Definitions of "Limbo" as a noun

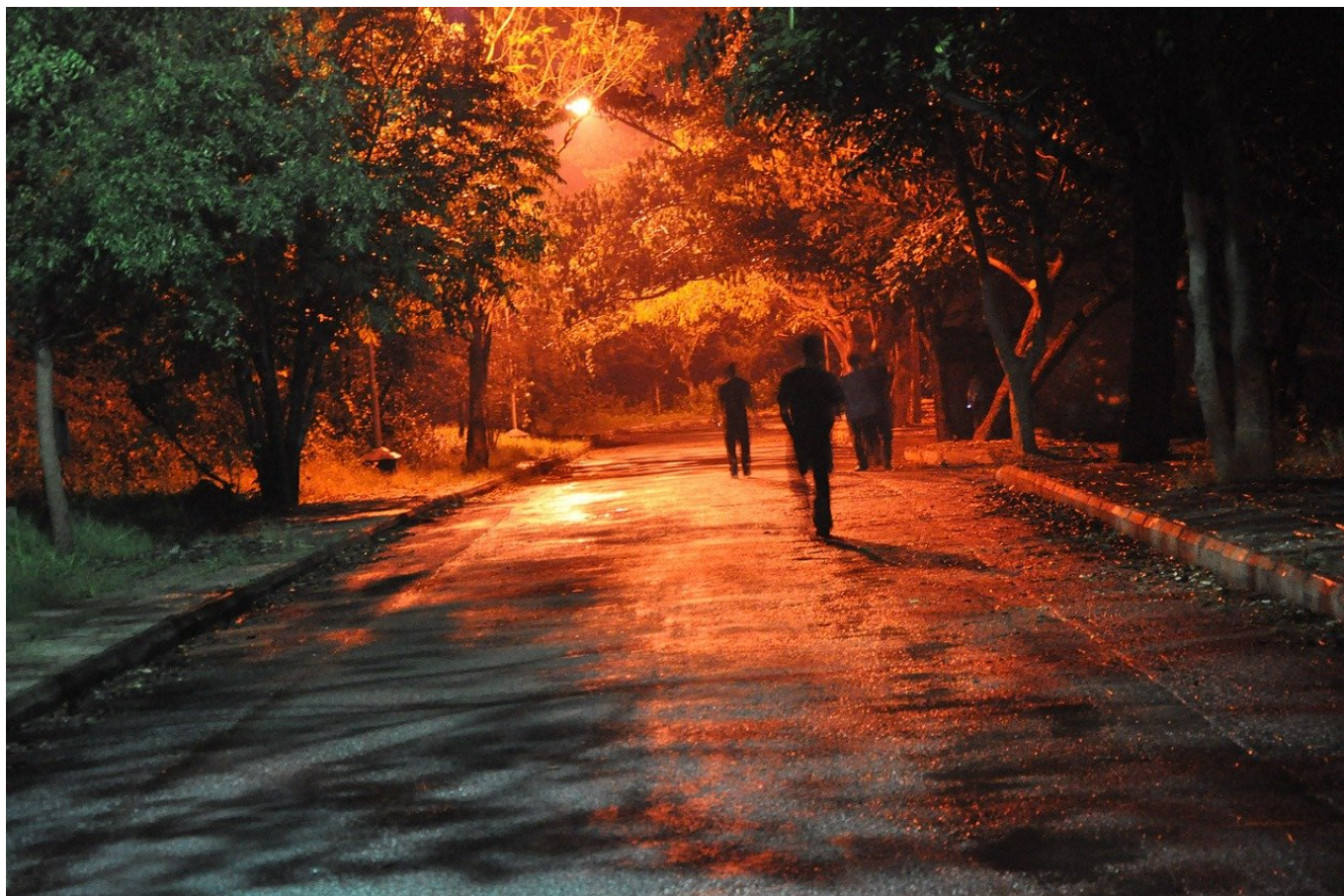
According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “limbo” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *(theology) in Roman Catholicism, the place of unbaptized but innocent or righteous souls (such as infants and virtuous individuals).*
- *An imaginary place for lost or neglected things.*
- *A state of neglect or oblivion.*
- *The state of being disregarded or forgotten.*
- *An uncertain period of awaiting a decision or resolution; an intermediate state or condition.*
- *(in some Christian beliefs) the supposed abode of the souls of unbaptized infants, and of the just who died before Christ's coming.*
- *In Roman Catholicism, the place of unbaptized but innocent or righteous souls (such as infants and virtuous individuals).*



