- Pin inserted through an axletree to hold a wheel on.
- A pin passed through the end of an axle to keep a wheel in position.

anchor	An anchorman or anchorwoman. The European Community is the economic anchor of the New Europe.
backbone	The part of a network that connects other networks together. Prickles of sweat broke out along her backbone .
<u>basis</u>	The system or principles according to which an activity or process is carried on. <i>Trust is the only basis for a good working relationship.</i>
bedrock	The fundamental principles on which something is based. Honesty is the bedrock of a good relationship.



central point	A workplace that serves as a telecommunications facility where lines from telephones can be connected together to permit communication.
centre	The filling in a chocolate. A conference centre .
centre of attention	The faculty or power of mental concentration.
<u>cornerstone</u>	A stone in the exterior of a large and important building; usually carved with a date and laid with appropriate ceremonies. <i>A national minimum wage remained the cornerstone of policy.</i>
cynosure	A person or thing that is the centre of attention or admiration. <i>Let faith be your cynosure to walk by.</i>
heart	One of the four suits in a conventional pack of playing cards denoted by a red heart shaped figure. <i>The heart of the matter</i> .
<u>hub</u>	The central part of a car wheel (or fan or propeller etc) through which the shaft or axle passes. <i>The airport authority s policy promotes Manchester as an international</i> hub .
kernel	The choicest or most essential or most vital part of some idea or experience. <i>Pine kernels.</i>
keystone	A central cohesive source of support and stability. The keystone of campaign reform was the ban on soft money.
kingpin	The most important person in a group or undertaking. The kingpin s of the television industry.
lynchpin	Pin inserted through an axletree to hold a wheel on.
<u>mainstay</u>	A central cohesive source of support and stability. Farming is the mainstay of the rural economy.
marrow	The plant of the gourd family which produces marrows. <i>Marrow donors.</i>
<u>meat</u>	The flesh of an animal, typically a mammal or bird, as food (the flesh of domestic fowls is sometimes distinguished as poultry. <i>We have talked at meat with this stranger.</i>
nub	The crux or central point of a matter. He pressed down on the two nub s on top of the phone.
nucleus	The positively charged central core of an atom, consisting of protons and neutrons and containing nearly all its mass. <i>The nucleus of a British film producing industry.</i>



pivotThe act of turning on or as if on a pivot.
The **pivot** of community life was the chapel.
