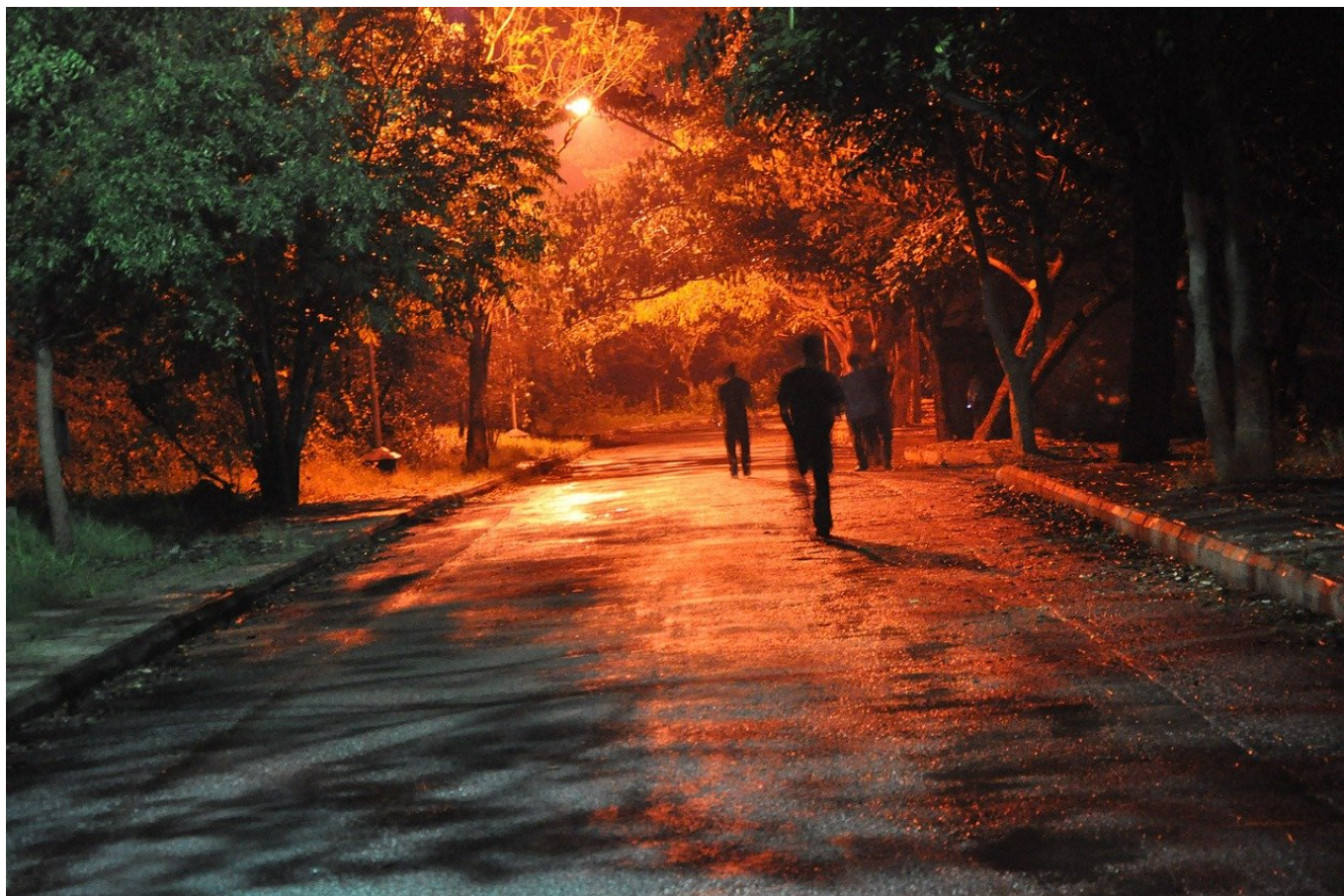
## Synonyms of "Limbo" as a noun (4 Words)

**in abeyance** A unit of length equal to one twelfth of a foot.

**neither heaven nor hell** The abode of God and the angels.

**oblivion** Destruction or extinction.  
*They drank themselves into **oblivion**.*

**void** A completely empty space.  
*His loss leaves a **void** in the community.*



## Usage Examples of "Limbo" as a noun

- *These prisoners are in limbo: no one is responsible for their welfare.*
- *The legal battle could leave the club in limbo until next year.*

## Associations of "Limbo" (30 Words)

### **amaze**

Be a mystery or bewildering to.