Synonyms of "Limbo" as a noun (4 Words)

in abeyance	A unit of length equal to one twelfth of a foot.
neither heaven nor hell	The abode of God and the angels.
<u>oblivion</u>	Destruction or extinction. <i>They drank themselves into oblivion.</i>
<u>void</u>	A completely empty space. <i>His loss leaves a void in the community.</i>



Usage Examples of "Limbo" as a noun

- *These prisoners are in limbo: no one is responsible for their welfare.*
- *The legal battle could leave the club in limbo until next year.*

Associations of "Limbo" (30 Words)

amaze

Be a mystery or bewildering to.

*He has been **amazed** by the quality of the employees at the bank.*

amnesia

A partial or total loss of memory.

*They were suffering from **amnesia**.*

astonish

Affect with wonder.

*You never fail to **astonish** me.*

astound

Shock or greatly surprise.

*Her bluntness **astounded** him.*

<u>blank</u>	A document with blank spaces to be filled. Blank cassettes.
<u>coma</u>	(astronomy) the luminous cloud of particles surrounding the frozen nucleus of a comet; forms as the comet approaches the sun and is warmed. <i>She went into a coma.</i>
<u>daze</u>	Confusion characterized by lack of clarity. <i>She was dazed by his revelations.</i>
dementia	Mental deterioration of organic or functional origin.
distract	Distracted or absent-minded. <i>He seemed oddly distract.</i>
<u>distraught</u>	Very worried and upset. <i>He is terribly distraught.</i>
<u>faint</u>	Pass out from weakness, physical or emotional distress due to a loss of blood supply to the brain. Faint heart ne er won fair lady.
faze	Disturb the composure of. <i>She was not fazed by his show of anger.</i>
forgetful	Apt or likely not to remember. Forgetful of her responsibilities.
forgetfulness	Lapse of memory. <i>She teased him for his forgetfulness.</i>
inattentive	Showing a lack of attention or care. Inattentive students.
<u>nervous</u>	Of or relating to the nervous system. Nervous disease.
<u>oblivion</u>	The state of being forgotten, especially by the public. <i>He sought the great oblivion of sleep.</i>
paralyze	Cause to be paralyzed and immobile. <i>The poison paralyzed him.</i>
<u>smitten</u>	Affected by something overwhelming. <i>Conscience smitten.</i>
<u>staggering</u>	Deeply shocking; astonishing. <i>Suffered a staggering defeat.</i>
<u>startle</u>	To stimulate to action. <i>She startled when I walked into the room.</i>
stun	Astonish or shock (someone) so that they are temporarily unable to react. <i>The community was stunned by the tragedy.</i>

stupefy	Astonish and shock. <i>The offence of administering drugs to a woman with intent to stupefy her.</i>
<u>stupor</u>	Marginal consciousness. <i>A drunken stupor.</i>
surprise	Cause to be surprised. <i>She surprised the couple.</i>
<u>traumatic</u>	Psychologically painful. <i>She was going through a traumatic divorce.</i>
<u>unaware</u>	Not aware. <i>Unaware of the danger they were in.</i>
<u>unconscious</u>	The part of the mind which is inaccessible to the conscious mind but which affects behaviour and emotions. <i>What is it he said again unconscious of the repetition.</i>
unmindful	Not mindful or attentive. <i>While thus unmindful of his steps he stumbled.</i>
<u>vertigo</u>	A reeling sensation; a feeling that you are about to fall.
