- *The state in which a substance exhibits a characteristic readiness to flow with little or no tendency to disperse and relatively high incompressibility.*
- *A substance that flows freely but is of constant volume, having a consistency like that of water or oil.*
- *A consonant produced by allowing the airstream to flow over the sides of the tongue (typically l and r).*
- *A frictionless continuant that is not a nasal consonant (especially `l' and `r).*

<b>limpid</b>	Transmitting light; able to be seen through with clarity. <i>Could see the sand on the bottom of the <b>limpid</b> pool.</i>
<b>liquified</b>	Reduced to a liquid state.
<b>melted</b>	Having become liquefied by heating. <i>Asparagus with <b>melted</b> butter.</i>
<b>negotiable</b>	Capable of being passed or negotiated. <i>The price was not <b>negotiable</b>.</i>
<b>obtainable</b>	Able to be obtained. <i>Customers financial details are easily <b>obtainable</b>.</i>
<b>pure</b>	Of color being chromatically pure not diluted with white or grey or black. <i><b>Pure</b> science.</i>
<b>realizable</b>	In or able to be converted into cash. <i>10 per cent of <b>realizable</b> assets.</i>
<b>running</b>	Done while running. <i>A <b>running</b> joke among us.</i>
<b>see-through</b>	So thin as to transmit light.
<b>smooth</b>	Without breaks between notes smooth and connected. <i><b>Smooth</b> skin.</i>
<b>spendable</b>	(used of funds) remaining after taxes. <i><b>Spendable</b> income.</i>
<b>swimming</b>	Applied to a fish depicted horizontally. <i><b>Swimming</b> eyes.</i>
<b>transparent</b>	(of an organization or its activities) open to public scrutiny. <i>A <b>transparent</b> explanation.</i>

**usable** Able or fit to be used.  
*2000 square feet of **usable** office space.*

## Associations of "Liquid" (30 Words)

<b>ablate</b>	Gradually remove material from or erode (a surface or object) by melting, evaporation, frictional action, etc., or erode (material) in this way. <i>Therapeutic intervention to <b>ablate</b> existing cancer cells.</i>
<b>anhydrous</b>	(of a substance, especially a crystalline compound) containing no water.
<b>aqueous</b>	Similar to or containing or dissolved in water. <i>An <b>aqueous</b> solution of potassium permanganate.</i>
<b>bleach</b>	Clean or sterilize a drain sink etc with bleach. <i>The sun <b>bleached</b> the red shirt.</i>
<b>dehydrate</b>	Remove water from (food) in order to preserve and store it. <i>Carry <b>dehydrated</b> food on your camping trip.</i>
<b>desiccated</b>	Lacking vitality or spirit; lifeless. <i><b>Desiccated</b> crops are vulnerable to diseases.</i>



<b>dilution</b>	Weakening (reducing the concentration) by the addition of water or a thinner. <i>He is resisting any <b>dilution</b> of dogma.</i>
<b>dioxide</b>	An oxide containing two atoms of oxygen in the molecule.
<b>dissolve</b>	Disappear. <i>The National Assembly was <b>dissolved</b> after a coup.</i>
<b>dried</b>	Preserved by removing natural moisture. <i>The ink has <b>dried</b>.</i>
<b>extraction</b>	The ethnic origin of someone's family. <i>The dentist gave her a local anesthetic prior to the <b>extraction</b>.</i>
<b>fusible</b>	Able to be fused or melted easily.
<b>gas</b>	Kill or harm by exposure to gas. <i>Cooking is done by bottled <b>gas</b>.</i>
<b>hydrate</b>	Cause to be hydrated add water or moisture to. <i><b>Hydrated</b> silicate crystals.</i>
<b>ice</b>	A rink with a floor of ice for ice hockey or ice skating. <i>An <b>iced</b> summer drink.</i>
<b>immiscible</b>	Incapable of mixing. <i>Benzene is <b>immiscible</b> with water.</i>
<b>liquefaction</b>	The conversion of a solid or a gas into a liquid. <i>A gas <b>liquefaction</b> plant.</i>
<b>liquefy</b>	Become liquid or fluid when heated. <i>The minimum pressure required to <b>liquefy</b> a gas.</i>
<b>melt</b>	Metal or other material in a melted condition. <i>The cheers <b>melted</b> into gasps of admiration.</i>
<b>melted</b>	Having become liquefied by heating. <i>Asparagus with <b>melted</b> butter.</i>
<b>meltwater</b>	Melted snow or ice. <i>Glacial <b>meltwaters</b> gathered on a thick bed of boulder clay.</i>
<b>moisture</b>	Wetness caused by water. <i>In freshly felled wood the <b>moisture</b> content varies.</i>
<b>molten</b>	Reduced to liquid form by heating. <i>A mass of <b>molten</b> rock.</i>
<b>naphtha</b>	Any of various volatile flammable liquid hydrocarbon mixtures; used chiefly as solvents.

<b>oxidize</b>	Undergo or cause to undergo a reaction in which electrons are lost to another species. <i>This metal <b>oxidizes</b> easily.</i>
<b>silicate</b>	A salt or ester derived from silicic acid.
<b>soluble</b>	(of a problem) able to be solved. <i>The poison is <b>soluble</b> in alcohol.</i>
<b><u>solvent</u></b>	Capable of meeting financial obligations. <i>An unrivalled <b>solvent</b> of social prejudices.</i>
<b>thaw</b>	A period of warmer weather that thaws ice and snow. <i>Riven began to feel his ears and toes <b>thaw</b> out.</i>
<b>water</b>	Provide with water. <i>The ship was <b>watered</b> and fresh livestock taken aboard.</i>
