<b>attachment</b>	An extra part or extension that is or may be attached to something to perform a particular function. <i>The processor comes complete with a blender <b>attachment</b>.</i>
<b>bond</b>	Criminal law money that must be forfeited by the bondsman if an accused person fails to appear in court for trial. <i>There was a <b>bond</b> of understanding between them.</i> A feeling of belonging to or having affinity with a particular person or group.
<b>connectedness</b>	<i>Individuals from these cultures value <b>connectedness</b> with family and friends.</i>
<b>connection</b>	The placing of parts of an electric circuit in contact so that a current may flow. <i>We had to wait for our <b>connection</b> to Frankfurt.</i>
<b>connective</b>	An instrumentality that connects. <i>She would be more likely to use a temporal <b>connective</b> such as before after or then than to use a causal <b>connective</b>.</i>
<b>connector</b>	A device for keeping two parts of an electric circuit in contact. <i>He didn't have the right <b>connector</b> between the amplifier and the speakers.</i>
<b>connexion</b>	The process of bringing ideas or events together in memory or imagination.
<b>contact</b>	A junction where things as two electrical conductors touch or are in physical contact. <i><b>Contact</b> dermatitis.</i>
<b>coupling</b>	A small indefinite number. <i>A train with <b>couplings</b> of the continental pattern.</i>
<b>data link</b>	A collection of facts from which conclusions may be drawn.
<b>inter-group communication</b>	Something that is communicated by or to or between people or groups.
<b>joint</b>	A section of a plant stem between two joints an internode. <i>He rolled a <b>joint</b>.</i>

<b>knot</b>	A length marked by knots on a log line as a measure of speed. <i>His stomach was in <b>knots</b>.</i>
<b><u>liaison</u></b>	The binding or thickening agent of a sauce, often based on egg yolks. <i>He provided a <b>liaison</b> with the guerrillas.</i>
<b>linkage</b>	The act of linking things together. <i>Close <b>linkages</b> between private and public capital.</i>
<b>linkup</b>	A fastener that serves to join or connect.
<b><u>loop</u></b>	An intrauterine device in the shape of a loop. <i>He s no longer in the <b>loop</b>.</i>
<b>nexus</b>	A connected group or series. <i>The <b>nexus</b> between industry and political power.</i>
<b>radio link</b>	A communication system based on broadcasting electromagnetic waves.
<b>relatedness</b>	A particular manner of connectedness. <i>He presented an overwhelming case for the <b>relatedness</b> of all living things.</i>
<b>relationship</b>	A relation between people relationship is often used where relation would serve as in the relationship between inflation and unemployment but the preferred usage of relationship is for human relations or states of relatedness. <i>The study will assess the <b>relationship</b> between unemployment and political attitudes.</i>
<b>ring</b>	A ring shaped or circular object. <i>Through traffic is diverted along the outer <b>ring</b>.</i>

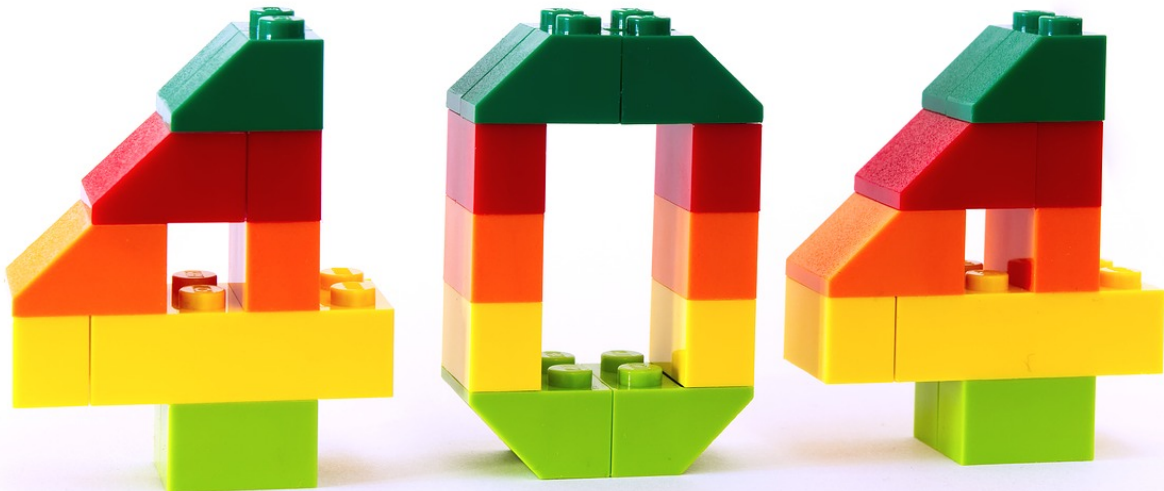

<b>bond</b>	Criminal law money that must be forfeited by the bondsman if an accused person fails to appear in court for trial. <i>He stooped over the trussed man and tested his <b>bonds</b>.</i>
<b><u>causal</u></b>	Relating to or acting as a cause. <i>A <b>causal</b> relationship between scarcity and higher prices.</i>

<b>combine</b>	Combine so as to form a whole mix. <i>A new product which <b>combines</b> the benefits of a hairspray and a gel.</i>

<b>congruence</b>	Agreement or harmony; compatibility. <i>The results show quite good <b>congruence</b> with recent studies.</i>

<b>connect</b>	Connect fasten or put together two or more pieces. <i>All the buildings are <b>connected</b> by underground passages.</i>

<b>correlative</b>	A word or concept that has a mutual relationship with another word or concept. <i>The child s right to education is a <b>correlative</b> of the parent s duty to send the child to school.</i>
<b><u>friendship</u></b>	The emotions or conduct of friends; the state of being friends. <i>The foreign ministers extended to eastern Europe the hand of <b>friendship</b>.</i>
<b>interconnect</b>	Cause to be interconnected or interwoven. <i>The way human activities <b>interconnect</b> with the environment.</i>
<b>interrelationship</b>	Mutual or reciprocal relation or relatedness. <i>The <b>interrelationship</b> between the comprehension and production of early vocabulary.</i>

<b><u>liaison</u></b>	Introduction of a consonant between a word that ends in a vowel and another that begins with a vowel, as in English law and order. <i>He provided a <b>liaison</b> with the guerrillas.</i>
<b>linked</b>	Connected by a link, as railway cars or trailer trucks.
<b>nexus</b>	A connected series or group. <i>The <b>nexus</b> between industry and political power.</i>
<b><u>relate</u></b>	Be in a relationship with. <i>People who are distantly <b>related</b>.</i>
<b>related</b>	Associated with the specified item or process, especially causally. <i>School <b>related</b> activities.</i>
<b>relationship</b>	A relation between people relationship is often used where relation would serve as in the relationship between inflation and unemployment but the preferred usage of relationship is for human relations or states of relatedness. <i>The landlord tenant <b>relationship</b>.</i>
<b>socket</b>	Place in or fit with a socket. <i>The eye <b>socket</b>.</i>