*He has been **amazed** by the quality of the employees at the bank.*

### **amnesia**

A partial or total loss of memory.

*They were suffering from **amnesia**.*

### **astonish**

Affect with wonder.

*You never fail to **astonish** me.*

### **astound**

Shock or greatly surprise.

*Her bluntness **astounded** him.*



<b><u>blank</u></b>	A document with blank spaces to be filled. <b>Blank</b> cassettes.
<b><u>coma</u></b>	(astronomy) the luminous cloud of particles surrounding the frozen nucleus of a comet; forms as the comet approaches the sun and is warmed. <i>She went into a <b>coma</b>.</i>
<b><u>daze</u></b>	Confusion characterized by lack of clarity. <i>She was <b>dazed</b> by his revelations.</i>
<b>dementia</b>	Mental deterioration of organic or functional origin.
<b>distract</b>	Distracted or absent-minded. <i>He seemed oddly <b>distract</b>.</i>
<b><u>distraught</u></b>	Very worried and upset. <i>He is terribly <b>distraught</b>.</i>
<b><u>faint</u></b>	Pass out from weakness, physical or emotional distress due to a loss of blood supply to the brain. <b>Faint</b> heart ne er won fair lady.
<b>faze</b>	Disturb the composure of. <i>She was not <b>fazed</b> by his show of anger.</i>
<b>forgetful</b>	Apt or likely not to remember. <b>Forgetful</b> of her responsibilities.
<b>forgetfulness</b>	Lapse of memory. <i>She teased him for his <b>forgetfulness</b>.</i>
<b>inattentive</b>	Showing a lack of attention or care. <b>Inattentive</b> students.
<b><u>nervous</u></b>	Of or relating to the nervous system. <b>Nervous</b> disease.
<b><u>oblivion</u></b>	The state of being forgotten, especially by the public. <i>He sought the great <b>oblivion</b> of sleep.</i>
<b>paralyze</b>	Cause to be paralyzed and immobile. <i>The poison <b>paralyzed</b> him.</i>
<b><u>smitten</u></b>	Affected by something overwhelming. Conscience <b>smitten</b> .
<b><u>staggering</u></b>	Deeply shocking; astonishing. <i>Suffered a <b>staggering</b> defeat.</i>
<b><u>startle</u></b>	To stimulate to action. <i>She <b>startled</b> when I walked into the room.</i>
<b>stun</b>	Astonish or shock (someone) so that they are temporarily unable to react. <i>The community was <b>stunned</b> by the tragedy.</i>

<b>stupefy</b>	Astonish and shock. <i>The offence of administering drugs to a woman with intent to <b>stupefy</b> her.</i>
<b><u>stupor</u></b>	Marginal consciousness. <i>A drunken <b>stupor</b>.</i>
<b>surprise</b>	Cause to be surprised. <i>She <b>surprised</b> the couple.</i>
<b><u>traumatic</u></b>	Psychologically painful. <i>She was going through a <b>traumatic</b> divorce.</i>
<b><u>unaware</u></b>	Not aware. <i><b>Unaware</b> of the danger they were in.</i>
<b><u>unconscious</u></b>	The part of the mind which is inaccessible to the conscious mind but which affects behaviour and emotions. <i>What is it he said again <b>unconscious</b> of the repetition.</i>
<b>unmindful</b>	Not mindful or attentive. <i>While thus <b>unmindful</b> of his steps he stumbled.</i>
<b><u>vertigo</u></b>	A reeling sensation; a feeling that you are about to fall.
