- The kinship relation between an individual and the individual's progenitors.
- Inherited properties shared with others of your bloodline.
- A sequence of cells in the body which developed from a common ancestral cell.
- A rate of payment for written material that is measured according to the number of lines submitted.
- Direct descent from an ancestor; ancestry or pedigree.

<u>birth</u>	The process of giving birth. The mother is English by <b>birth</b> .

blood line	People viewed as members of a group.
<u>bloodline</u>	The descendants of one individual. The survival of a legitimate royal <b>bloodline</b> .
derivation	The process whereby new words are formed from existing words or bases by affixation. Singer from sing or undo from do are examples of <b>derivations</b> .



<u>descent</u>	A downward slope. His <b>descent</b> s on the manager of any shop he took a fancy to visit.	
family	All the descendants of a common ancestor. The house has been owned by the same <b>family</b> for 300 years.	
filiation	Inherited properties shared with others of your bloodline. The <b>filiation</b> of many of his ideas from those developed by Carpenter.	
linage	The number of lines in a piece of printed material.	
line	A contour or outline considered as a feature of design or composition. Passengers were hit by delays caused by leaves on the <b>line</b> .	
<b>line of descent</b> A conductor for transmitting electrical or optical signals or electric power.		
<u>origin</u>	An event that is a beginning; a first part or stage of subsequent events. <i>Origin</i> in sensation.	
parentage	The descendants of one individual. A boy of Jamaican <b>parentage</b> .	
<u>pedigree</u>	The record of descent of an animal, showing it to be pure-bred. My host showed me his family <b>pedigree</b> .	
stemma	A recorded genealogy of a family; a family tree.	
<u>stock</u>	A portion of a company s stock as held by an individual or group as an investment. His <b>stock</b> was so high he could have been elected mayor.

<u>ancestor</u>	An early version of a machine, system, etc. This instrument is an <b>ancestor</b> of the lute.
ancestral	Of, belonging to, or inherited from an ancestor or ancestors. Ancestral home.
<u>ancestry</u>	One's family or ethnic descent. <i>He was proud of his Irish <b>ancestry</b>.</i>
<u>antecedent</u>	Denoting or counting as an antecedent. Her early life and <b>antecedent</b> s have been traced.
ascendant	Most powerful or important or influential. Rooted and <b>ascendant</b> strength like that of foliage.
birthright	A particular right of possession or privilege a person has from birth, especially as an eldest son. She saw a liberal education as the <b>birthright</b> of every child.
<u>blood</u>	An internal bodily fluid in invertebates which performs a similar function to blood in humans and other vertebrates. A nurse was out on the corridor taking <b>blood</b> s from the patients.
<u>clan</u>	A group of people with a strong common interest. Civil strife has followed as rival <b>clan</b> s jockey for power.
ewe	Female sheep.
family	A person having kinship with another or others. The <b>family</b> lived in a large house with a lot of land.
fleece	Tanned skin of a sheep with the fleece left on used for clothing. A reversible <b>fleece</b> jacket.
forebear	An ancestor. Generations of his <b>forebear</b> s had lived in London.
forefather	A member of the past generations of one's family or people; an ancestor. <i>Our <b>forefather</b>s brought forth a great nation.</i>



genealogy	The study and tracing of lines of descent. The genealogies of the kings of Mercia.
hometown	The town (or city) where you grew up or where you have your principal residence. <i>He never went back to his <b>hometown</b> again.</i>
hominoid	Relating to hominoid primates.
inbreeding	The act of mating closely related individuals. Persistent <b>inbreeding</b> has produced an unusually high frequency of sufferers from this disease.
lineal	Arranged in a line. <i>Lineal</i> heirs.
mulatto	An offspring of a black and a white parent.
parentage	The descendants of one individual. A boy of Jamaican <b>parentage</b> .
patriarch	Title for the heads of the Eastern Orthodox Churches (in Istanbul and Alexandria and Moscow and Jerusalem. <i>He s the <b>patriarch</b> of all spin doctors.</i>
patrimony	An inheritance coming by right of birth (especially by primogeniture. <b>Patrimony</b> laws.
<u>pedigree</u>	A genealogical table. With a <b>pedigree</b> equal to many of the gentry.
primogenitor	An ancestor, especially the earliest ancestor of a people; a progenitor.
<u>progenitor</u>	A person or thing from which a person, animal, or plant is descended or originates; an ancestor or parent. <i>The progenitor</i> of modern jazz.
purebred	A pedigreed animal of unmixed lineage; used especially of horses.
thoroughbred	A horse of a thoroughbred breed. Some riders will only buy <b>thoroughbred</b> horses.
unmixed	Not mixed. Bold <b>unmixed</b> colours.
<u>worship</u>	The activity of worshipping. She adores her sons and they <b>worship</b> her.
